I led King of clubs of course and continued with the Queen．Declarer（East）ruffed the second club，drew trumps，ending in dummy，and ruffed dummy＇s last club．Next he hooked the Q hearts，cashed the Ace and dumped Inez in with the Jack．She exited with 10 diamonds and declarer picked the position by rising with the King．A second diamond left me on lead with nowhere to go．
＂Can＇t beat it＂I said to Inez．＂Even switching to Q diamonds at trick 2 doesn＇t help＂
＂No＂she said sweetly＂unless perhaps you dump the $Q$ diamonds under the King．＂

Rebecca Plush (ACT Youth) and Len Dixon (ACT Seniors) both declared 3NT as East on this hand, and both played identically.

A low diamond was led to the nine Jack and King. The Ace of spades was led at trick two, then a spade to the King - an avoidance play which was spectacularly successful when North held the doubleton Queen. Spades were now cashed, declarer discarding two hearts and two clubs. Now a club to the King secured the ninth trick and a brace of game swings.

The ugly thing about this hand is that the avoidance play may have been premature. I suggest, instead, the Jack of hearts at trick two.

In the closed room East WA (Don Allen) opened 1C showing 8-12 and 4+ hearts and less than 4 spades. Jim Borin passed and Trevor Fuller bid 1D (invitational to game). Don Allen rebid 2S! showing 10-12, $5+$ hearts and spade shortage. Trevor could now pass. Borin led spade 4 to declarer's J. Next came A \& K hearts
pitching a club. In due course 9 tricks were made.
In the Open room, Robert Van Riel opened 1H! and rebid 2H over Felicity Beale's 1S. Felicity's 4S closed the auction. Ron Cooper led D2 to Ace. Declarer tried the H finesse, losing. Other winners for the defence were DK,CA,SA,CJ,CK for down 3 vul.

In the Open room, East ,Robert Van Riel opened 1NT, passed out making 6 tricks.
In the Closed room,Allen 'opened' a forcing pass. Borin overcalled 1D, Fuller bid 1D (7-10 pts \& 4 hearts). Richman bounced to 4D and Don Allen's 4H closed the auction. DQ lead was won by the ace and Trevor Fuller could see 4 probable major suit losers. . . . unless South had Q10 doubleton heart. So declarer called for H4 at T2 hoping to see the H10 appear. Borin flew HA and switched to SK. Declarer now had 10 tricks for an unexpected +620 !

Ron Cooper (Open room) opened 1D as North - Henry Christie responded 2D (inverted), 2NT -3C cue 3D -4D: 5C - 5D all pass. The ugly D break scuppered this contract.

In the Closed room Trevor Fuller opened 1S (this was a "fert" or fertilizer bid showing 0-8 pts any shape), Richman overcalled 1NT (12-14 pts) and Borin, after some time in the think tank, elected not to look for a thin slam and raised to 3NT.

Don Allen's opening D10 lead was not good for the defence and Richman could claim eleven tricks.
If Don had found a MUD spade lead then Richman has some work to do but should emerge with 9 tricks.

In the Open room, Christie, South, opened 1S, N bid 2C (G/F and natural), S rebid 2N and Ron Cooper's 4S
(fast arrival) concluded the auction.

1. HK
2. QH to Ace
3. C3 to J losing
4. H exit ruffed in dummy
5. C to Ace
6. A spade to the 10 ! and +620

In the closed room Borin opened 1S,2C from Richman, a temporising 2D from Borin. 2S North (non forcing) and a bold 4 S from Borin (Ax clubs =nice). Same play to T 1 and T 2 then Borin ruffed a heart in dummy, cashed SK and ran the 10 losing to the Q-gloom.

It was hard for Trevor Fuller to switch to a diamond on the bidding so he got out with a heart.
Borin ruffed this and cashed his last two trumps that put the defence under pressure. Dummy pitched a diamond and then a club. Don Allen elected to pitch two diamonds. Now Borin could play Ace and another diamond and the D10 was his 10th trick. Well done Jim after mis-guessing spades.
No Swing!

Board 22 (see next page) saw yet another 1S "fert' (fertilizer bid) from Don Allen in the East chair showing 0-8 points and any shape. Jim Borin bid 2C a natural opening bid limited to 14 points and Bob Richman's 5C concluded proceedings.

With just two aces to lose that looks boring.....but maybe not !

In the Open Room Henry Christie opened 1C. Felicity Beale climbed into the auction with 2C (Michaels Cue Bid). Ron Cooper bid 2D, Van Riel chipped in with 2S. Over Christie's 3D, Ron Cooper elected to bid 3NT. After the H3 lead the defence grabbed five heart tricks but the club Ace went to bed for only one down but still a healthy pick up to Victoria.

In the Closed room Borin opened 1S and over Richman's 2D, Don Allen interposed 2H. Borin's 3C rebid ostensibly showed a canape (longer clubs than spades and typically 4-6 shape). Richman bid 3NT and Don Allen led H10 (Rusinow-promising a high honour and mayne the Jack as well).

In the fullness of time, the defenders kept the right cards and Richman was down 2 for -200.
Borin crimed himself for not rebidding $2 S$ but next time getting the club suit in early could be vital for a nice club slam.

In the Open room Cooper \& Christie duly got to 4 S after a 2 H overcall and a raise to 3 H . This made 11 tricks for a good pick up to WA.

In the Open room Cooper, North, opened 1D and Christie responded 1H. Then Beale overcalled 1S, Cooper rebid 2C, and Robert Van Riel bounced to 3S.

Christie cue bid 4S over which Cooper bid 5C, Christie bid 5D and after considerable reflection Ron Cooper judged that there should be some play for twelve tricks - Kx hearts = good holding and he bid 6D which proved to be easy on the actual layout.

In the closed room Fuller opened the bidding with 1D showing 8-12 pts and $4+$ spads $\&<4$ hearts. Richman bid 2D, natural, and Don Allen also bounced to 3S.

Jim Borin had less information to work with than Henry Christie and judged that 12 tricks might be hard to procure and accordingly jumped directly to 5D. Richman looking at 109 of spades and fearing two spade losers passed.

If Allen had bounced to 4 S would Borin would have compensated etc with a leap to 6D?
These seven hands were the big swing hands but there were numerous small swings eg Board 13 was passed in the Open room. In the Closed room Richman opened the North Hand 1D (sort of Precision-ish) and Borin got to play it in 1NT making 7 tricks.

The result of this 24 board match was 7 imps to WA.
By the way in case readers were not aware, Richman-Borin are not a regular partnership. Rob Fruewirth had qualified to play for VIC with Borin but had to return home on18/7/99 one hour before the teams began! NPC for VIC, Felicity Beale now became a player partnering Van Riel -a regular partnership. Martin Willcox took over as NPC. Borin is playing Richman's system ie Big Club and light openings in first and second seat. But in third and fourth seat they switch to Standard!

Fuller and Allen are one of WA's top pairs. They had seven Forcing Pass openings, five 1S Ferts, and 5 transfer openings. Such bids are very tiring to play against....many unusual decisions are required. .it is uncomfortable but can be fun.
