## NEARLY A VERY RED FACE

In the final round of Stage 2 of the Butler, your editor was substituting for the ill Seamus Browne.

Ishmael Del'Monte opened 2S weak (not vul vs vul), Henry Sawicki bid 3D, I bid 4S, LHO Martin Doran bid 5H (after some thought) which was passed around to me.

This was the second last board of the match and my guesstimate was that we were down some 20 odd Imps. My hand was

I recalled a Sydney Morning Herald bridge column about a week ago where Dick Cummings reported a disaster by two French international bridge players. One French player in the passout seat decided to double 6NT holding AK of the same suit. His LHO ran to 7S and the opening leader led the wrong suit and the Grand Slam rolled home.

My normal move on this hand would be to pass, as at this vul, Ish's 2S could be a bit smelly. I would expect 5H to go one off. However, feeling a need to get some Imps back, I decided to double hoping the opponents would not run to 6C. Oops. When this came around to Henry he did bid 6C. I flinched inwardly but still doubled this contract as a matter of principle and led the S7

Fortunately Ish's 985 of Clubs was enough to beat this contract one trick. The Butler average was 240 to EW so that was 10 Imps in the plus column for us. Passing 5H would have achieved plus 100 as the cards lie and been much less traumatic.

When the match was scored up, Doran/Sawicki had won 16 - 14 but Browne/Del'Monte had hung on to their 7th place and were into Stage 3. Your Editor needed some sort of a P.M.U. and a bottle of nice 1998 WA Cab Shiraz (Sandalford) from the Hotel Rendezvous bottle shop and some local pizza which I shared with my wife Ruth did the trick.

Playing in a Moysian fit isn't the end of the world, especially at the 1 level with a combined 19 count between the hands. But sometimes wheels fall off like on Hand 29 from session 9 of stage 2 in the Open.

Most of the field were in 2C by West, one down or making if West could manage to ruff a diamond and endplay South in the end game, or 2D by N/S, making. But not at Henry Christie's table.

Henry, sitting North, passed and East (playing Forcing Pass) opened 1S perforce, the “fert” bid showing 0-7 points. Paul Sherman, sitting South, passed and West, glad to have 4 trumps in the fert suit, also passed. (It is very difficult for E/W to stop in 2C after a fert 1S).

Henry saw no reason to disturb the contract and East became declarer in 1S. But now the defence got nasty. Paul led the AS and another spade, ducked by Henry’s J. Henry switched to the JD. Covered by the Q and taken with the A. Paul returned a low diamond to Henry’s 10.

Now the QS pinned East’s singleton 10 as he won on the table with the K. Declarer tried to get off the table with a club to the J but Paul took his K and led a low diamond to Henry’s K to draw dummy’s remaining trump. Henry now played his last diamond back to partner who exited with a heart to dummy’s stiff A to collect the 10C at the end. Down 3 in 1S, for not quite your average board!.

As South, you declare 5D after E/W have competed in clubs. West leads the Ace of Clubs (East encourages with the King). West now cashes the Ace of Spades before continuing Clubs at trick three. After ruffing, what is the best play? You draw trumps, ruff exactly one spade in dummy (making the nine of spades a threat card against one opponent), then run all the diamonds, reaching this position after the last diamond has been played

The King and Ace of hearts dropped East's offside Queen and East also held the master Spade, but it was Not a major suit squeeze, since East had commenced the hand with Ace doubleton Queen!

KONVENTION KORNER

### 1. The Cooper Echo

If you are playing a contract which pard thinks might be failing, play high-low in dummy when the contract is cold to reassure him.

### 2. The Congratulatory Jack

When pard has conducted a fine defence, play or discard a Jack to say "Nicely played"

### 3. The Apologetic 3 Spades.

1NT - 3NT is a signoff. 1NT - 3S is a transfer to 3NT, with the added meaning "Sorry about my earlier mistake, pard."

Solution To "Here's a Hand" ..

*(Did you try refusing to ruff the third diamond ... win the fourth trick, lay down the AH, cash the AS, cross to the KS and try to throw 2 clubs on the K,Q hearts?)*

*All you need for that is to find East with 4 hearts and 3 trumps, hearts breaking 3 - 3 is not good enough since East can throw a heart on the third diamond -...  
....-can you think of something better? ... not forgetting that if you let the third diamond win West can lead a fourth diamond forcing you to ruff in dummy and be overruffed or allowing East to throw yet another heart ...?)*

"Your precious asset" said the Hideous Hog is the 2 of spades because it can lose a trick."

Picking up someone else's glass of port the Hog continued, "You ruff the third diamond with the KS, cross to your hand with the AH cash two top spades and exit with the deuce. If you find east with 3 trumps, which is likely - they have only clubs and hearts left and so are lost!"

"So why are you looking so miserable?" asked the Owl

"That Rueful Rabbit's guardian angel" said the Hog.

"The Rabbit was so abstracted and confident that I would ruff the third diamond low, he accidentally underuffed the K spades with the seven so now whatever I did I couldn't put him in to lead away from the K of clubs or lead a heart "

"I tried the AS and exited with the deuce hoping the Rabbit would win with the 8, but it was not to be"

Winning the second round of trumps with the 8S, the Walrus remarked later ...
