AUSTRALIAN BUTLER PAIRS CHAMPIONSHIP

SUPPLEMENTARY REGULATIONS 2006

19 July, 2006

1 Introduction:

The Australian Bridge Federation Incorporated (ABF) in cooperation with the South Australian Bridge Federation (SABF) conducts the Australian National Championships (ANC) and Australian Butler Pairs Championships (ABPC) in accordance with ABF Tournament Regulations and Appeals Rules as applicable and as modified by these Supplementary Regulations.

1.1 The venue is the Holiday Inn Adelaide, 65 Hindley St.

1.2 The Tournament Convener is Dianne Marler
The Chief Tournament Director (CTD) is Sean Mullamphy
The Appeals Committee Chairman is Eric Ramshaw.
The Appeals Advisor is to be advised.
The Tournament Committee Chairman is Martin Willcox.
The ABF Tournament Organiser is Eric Ramshaw.
The ABF Recorders are to be advised.

1.3 The Chairman appoints the Appeal or Tournament Committee members and is the sole judge of their quorum. In the absence of the Chairman of the Appeals Committee, the Tournament Convener acts in his/her place as convener of the Appeals Committee.

1.4 The ABF Tournament Organiser has absolute discretion to enforce Regulations #3, 4 & #10.6 hereof and his/her decision is final and not subject to appeal.

1.5 Smoking is not permitted in areas defined by the Convener as the playing area and the scoreboard area and any other designated area.

1.6 Mobile telephones, pagers or other electronic equipment must be switched off during session time and may not be consulted or used unless a specific exception is permitted by the CTD. Breach of this regulation incurs a disciplinary penalty (#5.4).

2. Eligibility:

2.1 Youth players, as defined in #2.4, may represent a Home State or an Adoptive State (in which they have resided continuously for a period of three months or for the majority of a discontinuous period of four months) provided that they are members of a club affiliated to that State or the ABF Youth Club.

2.2 Unless dispensation is granted by the ABF (which may be retrospective), no Open, Womens or Senior player shall represent a State at an ANC who has not been:

(a) an active playing member of a club affiliated with or within the jurisdiction of that State during the previous year

or

(b) a *bona fide* resident of that State for a period of at least six months immediately prior to the commencement of the ANC in question.

2.3 When #2.1 or #2.2 results in a player being eligible to represent more than one State in any particular event at the ANC, that player is entitled to represent only that State in which s/he first entered a selection tournament for that event.

2.4 To be eligible for the ANC restricted events:

- **Youth** players must be born after 31-12-80, except as authorised by the Youth Committee
- **Senior** players must be born before 1-1-50
- **MP for restricted events:** The MP rankings published at 30-6-06 apply.

2.5 No substitutes are permitted in the ANC events, provided that the CTD is empowered to authorise emergency substitutions under such condition as s/he decides. Substitutes are allowed in the ABPC subject to ABF regulations and #18.

2.6 At the time of commencement of Stage II or B of the ABPC, each entrant who is an Australian resident must be an eligible player as defined in the Playoff Regulations.

2.7 The convener may nominate a "house unit" for any purpose consistent with the movement. The convener makes every effort to nominate eligible players from a small group but, at the discretion of the Tournament Committee, a "house unit" may consist of any number of players including ineligible players.

2.8 At the discretion of the Tournament Committee, a "house unit" is eligible to place and scores its actual VP & IMP or is ineligible to place and its score limited to a maximum of 15 and a minimum of 11 VP with the minimum IMP of the allocated range. Its opponents receive their actual VP and IMP. Masterpoints for "house unit" matches are awarded according to actual VP.

3. Systems and Defences:

3.1 Pairs must classify their system(s) as GREEN, BLUE, RED, BROWN Sticker or YELLOW using the ABF System Regulations as modified at October 1st, 2004. Pairs in any doubt about the classification of their system should submit a concise summary to the ANC Convener.

3.2 In the event of a dispute during the Tournament concerning the classification of a convention or system the decision of the ABF Tournament Organiser is final.

3.3 GREEN, BLUE, RED and BROWN Sticker systems are permitted in all events. YELLOW systems are permitted in the ANC Teams and ABPC Stages II, III, & B.

3.4 During the auction, pairs may use notes of their defence or "defence against the defence" for YELLOW systems or the convention(s) that make a system RED or BROWN STICKER provided that they comply with regulation #4.4 & 4.5. During the play a player's notes may be used only to answer a question from the opponents. (No player may refer to the written bidding after the conclusion of the first trick).

4. Notification and Disclosure of Systems and Defences.

4.1 For the ABPC, YELLOW systems, including those that are to be played only as a defence against pairs playing a YELLOW system, must be lodged with the Chairman of the ABF Tournament Unit or CTD **AT THE LATEST** by 6.30pm on Sunday, 23rd July 2006. Pairs must lodge an adequate current ABF Standard system card with a maximum of 2 supplementary A4 sheets, printed, typed or written in black ink on one side. Pairs who fail to meet these deadlines may not be permitted to play a YELLOW system for some or all the event.

4.2 For the ANC Teams systems summary exception reports (except those in #4.3) must be received earlier than four weeks prior to the commencement of the ANC - 4.00pm Sunday 2nd July 2006. These systems must be submitted by the State Secretary by e-mail to webmaster@abf.com.au. Complete and detailed notes with a *bona fide* defence must accompany any YELLOW system. A maximum of four BROWN Sticker and/or YELLOW systems per team is permitted. Each player must bring to the table a current ABF Standard system card, printed, typed or written legibly in black ink.

4.3 For the ANC Teams a concise summary of a YELLOW system that is to be used only against an opposing pair who play a YELLOW system must be lodged with the Chairman of the ABF Tournament Unit before the Captains' meeting. Two copies must be distributed to each captain whose team includes a pair playing a YELLOW system at the captains meeting.

4.4 Defence or "defence against the defence" notes, printed, typed or written in black ink on one side of an A4 sheet, must be: lodged with and approved by the CTD 15 minutes before the scheduled session time; identical for each player; available to the opponents during the auction and play.

4.5 For defence against a YELLOW system, pairs using GREEN, BLUE, RED or BROWN Sticker systems may change any facet of their system but pairs using a YELLOW system may not change their opening calls. For "defence against the defence" pairs may not change any of the highly artificial aspects of their YELLOW system.

5. Disciplinary and Procedural Penalties:

5.1 The general provisions of ABF Tournament Regulation #8 concerning punctuality and slow play apply except as modified by #5.2-3 below. In a Swiss movement penalties are subtracted from the overall rankings but the draw is determined by scores excluding penalties.

5.2 Players must be seated 5 minutes before the scheduled start of play. For units not seated and ready to play at the scheduled starting time procedural penalties are:

1 st offence <4min	Warning	10+-15 min late	2 VP
0-5 min late	0.5	15+-20 min late	3 VP
5+-10 min late	1 VP	>20 min late	More severe

For arrival later than 20 minutes the CTD assesses a more severe penalty including forfeit or disqualification.

5.3 The time allotted is based on 7.5 minutes per board. In a Swiss movement and the ANC Qualifying round robins, boards not started before a time specified by the CTD are not played and the units concerned score 0 IMP. The unit is awarded a procedural penalty for unplayed boards in each round of 1 VP for the first board and 2 VP each for any others. After considering any monitor's reports and his own observations, the Director may apply slow play penalties according to the table in #5.2 whenever play is not completed at the expiry of the session time.

5.4 The disciplinary penalty for breach of #1.6 (mobile phones etc.) is 3 VP, 9 IMP or 30% of the MP top on a board.

6. Correction Period and Time of Appeal:

6.1 The Correction Period (Law 79C) and Time of Appeal (Law 92B) for each session expire 30 minutes after the score is available for inspection unless the next round/stanza/session is scheduled to commence within that period. In that case they are extended to the expiration of the correction period and time of appeal for that next round/stanza/session.

6.2 All appeals or protests concerning the ANC events shall be lodged in person and in writing using the Notice of Appeal available from the Tournament Director.

7. Spectators:

7.1 Subject to availability of space, spectators are permitted in Open, but not Closed, Rooms. Regulation #10.1 of the ABF Tournament Regulations and Law 76 of the 1997 Code apply to all spectators. When replicated boards are used, no spectator may watch play at more than one table during any stanza of any event.

8. Dress Requirements:

8.1 Players and kibitzers are expected to maintain a minimum standard of dress, described as "neat casual".

9. Partnership Alterations:

9.1 A State may alter partnerships provided that the altered partnership plays a system which has been submitted pursuant to Regulation #4.2 above or a system which the CTD in his absolute discretion considers is sufficiently natural as to cause no disadvantage to the opposition through lack of previous disclosure.

10. Round Robins:

10.1 The qualifying round robin matches are 24-boards played without a break or change of pairs (except in cases of emergency).

10.2.1 Team numbers for the first Round Robin are allotted at the Presidents meeting. For 2006 they are

10.2.2 For 5 or 6 teams and three Round Robins, the team numbers for the second Round Robin are drawn by the CTD at the conclusion of the first Round Robin.

10.2.3 For 4 teams and four round robins, the team numbers for the third Round Robin are drawn by the CTD at the conclusion of the second Round Robin

10.2.4 The team numbers for the second of four and the last Round Robin are equivalent to the team's placing, determined by its VP score irrespective of any outstanding appeals but including all penalties, posted after the last round of the previous Round Robin. Subsequent adjustments do not alter the team numbers or the draw.

10.3.1 For 7 or 8 teams there are two qualifying Round Robins of 24-board matches.

10.3.2 The draw is:

10.3.3 The first-numbered team places its pairs NS in the Open Room, EW in the Closed Room. In the first Round Robin the first-numbered team sits first; in the second Round Robin the team that sat first against any team in the first Round Robin match sits last against that team.

10.4.1 For 5 or 6 teams there are three qualifying Round Robins of 24-board matches.

10.4.2 The draw is:

10.4.3 The first-numbered team places its pairs NS in the Open Room, EW in the Closed Room. The first-numbered team sits first in the first and second of three Round Robins; in the last Round Robin the team which sat first against any team in the second Round Robin match sits last against that team.

10.5.1 For 4 teams there are four qualifying Round Robins of 24-board matches.

10.5.2 The draw for four teams is:

10.5.3 The first-numbered team places its pairs NS in the Open Room, EW in the Closed Room. The first-numbered team sits first in the first and third of four Round Robins; in the second and the last Round Robins the team which sat first against any team in the previous Round Robin match sits last against that team.

10.6 1 The team captain is responsible for posting the seating positions of the players on the Line-up Form with the system being played if more than one has been submitted. Posting must be completed at least 30 minutes and 20 minutes before the scheduled time of commencement of play, for the teams sitting first and last respectively. The CTD may alter posting times at his discretion.

For non-compliance with this Regulation, the penalties are:

loss of seating rights

AND

1 st offence	warning	2 nd offence	1 VP fine	3 rd & subsequent offences	2 VP fine per offence
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10.6.2 A YELLOW system may be played only if the pairs are posted correctly within the posting period or, in any other circumstances, with the agreement of the opposing captain and the CTD.

10.7.1 Scoring for each 24-board segment in the Round Robins is IMP converted to VP as follows:

Margin of 35 IMP or less

VP = IMP

Margin of 36 IMP or more

VP = 35 + 1/10 [IMP margin minus 35]

maximum win of 37.5 VP; maximum loss of 40 VP.

10.7.2 No score is awarded for a bye. After a forfeit, the non-offenders receive 23 VP, adjusted at the conclusion of the round robins to the higher of 23 VP or the team's mean score for completed rounds. The offenders score -37.5 VP.

10.8 Opposing captains shall agree to and sign the result sheet displayed by the scorer at the end of each match.

10.9 The time allotted for each set of 24 boards is 180 minutes.

10.10 Matches specified at the captains' meeting and the commencement of the second round robin may be displayed using Bridge Base.

11. Final:

11.1 The two leading teams in each of the ANC Teams competitions play a 60-board Final (Youth reduced to 40 boards when there are 15 rounds) with a total of at least 20-boards, drawn from one or more of the Finals, displayed on Bridge Base and/or Vu-Graph.

11.2 The Finals are played in 10-board sessions with screens. The captains draw for seating rights and the winner may elect to sit first or last for the first session. For subsequent sessions, seating rights alternate.

11.3 The carryover into the Final is 10% of the VP margin between the teams at the conclusion of the Round Robin, rounded to the nearest IMP (0.5 is reduced).

11.4 Scoring in the Finals is by VP with 1 IMP equivalent to 1 VP

11.5 Opposing captains agree to and sign a result sheet after each 10-board session. The captain of the team sitting first hands this result sheet to the Director as soon as the result is known.

11.6 The time allotted for each set of 10 boards is 80 minutes.

12. Ties:

12.1 A tie occurs when two or more teams have the exact number of VP.

12.2 Ties are broken after each Round Robin by: net IMP; lot.

12.3 Ties in the Final are broken by play of 4 boards then 1 board until broken.

ANC PAIRS EVENTS

13.1 The ANC Open, Womens, Senior, Mixed & Youth Pairs Championship are two session events with a format dependent on the field.

13.2 Ties in pairs events are split in accordance with Law 81 of the 1975 Code.

14. Tournament Structure:

14.1 The ABF reserves the absolute right to alter the format of any stage of the ABPC, without prior notice.

14.2 The Open & Women's ABPC is conducted in three Stages:

Stage I 12 x 10-board rounds of a Swiss movement in NS & EW fields to qualify sufficient pairs to increase the State and ABF nominations for Stage II to 28 pairs in each event.

Stage II 14 x 10-board "matches", to qualify 14 pairs to Stage III in each event.

Stage III 13 x 14-board "matches".

14.3 The Senior ABPC is conducted in two Stages:

Stage A 13 x 10-board "matches" (concurrent with *Stage II*) to qualify 14 pairs to Stage B.

Stage B 13 x 14-board "matches" concurrent with *Stage III*.

14.4 The ABF determines the seeding, scoring and movement for Stage I & A without prior notice.

14.5 Stages II, III, & B of the ABPC are Butler-type movements. Scoring is by IMP against a datum calculated as the arithmetic mean of the middle scores (n-4 for Stage II; n-2 for Stage III/B. IMP) are converted to VP in accordance with the WBF 8-board (Stage II) or 12-board (Stage III/B) scale. Pick up slips, table record cards and/or electronic scoring units are used but each pair must keep a score card, calculate and confirm the result of their match with that posted by the Director/Scorer.

14.6 The ANC Swiss Pairs is a six-session event scored in a similar manner to that described in #14.5. The exact details of the format and movement are determined after entries close.

14.7 The Restricted ABPC is a four-session event scored in a similar manner to that described in #14.5. The exact details of the format and movement are determined after entries close.

15. Ties and Carryover:

15.1 Ties are broken by: after a Swiss movement by VP of opponents, lot; after Stage II, III or B by net IMP; lot.

15.2 There is no carryover from Stage I. The carryover from Stage II/A for each field is

15.3 Slow play warnings carryover from Stage II/A to Stage III/B.

16. Withdrawal and Reserves:

16.1 Pairs who withdraw or are non-contending are replaced in a manner such that the numbers of pairs qualifying from each of the original fields do not differ by more than two.

16.2 When "n" pairs plus the best "n+1" pair qualify for Stage II, the best "n+1" is the pair with the highest VP.

16.3 At the conclusion of Stage II withdrawals are for emergency only. Withdrawals in each group is replaced by the pair ranked next in the same group, subject to #16.1

17. Fouled Boards:

17.1 A ruling that a board is "fouled" must be sought within the correction period.

17.2 Law 87 determines that a board is "fouled" when "the Director determines that one or more cards were misplaced in the board, in such a manner that contestants who should have a direct score comparison did not play the board in identical form".

17.3 A "fouled" board is scored by:

- a) including one or more of its results in the calculation of the datum (described in #14.3) when the Director rules that the fouling was of no consequence
- b) treating the board as two separate entities and calculating separate datums after eliminating the two (3-6 results) or four (results>6) extreme scores, respectively
- c) cancelling one or more of its results and awarding a score of 0 IMP to those contestants whose score was cancelled.

18. Substitutes:

18.1 For Stages I & A of the ABPC, the partnership must be intact for 75% of the rounds and one member of the partnership must play 85% of the rounds (decimals rounded down in each case).

18.2 For Stage II the partnership must be intact for 11 of the 14 "matches" and one member of the partnership must play 12 of the 14 "matches".

18.3 For Stages III & B the partnership must be intact for 10 of the 13 "matches" and one member of the partnership must play 11 of the 13 "matches".

18.4 For the ANC Swiss Pairs must be intact for 3 sessions and one member of the partnership must play 4 sessions.

18.5 For the Restricted ABPC the partnership must be intact for two sessions and one member of the partnership must play three sessions.

18.5 The CTD is may authorise emergency substitutions (for cause) under such condition as s/he decides.

19. Playoff Points:

19.1 Players must declare the basis upon which they are eligible to represent Australia

19.2 Eligible players in the first six pairs in the Open, Womens & Senior events receive 65, 60, 55, 35, 30 & 25 playoff qualifying points, respectively.

19.3 Tied players share the available points.
