THE HALL'S GRAND HALL

The Halls were the only pair to reach the grand slam. The majority played in 6Ψ and a few stopped in game. After the same start several Norths simply jumped to 6Ψ .

Dummy won the spade lead and the 6♥ to the ace drew the missing trump. Hilary played off the A♣, K♣ and ruffed a club. A trump to dummy was followed by another club ruff, leaving dummy with

two winning clubs. That took care of the diamond loser for thirteen tricks and +2210.

When Justin bid 3♥ freely it seemed he had a singleton ♠ and, hopefully, 5♥. My 4♥ bid was pushy but was validated by the play.

Lead: ♦ to the A. Q♥ returned to Justin's K♥. He led a spade to the A♠ and ruffed a spade (South playing Q♠). Next came a club to dummy's K♠ and another spade ruff. Another club towards dummy was won by the A♠. If North had now exited with a trump there would be no story – but North led another club. Now Justin trumped another spade with the |♥, then trumped a diamond to dummy.

The last spade saw North trumping (holding only 10 5 4 trumps). He had to lead a heart and dummy's A 8 took the last 2 tricks.

Seven Deadly Partnership Sins

- 7. Laziness

6. Creating Bad Vibes

This is not suggesting you join the silly backslapping of many team sports but that you do not go out of your way to be negative. How often have you said or heard one of the following as your team gathers for a score up after a match:

"We were terrible."

"We had two disasters."

"I went down in two lay down games."

Not only is this unnecessary but it erodes the confidence of the team as a whole (not to mention that of your poor partner) and the confidence of other players in you — I urge you to think about that. Just do the score-up and get on with the day. Some players seem to use as much energy in the post mortems at score-ups as they do during the match itself — this is not productive. In fact, the use of the term "post mortem" to describe how many players review their performance seems to have been particularly well chosen.

Jim Borin was at a national teams' event many years ago and his pair went for a postcode. At the score-up, however, it seems the board had been scrubbed at the other table. Jim took the entirely sensible position that it was not necessary to tell his teammates until after the event, so he temporarily buried the result.

If you cannot stop yourself and decide you have to confess to the sin immediately, at least do so with a sense of humour. Since when is one bad board a disaster anyway? Get a grip my old darlings...

7. Laziness

This is a tricky one but it is real. On a personal level, we can all play better bridge by being physically better prepared. Keep fit, eat well, drink plenty of water and get plenty of sleep.

In a partnership sense there is an expectation of a degree of commitment to the partnership that you need to keep up.

It doesn't matter what your level of commitment is, but you do need understand what it is and try to stick to it. Doing the right thing here is boring but it is very real — especially once you are past your first year as a unit.

You may be in a freewheeling partnership where you turn up with a bottle of wine under your belt even at nationals and just wing it at the table. But that's not you, right?

For those who want to do well you are expected to keep up certain standards. Some of the areas are:

- I. Pay attention to your partner's signals.
- 2. Read and learn the system notes before big events.
- 3. Put enough effort into defending to get the most out of the cards they give you.
- Occasionally have a system discussion and/or practice to keep your game ticking over between the big events – whether for your

- partnership these are national, state or congress.
- 5. Turn up on time at the table to stop partner getting tense.
- 6. Help with the administration of entering events and the like.

When you get lazy and stop doing these things to the level partner expects (especially the one about looking at those pesky signals), your partnership is starting to slip. We don't want that do we?

Ed: Thank you Blaine, for your list, which I hope has been read by, not only new partnerships, but established ones too. It should be compulsory reading for any partnership.

West opened INT, passed out.

I led $5 \triangleq$ to the 2 – and Boylson masterfully played the 3 – declarer winning $10 \triangleq$.

Christine Boylson's unusual third hand low play had two ways to gain: (I) not setting up dummy's spades and (2) on a different layout, not giving dummy an entry to the clubs.

Winning 10♠, declarer played 2♣-J-Q-8, then a club to the 10, also ducked. With declarer unable to access dummy, we defeated the contract, +100 being a huge score. (For those who must know the details, A♣, diamond switch to Ace, diamond to K, heart exit to J, diamonds cleared.)

At pairs, surely everyone would (should?) double with the South cards, North's 2♠ showed 12+, East offered us a penalty and Christine had the good sense to take the penalty instead of playing an awkward 4♥ contract. Declarer was endplayed in clubs for +500 (Q♥ lead, diamond to K♦ when in dummy). Personally I think that when one is caught speeding at *unfavourable vulnerability* (as East was), any demerit points should be doubled and deducted from your Bidding Licence.

On Board 28, East opened INT on a hand of dubious merit in third seat. The weak INT in 3rd seat is such a loser that many top Northern Hemisphere pairs play INT as weak except in 3rd seat where it is 15-17.

I should have led $Q \triangleq$ (lead trumps vs low level doubled contracts) but actually I led $A \checkmark$, switching to $3 \diamondsuit$ to the K. $Q \checkmark$ to my King, a third heart, $Q \diamondsuit$ to my Ace, diamond exit, club to J & Q, club to K, J\(\Delta\) to the Ace led to 300 to NS, but it would have been a less untidy defence on $Q \triangleq$ lead.

So that's how to win a National Pairs event – some good play, and a few errors combined with a readiness to penalise those who bid too much.
