Joan led the ΔK which asked for reverse count and my 2 indicated an even number or singleton. She continued to my Q and, on the return of The $\Delta 10$, ruffed delarer's J. The $\Delta 10$ now went to declarer's Q. The $\Delta 10$ to the J and A enabled S to take the losing $\nabla 10$ finesse and diamonds were cont inued, E finally taking the A. Now the $\Delta 10$ to the K and another to the 10, $\nabla 10$ to the A and another to the J.

The result: EW took 2 spades and a ruff, 2 diamonds, 1 club and 2 hearts—making 2Ψ , all from an out of the box lead.

Day 5 Gambling: Turn of a Friendly Card


A "Double" Disaster

One of my lifestyle rules has been never to take anything for granted and not to make assumptions. I

broke these rules with a vengeance when playing in Match 9 of the Women's Stage 1.

Board 23



Sitting East, I quite liked my hand and when North opened with 2D in 3rd seat, I "assumed" it to be a European Multi type of hand. Foolishly, I neglected to check the meaning of the bid, which in fact was a game force.

Assuming it to be probably a weak-2 in hearts, I made a takeout double. South redoubled and the bidding passed to North who bid 2H (game force in hearts). Still under the illusion that the hand was weak, I doubled again.

Not a great move.

My hapless partner then hoped that my original double favoured diamonds and the result was a bid

of 3D. Unsurprisingly this was doubled by South. When the smoke cleared, West had made 1 trick, the diamond nine!

My carelessness in not inquiring about the bidding had resulted in a score of -2300, not my greatest triumph, and a loss of 17 Imps (I must say partner was remarkably gracious about it all...)
