

The first good thing we did was to bid to 3NT making North declarer. East led the $\bullet Q$, won with the A, South discarding a small \bullet . Now the $\bullet J$ was led to the Q, K and 3.

The \checkmark 2 went to the J, 3 and 6, East returning \clubsuit 4, 3 and 10.

Declarer led the $\clubsuit 4$ to the A and the $\blacktriangledown 10$ to the Q and K.

Now the hands now are



When North cashes the \bullet K, West is squeezed in the other three suits. He chose to discard the \bullet 6. Now the \bullet A forces him to play the \bullet 8 and a \blacktriangledown exit endplays him for 9 tricks.

6. (Andy has obviously drawn a polite veil over the bidding! Ed.) With only 25 high card points and about a 1 in 3 statistical chance of making it, everyone knew it would be a key board.

Bill led the ◆A and dummy "exposed" the first Q, in spades. Jeddy ruffed the second ◆ and played AK of clubs, exposing the second black Q in Bill's hand. If spades were now 4-3 he was home but when the third top spade revealed the 5-2

break, he had to find the ♥Q.

On the last club, Bill had to play the $\bullet Q$ as Jeddy knew he had three hearts left (Bill had to hold a 2362 shape) so pitching a heart would have given Jeddy the contract. However, exposing the $\bullet Q$ also inadvertently exposed the $\bullet Q$ despite the fact that it had not yet been played. Bill had now shown up with the $\bullet AQJ$ and the $\bullet Q$, so there was no room in his hand for the $\bullet Q$ – if he held this card he would have a normal opening bid of $1 \bullet$. Jeddy confidently played the $\bullet A$, then the $\bullet 10$ and the doubleton Q was now fully exposed to bring the contract home.

If Andy had held the ♠Q Jeddy would have gone down as he would play the three card heart suit for the queen – far better odds by 50%. But such is bridge. Making 6♠ gave Jeddy-Neill a 19-11 win, when going down would have resulted in a 14-16 loss.

An attempt to make the contract via the spade finesse ended in two down for -200 and -5 Imps. Notice that a heart lead from West gives declarer the ninth trick.
