Nobody though pushed it more than Richard Hills (N) and Chris Quail (S) playing against the ACT Youth pair of Robin Stevenson (W) and James Higgins (E). The youthful exuberance did not this time come from the youth pair. spades initially and doubled. West raised to $3 \boldsymbol{a}$ at which point Richard at North took out a bit of bidding space and bid $6 \vee$.

Chris went into the tank and James at East had some time to think about his lead. He decided on the $\& 8$, hoping to find his partner with the nine and get a spade ruff. The best hope in teams but not a good result in pairs-but he never got the chance as South corrected to $7 \boldsymbol{A}$.

Robin Stevenson on lead as East, saw no point in a club lead-at least one of the opponents was obviously void- and opted for the $\bullet$. So 7a rolled home.

This was one of three grand slams bid in the open section but the other two were successful sacrifices in $7 \%$. Interestingly though of the 16 declarers who played in spades (and one in hearts), 13 made all 13 tricks on defenders' lead. Great minds think alike.

## Making a grand minus the ace of trumps

The question in yesterday's bulletin was how can you legitimately make a grand slam in a suit missing the ace of trumps (other than through a revoke penalty)?

The person holding the ace of trumps fails to play to a trick (which then contains only three cards). When this is discovered, if it is found that the ace of trumps was the card that had to be played in the trick, it is added to the cards previously played but is not counted as winning the trick.

## The coat of many colours

Board 6 in session 4 was a good example of just how much judgment (or blind guessing) is involved in bidding.

Deep Finesse gives 4 making contracts- $4 \AA$, $2 \uparrow$, and $2 N T$ for E-W and $2 v$ for NS.

In the Open A Section 5 pairs were able to play in $2 \boldsymbol{A}$ (two going off) and two in $4 ヶ$ (one making). Nobody was in the other contracts but the 19 pairs between them selected no less than ten contracts.

One played in 5 making; two in $4 \boldsymbol{a}$ (one making), two in 3NT (both making), two in $4 \vee$ (neither making), one in $3 \checkmark$ (not making), two in $3 \boldsymbol{A}$ (not making), one in $2 *$ and one in $2 *$.

In the Womens'B Section there were just seven contracts. Six pairs were in $2 \boldsymbol{A}$ (four making), two were in $4 \%$ (four making), three in $4 \boldsymbol{\wedge}$ (none making), three in 3NT (one making), three in $3 v$ (not making) and two in $3 \boldsymbol{A}$ (not making).
