You need to find a diamond lead initially or cash the $\uparrow \mathrm{A}$ and switch to a diamond. At our table, after the first auction, I led the $\div 5$. South won in dummy and led the $\vee \mathrm{K}$, ace, ruff. A club to dummy was followed by the $\vee \mathrm{Q}$, ditching the
diamond loser.
After the second auction, West led a heart for the same outcome.

Despite its success, the jump to $6 *$ was an out-and-out gamble. Not only might the opponents cash two aces, but the North hand pattern might be 3-3-3-4.

Open datum: N-S 620. Three played in $6 *$, all making, three were in $5 *$ and one N-S pair were in 7 NT doubled for -500 . The last result was a nice $15-\mathrm{Imp}$ gift for the leaders.

Women's datum: N-S 560. Two played in $6 *$, both making. One made twelve tricks in $5 *$ doubled, three were in $5 \star$ and one East-West were 200 in $4 \vee$ doubled.

Seniors datum: N-S 150. One N-S played 6* and made it, two were in $5 \%$, two were in 3 NT failing and one $\mathrm{N}-\mathrm{S}$ pair was one down in 4 A .

You might not like $6 \star$, but it comes quite a way ahead of 3 NT N-S.

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## What's the problem?

Many participants in the ANC will already have 10." seen or heard about the following extract from Peter Gill's report in the May 2009 ABF News- Food for thought in my opinion, even if the Acol letter on the recent Gold Coast Congress and Yeh Bros Cup.
"For me personally, the opportunity to meet and talk to many of the world's best players was invaluable. Just before the Gold Coast Congress, I asked Tony Nunn, who if Playoff Points are the measuring stick, is our top player in recent years, to rank various bidding systems.

He rated all systems (five-card majors and strong notrump, five-card majors and weak notrump, four-card majors and strong notrump, strong club) as 7 or 8 out of 10 , but he rated "four-card majors and weak notrump" only 2 or 3 out of 10 .

I was mildly surprised, so at Broadbeach, I asked Eric Rodwell from USA, perhaps the world's leading bridge theorist, the same question. His answer was almost identical, with the Acol base scoring only 1 or 2 out of 10 , and all other system bases 7 or 8 out of 10 .

The exception was his own Strong Club and fivecard major version, which he rated 9.5 out of
strongholds in southern and Western Australia are surprised by this."

Another way of putting the quoted opinions is that a "natural" system based on four-card majors and a weak no-trump is inevitably well below average but can be improved (to approximately the same degree and) to well above average by changing either
(a) from four-card to five-card majors or
(b) from weak to strong no-trump or
(c) both.

It surely follows that the implied problem with Acol is neither four-card majors nor the weak-no trump but some serious incompatibility between four-card majors and the weak no-trump,

Can anyone who is unsurprised by those opinions, say something about what that incompatibility may be?
