## MATCH OF THE DAY-ACT V. NSW OPEN SERIES

Round 6 of the Open Series saw ACT face New South Wales. My viewpoint is from the Open Room, with Tony Burke – Seamus Browne NS and Elizabeth Havas – Margaret Bourke EW. The first board on the table was Board 8, where the trick is to play slam from the West seat, where &K is protected:

At both tables the contract was 6NT by West, cold for 13 tricks on anything but A lead. There is a show-up squeeze on North after a diamond is cashed at trick two (presuming a neutral heart or spade lead).

Board 9 was a push –  $4 \pm$  down one at both tables (see hand on next page). Bourke's lead in the Open Room was a trump, picking up the queen. Declarer played two rounds of trumps ending in dummy, and played a club to the king and ace. Winning  $\pm A$  was an error, as West, Bourke, was now endplayed. She elected to lead a diamond away from the ace,  $\pm 10$  forcing the queen. If de-



clarer now plays up to both red suit queens in dummy he cannot help but make 10 tricks, but declarer, not sure of the position of •A, banked on •J being onside. He double finessed in clubs to go one down. The lead at the other table was a heart,



and although this means that there are no heart losers any more, one needs to play on double dummy lines to succeed after this lead.



Board 11 saw the first big swing of the match, when Burke, North, dropped Browne in a cuebid:




The 4<sup>±</sup> bid was lost on Burke, who passed it in a flash. After a diamond lead, ducked to East's king, the vicious trump break meant the sub-Moysian was down one, with a grand slam available in three other denominations. 14 IMPs to the ACT.

The next swing board was all about the lead to INT. Holding A1098, J765, 97, Q10, North chose to lead 10 against a weak INT:



On a passive  $\mathbf{D}$  lead the contract has no chance, even with the fortuitous lie of the heart suit. South encourages, and shifts to  $\mathbf{D}$  when in with one of the top diamonds. In the Open Room, Browne bid a natural (Backroom) 2. over the weak notrump in the passout seat, so it was +90 to NSW at both tables, 5 IMPs to NSW.

The next example was all about judgment:




Bourke tried to crowd the auction with her  $5 \cdot$  bid. Burke took the push to  $5 \cdot$ , and when it came back to Bourke she pushed on to the six-level, mentioning her clubs. This was the correct decision, as five

of either major is cold, and thus the par contract is six of either minor, doubled and down one.

Par was not achieved at the other table where North sold out to a direct leap to 5\* by West. The lead was a curious \*4. Declarer lost no time claiming 13 tricks, +440 and 10 IMPs to NSW.

Board 15 was a push, as was Board 16, where neither West felt confident enough to double 3♥, holding ♠93, ♥QJ107, ♦J85, ♠10963 after East had made a takeout double of 1♥, and bid 2♠ over South's weak 2♥ raise, showing a strong hand. When North takes the push to 3♥ in the passout seat, it is hard to imagine a hand where 3♥ could possibly make; nevertheless it was 3♥ down three at both tables. The full hand:



On the next board, both North and South liked their hands too much in the Open Room:



to the jack and king at trick two. He won the heart shift with the ace and cashed a top diamond, discarding a heart from dummy. Another club to dummy's queen and the ace, and a heart return put declarer on table. He elected to play a club, ruffing with  $\pm$ J in hand, as West followed suit.

He now played a spade towards dummy.  $\pm 8$  was covered by  $\pm 10$  and  $\pm A$ . Another heart forced declarer to ruff again in dummy, and now when declarer played a trump off table,  $\pm K9$  was poised over declarer's  $\pm Q3$ . Havas, West, drew trumps and enjoyed  $\pm K$  before having to give declarer the last trick with a top diamond.

+300 and 9 IMPs to ACT on what should be a simple partscore board – at the other table, NS were not tempted past  $2_{\text{e}}$ .

The next major swing was on Board I, where North in the Open Room failed to visualise the strength of the South hand after a delayed game raise auction:



#### I. Fourth suit

Perhaps North was put off by the 2\* bid, expecting more values there. At the start of the set, it was revealed that the NS system methods do not include a strong major suit raise, so Browne was systemically forced to bid this way. With trumps breaking 2-2, nothing defeats 7\*. 11 IMPs to ACT for bidding the small slam.

A spade was led, East winning A and shifting to a low club. Browne won in dummy and played a diamond to the king and a diamond to the queen and ace. West shifted to  $\bullet$ J. Browne put up  $\bullet$ K and when it held, he was able to claim nine tricks.

At the other table, East opened  $1 \cdot$ , so the lead was a low diamond. East won  $\cdot A$  at trick one, and shifted to  $\cdot J$ . Declarer won  $\cdot K$  immediately, instead of ducking once, and now the defence was able to take three hearts and two side suit aces for down one and 10 IMPs to NSW.

65 IMPs thus traded hands on the set, with ACT emerging winners by 35 - 30 IMPs. At the end of Round 6, NSW were still first, while ACT were in third place  $\clubsuit$


