FINALS TIME

hursday night saw two of the six stanzas played in the Open, Women's and Seniors' Finals. On Friday, many players who were no longer involved decided to take advantage of the superb Tassie weather and explore the sights the historic Salamanca area, Mt Wellington, the waterfront, the Cascade brewery tour, lunch at one of the superb restaurants or one of the cruises offering discount packages to players.

Towards the middle of the afternoon, the Seniors Final was almost a fait accompli, with Victoria conceding after the fifth stanza. The ACT Seniors Team have been a class act all week, and deserve their title. The final result: ACT 154, Victoria 54.

The Open was also a one-sided affair, with Western Australia, well behind, determined to stick it out till the end. The final score was New South Wales 176, Western Australia 103.

The Youth Final was close going into the last round, when New South Wales firmly put the accelerator down to overtake Victoria and win by 117-84 IMPs.

The real excitement was in the Women's, where New South Wales had a 50 IMP lead at about the halfway stage, but went into the last stanza 5 IMPs behind archrivals Queensland. In the last stanza,

New South Wales had real chances of reclaiming the lead, but a couple of wrong moves saw them subside 119—103 IMPs.



A subdued but comfortable Vugraph room provided a good way to see what was happening, so we tuned into the last 10 boards of the Women's Final. The two most vital hands we saw were:




- I. Minorwood (to Kalmin)
- 2. 2 Key Cards with no ◆Q (to Kalmin)

With the Queensland NS overboard in 6 (they knew they were missing two Key Cards), it was possible for NSW to take the lead had they stayed at the five-level, either in clubs, diamonds or notrumps. However, an accident occurred. Kalmin intended 4 as Minorwood, while Ichilcik thought she was signing off in notrumps, saying "no major ace to cuebid". An expensive way to find out you're on different wavelengths.

NSW had another chance on the next deal; the NSW EW in one room had stolen the hand in 4. down one, with 4. possible for NS;





This is the auction we saw in the Vugraph Room. East led *A, *K. Declarer ruffed the second diamond, and drew trumps. She played *Q and *J, making it look like she was hoping East held a doubleton *I0 (Tully marked with four hearts). When that did not happen, it looks like she turned her attention to clubs. The best line, which caters for both honours in the East hand, or split honours with West holding a doubleton honour, is *J from hand. When East covers with *K, you will have to decide whether to drop the doubleton queen offside, or play for *Q to be onside. Ichilcik, however, played a club to the I0 and Tully's queen.

There was still one more chance for declarer, when Tully continued with another diamond, forcing out the penultimate trump. Declarer could have discarded a club from dummy on this trick, retaining the heart in dummy, as it now looks unlikely clubs will play for two tricks. Tully actually needed to shift to her low club to defeat declarer at this point.

However, Ichilcik discarded a heart, and the contract was now one down.

In the Vugraph Room, Sue Lusk was astounded Tully had bid I v with five-card diamond support. It shows you can't always trust what you see – the actual auction had been:

WEST	NORTH	EAST	SOUTH
Tully	Ichilcik	Rankin	Kalmin

This makes declarer's line less plausible. It is likely Tully would have shown a four-card heart suit at the one-level.

Congratulations to the finalists in all events. The entire Interstate was played in an atmosphere or camaraderie and bonhomie, and Tasmania can be proud to have hosted such a popular event.



HAND DE JOUR


hand played by one of the stars of the Victorian Youth scene, Justin Howard or Juzz, was brought to my attention. It features a superbly executed squeeze in operation for an extra overtrick in 3NT:

Round 9, Board 16, West deals, EW vulnerable



Justin was playing 3NT from the North seat. The lead was favourable, a low spade around to his *J, West contributing *10. Justin played a club to dummy and advanced *9, losing to East's queen. *9 switch, covered by *10, *J and *K clarified the heart suit for Justin. He played a club to the jack and played *8, going up with the king when West ducked.

A spade finesse, *A, followed by the cashing of the rest of the club suit left this ending:



West still has to discard, and can either unguard the heart suit for the last three tricks, or discard •A for the same effect.





THE PRESSURE WILL GET YOU


hen you're playing for your state—and you're behind at a crucial stage in the Final, it's easy to play too quickly and lose your edge. I witnessed two deals from an early round of the Final where it appears nerves played their part. On the first example, the contract was either a spade game or slam. It was bid and went down at both tables in the Women's match. It was bid by WA but not NSW in the Open; I I IMPs to NSW. It was bid by Victoria but not ACT in the Seniors, and went down due to a fine lead, and it was bid

by NSW in the Youth and went down, while it was not bid by the Victorian Youth.



First trick on this deal is to get to 64 from the West seat, as a diamond through the AQ dooms the contract. Second trick is to get a favourable lead—and from the North hand a heart lead looks pretty safe, although it in fact blows the suit, giving declarer four tricks. The declarer I watched on Vugraph got the favourable lead, but then threw his chance away by playing a spade to the king at the next trick, no doubt ruing his negligence in spurning the safety play in the trump suit.

In fact, I was told all the declarers in 6* played trumps from the top, a sure sign of pressure at a late stage of a long event. Full marks to Anne Powell of the ACT Seniors, who led a club from jack third to give declarer little chance in 6*.



You are in 3NT from the West seat after a spade lead. You hold up A until the third round. If you are in a stable state of mind, you will realize that this nasty contract will roll home only if the diamond suit is favourable. This happens, but at the table where I watched the pair under pressure, declarer played a club to the ace and then played J. This could not possibly work.
