est declared 4♠, and North, Hashmat Ali, led a heart. South, Bal Krishan, took •A,Q, and then carefully exited with a safe ◆K, rather than make a risky club switch.

After winning •A, declarer drew trumps, then had to play the club suit himself. The percentage play is low to the queen. If the queen is captured by the king, then the second chance is to finesse ♣10. But with both club honours poorly placed for declarer, the percentage play fails. Instead, declarer tried the Chinese Finesse of running ♣10 from the closed hand. Ali alertly covered with 4 to defeat 4.

But Deep Finesse says 4♠ makes! How is this so? Deep Finesse, after peeking at all four hands, eschews the percentage play in clubs. Instead, it eliminates the red suits before exiting with a club. Whichever defender wins the trick, they are endplayed into conceding a club trick or a ruff and




North led ± 5 , declarer playing low from dummy, and South's ± 10 forced the ace.

Declarer played a club to North's nine, the queen and South's king, and South played a spade to his partner's king.

North, Richard Hills, exited with ♣5. Declarer won the ace and ran ▼10 to the king, ▼A and ▼3. He continued with ▼J, Hills holding off as South discarded a diamond.

Now declarer cashed ◆A and played ◆9, Hills winning ◆Q. ◆K was cashed, and on ◆J exit from Hills this was the four-card end position:



If declarer had ruffed with •8 and exited with •5, a stepping stone to dummy would have been achieved. However, we can probably work out that declarer was not quite up to this. He won all his heart tricks, but lost both club tricks in the endgame for down one.

▼5 was led and Tim inserted ▼Q, covered by the king and ruffed in hand. A low trump to the jack was allowed to hold, and now ▼10 was led, declarer discarding a spade when South refused to cover. ▼2 was led, covered and ruffed with ♣Q and overruffed with ♣A. ◆8 shift ran to the king and a deluge of clubs followed, which squeezed South to a pulp.


In the four-card ending, dummy held •A9 and •AJ, while South had to shed his spades to hold •J8 and •Q10. Now •A was cashed, and South thrown in with •Q to lead into the heart tenace for the contract.

Both the ANC Open and Women's Teams were won by New South Wales in 1973.





perched behind Pauline Evans as two forms of NSW Standard played each other. Board I came halfway through the match, and by this time I think Evans felt comfortable enough to be able to essay a slightly shaded INT overcall on the South hand:




Deep Finesse says NS can't make INT, but it looked pretty easy after Bates led her own suit, and Giura shifted to a spade after cashing her heart honours. Declarer's task is much harder on a diamond lead. Anyway, 3 IMPs to NS.


On the next board, the NS pair bid aggressively to a vulnerable game which could not be beaten:



1. 5+ diamonds

Although nominally Standard, Nevena and Pauline's style appears more Polish Club, with a strong notrump and I♣ as short as a singleton. Djurovic accepted Evans' invitation, and there was not too much of a problem in the play when Bates started with ♠A before switching to ♦10, +620 and 10 IMPs to NS when the defence slopped a trick.

I. Non-forcing


A good defence here would be to cash one top diamond, getting count from partner and shifting to a spade to knock out dummy's entry before •] is established. As declarer has bid their own suit over the non-forcing 2• bid, it would be unlucky to find you were leading around to a doubleton queen. To cater for that, however, maybe you

should shift to &K at trick two.

None of this happened, of course. Bates cashed two top diamonds, and then sacrificed one of her partner's trumps by playing a third round of diamonds. Declarer should have discarded her losing spade on this trick, but instead won VJ, and now she was booked for one down—she actually went two down when she mispicked the clubs, cashing ace and playing a club towards dummy. An errorstrewn board (sorry, ladies).

On the next board, EW got most of the IMPs for the match when Giura followed the principle "If it looks like a slam, bid a slam" after very reasonable preemption made it impossible to find out what she needed to know.

I like Djurovic's 4• bid—not too much, not too little. It is more likely that East would jump to 6• over a 5• bid. Bates's good hand evaluation in opening 1• earned EW 10 IMPs when she was able to ruff the second club, after •A lead and encouragement from Evans.

Board 6 was a puzzling 6 IMPs to NS for bidding a fairly standard heart game missed by the rest of the field, looking at the datum of +200 NS. In the Open field, the datum was about the same, and when I looked at the scores in the Open, many Norths must have opened a weak notrump in fourth seat, because of the doubleton spade.


Board 8 was a push at 3NT making, when the power of the Closed Hand meant it was hard for West to find a heart switch after starting with *J. The entire Women's field let 3NT make, when game should be down, either in 3NT or 5*.

The last big swing of the match was on the next deal, where I think hand evaluation was a major part of the EW loss:

Women's Butler St. 2, Round 9, Bd. 9, North deals, EW vul.



Giura has a stronger hand than many I've seen opened over the last couple of weeks, and it conforms to the Rule of 20 (HCP + number of cards in the two longest suits).

Bates should have at least invited, if partner can pass with a hand of this magnitude. After Evans led a passive •8, Giura wrapped up 11 tricks without losing a sweat to lose 9 IMPs, in a match won by the NS pair 33—17 IMPs.


