This deal showed good judgement by TravisBerman. Perhaps North should have bid a I-2-3Stop $3 \vee$ over South's $2 v$, but bidding $4 \vee$ over Berman's cue raise in spades was clearly an overstatement of her hand; if Travis had passed this, Berman could have collected 800 from $4 \vee$ doubled.

A difference in signalling style led to a EW disaster on Board 2, although Berman possibly missed the boat by not taking any action in third seat. The only game is an EW $4 \vee$. As the auction went, it was impossible for Travis to judge Berman's shape with only two suits in play (spades from the bidding and diamonds by implication).
Travis thought long and hard about saving over 4a, but with her three likely tricks in her own hand, decided against it.
On $»$ A lead, Berman played her lowest diamond, when a highish diamond might have suggested a heart switch. On the diamond continuation, Maynard shed a heart loser, and conceded a heart and a trump trick. +580 to NS.

My inclination would be to enquire with 2NT; in my partnerships treatment, South would bid $3 v$, a maximum with spades and clubs. If I didn't have that toy in my arsenal, I would bid 5\& (pass or correct). A pass or correct 3\&? Not for me. The table score was +150 NS, but the datum was +390 NS.
There is an amusing aside to this hand. In the Open Butler, Julian Foster was defending 2^ by South (the bid didn't show another suit). With spade length, he wanted to play a forcing defence, so tried the effect of an underlead of $\vee \mathrm{A}$ at trick one. This whistled around to South's singleton v Q. Declarer crossed to a diamond honour at trick
two and played a spade to $\$ 10$ and Foster's $\downarrow$. A further underlead of $\vee A(\vee \mid 0)$ was ducked by declarer, and now the force was back in force! 2a was now one down, as Deep Finesse claimed it should be all along.
Academic with 3NT and 5* making contracts, but still amusing for EW.
Another well-judged move by Travis led to a plus score on the next board. Holding aKQ93, v I064, -942, eAK8 with all vulnerable and in fourth seat, she chose to double North's I opening bid. South bid Iv, Berman bid la and North bid INT.

Travis passed this, but when South bid $2 v$, Travis competed with $2 a$, and South took the push to $3 v$, one down. The datum was +100 NS , with many EW pairs never entering the auction, even though it is their hand, with spade partials cold for nine tricks.

[^0]competed with 2 s , and South took the push to 3 h , one down. The datum was +100 NS, with many I'm not sure whether to put this hand in the 'lost opportunity' or 'comedy of errors' bracket.
Travis led $\& 6$, declarer put in $\& 10$ and won Berman's $\&$ with the queen. It looks fairly simple to play a round or two of trumps, find they break, draw trumps and run sl0 from the North hand. Declarer, however, seemed intent on going down. She crossed to $\vee A$ at trick two, crossed back to her top club at the next trick, played $\vee \mathrm{Q}$, ruffing when Travis did not cover.

Now, the earlier misplay meant that declarer was poorly placed. She tried a spade towards the Closed Hand. Berman went up with the king, but couldn't believe that declarer would have played this way with three clubs. She came back a spade, allowing declarer to breathe a sigh of relief, draw trumps and claim.
With 6* cold, this was a lost opportunity for EW, and as the datum read +990 NS, it was also a loss.
On the next few boards NS kept collecting IMPs by bidding their games. They did well to reach 5d on the penultimate board of the set:
