Therese Tully had dominated Table I for most of the two days of play.












OPEN & WOMEN'S BUTLER DAY 2

On the first board of the set (towards the end of the set as I watched), Lowry, who had not been happy with the quality of her hands, ended in 2 with \$\structup\$ 19876 opposite \$\times 432\$. All was well, however, when hearts broke —and we were treated to a smile.



Folkard led a low heart. Hoffman had a plan; either spades breaking or the club finesse working. She rose ♥A, cashed ♠K and played a spade to the ace, getting the bad news. More bad news when the club finesse failed.

"Too sad, too bad" said Julia. A new mantra to add to the repertoire.

Board 15, South deals, NS vul




After the match, NS discussed the ramifications of confirming a fit with the South hand after East interferes with 2 + ... A possible treatment is to bid 3 + ... with a minimum, and double to show a maximum. Hoffman was worried a 3 + ... bid would show a maximum, so passed, but was happy to bid 5 + ... when Thompson confirmed she had a good hand with her double of 4 + ...

The line in 6♥ would be to play on clubs, planning to discard two diamonds from the South hand. As it happens, running ♣J picks up the club suit.

Lowry was lucky her side was not pinged in this inelegant contract. Her opponents were probably not expecting the sort of hand she put down, and Hoffman was also a third in hand I • opener. On a diamond lead and continuation, Folkard won the second diamond and played a spade to the jack and Hoffman's queen. Now the defence could have taken the contract four down, but when Hoffman returned •9 at the next trick, Thompson won •A and shifted to a heart. When Hoffman put in •J, she could have underled her ace for the spade ruff, but she probably expected Thompson to have five spades not to give her a ruff when in with •A. Three down was a flat board, another example of an opportunity lost.



Sydney expert Kieran Dyke told me last week that he has been coaching some of the youth players. One of the important lessons he had got through to them was to *always bid game* in notrumps on invitational hands.

Thompson was showing a 15-18 range, and I think Hoffman must have been listening in to Dyke (or maybe David Hoffman).

3NT was cold—but Thompson did have a very good hand. 9 IMPs to NS.

6 more IMPs for Hoffman and Thompson's enterprise on the next deal:



Thompson led **v**K, **v**J against 2**v** doubled, and NS took their six tricks on defence. Deep Finesse states NS can make 3NT, a very tricky proposition, requiring good views in hearts and clubs.

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

Dynamic duo Ashley Bach—Nabil Edgtton (who won Stage I of the Butler) faced the partnership of Arjuna de Livera —lan Robinson in Match 8.

Bach thought Edgtton's was showing a stronger hand, as his partnerships normally employ a Black-out 2NT bid to show a weak hand over opener's reverse. The only making NS game is 5.—and declarer must play a diamond to the jack and queen, later finessing West for •10.

Bach needed ◆K singleton, and ♠K doubleton onside to make 3NT. ◆J was the wrong singleton honour, and Bach was two down when he continued diamonds. 6 IMPs to EW.

Ashley Bach is in a different partnership for this event—Ishmael Del'Monte, his regular partner is in Toronto, playing in the North American Bridge Championships, In the final of the Spingold, TEAM MONACO, Pierre Zimmermann, Franck Multon, Fulvio Fantoni, Claudio Nunes, Tor Helness and Geir Helgemo are facing NICKELL, Nick Nickell, Ralph Katz, Zia Mahmood, Meckwell and Bob Hamman. The score at the halfway stage is 75–60 to Team Monaco.

NS were back in the positives when de Livera chose to try 3NT, holding ♠A852, ♥Q872, ♦J62, ♠86 when Robinson had opened I♣ and rebid an invitational 3♣—one down on the normal diamond lead from South.

On Board 16, Bach reached 3•, and made with an overtrick for a small pickup—a trump switch and continuation by East at some stage would have led to only nine tricks for declarer.

On Board 17, NS bought the contract in 2\(\pm\) to record a zero IMP differential, as did INT making two on the next board.

The big swing of the match was on the next contentious deal:

At the favourable vulnerability, Bach explained to EW that the opener could be quite weak, and possibly contain only a five-card suit.


Despite this, Robinson elected to come into the bidding with his marginal hand. Bach waited to see which juicy spot his opponents would land in before he started doubling.

Deep Finesse states that EW can make I &, so de Livera's first bid was their best spot. He ran a level higher, not expecting to find doubleton diamond support opposite.

Edgtton led \$10, covered and won by Bach's king. Bach switched to a heart to clarify the defensive position. De Livera went up with VK to play \$10, ducked, and a second club, won by Bach. Bach now cashed \$A\$ and gave Edgtton a ruff with \$10. On a high club from dummy, Bach ruffed in with \$A\$ to play a fourth round of spades, promoting Edgtton's \$|.

Four down was +1100 for NS, on a deal where it was likely Edgtton would have gone down in 3. Robinson admitted to being a turkey on this deal, and I thought I saw de Livera nod slightly in agreement.

A few quiet boards was followed by:



I. Jacoby style raise; four card trump support

This hand is not a good advertisement for Jacoby, where opener bids a suit at the three-level to show a shortage, a bid at the four-level to show a source of tricks in the second suit, and takes it slowly on good hands.

Edgtton downgraded his boring II-count with no shape, not knowing what jewels he had for partner.

In retrospect, a 4 Splinter just might get the bidding warmed up; South can cuebid 4 below game level, and this will encourage North to move.
