
Match 2—Women's Butler Stage 2 Tucker—Bourke v. Lusk—Tully

Tully led a heart to Lusk's ace. She returned $\checkmark 5$. Tucker rose $\checkmark K$ and played off all six diamonds, squeezing everybody at the table, including herself. In the endgame, declarer abandoned $\checkmark 10$ and came down to $\triangle AQ$ and her clubs. Lusk's last discard had been ≥ 10 . Reading the situation, Tucker played a spade to the ace, dropping Tully's king and scoring $\ge Q$ for her ninth trick.

Tucker started the defence with a diamond lead, giving nothing away. Lusk won A in dummy, and played a trump to the 10 and Tucker's queen. Tucker exited a diamond, won by Lusk in hand. She ruffed 9 in dummy and played another heart to the jack and Tucker's ace. Tucker persisted with 9, which Lusk won with Q, as she discarded a spade from hand. Now it was down to the right guess in spades. Lusk played a spade to the queen and was thus down; 6 IMPs to NS.


The Pearson Count would suggest a fourth in hand pass with the East hand (HCP + number of spades needs to equal 15 or more).

Once Lusk balanced with 3th it was easy for Tully to bid 3NT, and with a blueprint of the hand layout, she played carefully and thoughtfully to make 10 tricks for an 8 IMP gain.

With nothing good happening for Lusk, declarer in 4♠ on the next deal, NS scored 4 IMPs for a one trick defeat.

Tully played the next 4 contract well:




Bourke led a low spade, won by Tully with A. She played a heart to the jack and Bourke's queen. Tully won the spade continuation with AK and drew trumps. Now she played a diamond to the

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king and Tucker's ace. Tucker cashed $\mathbf{A}\mathbf{Q}$ before switching to a club. Tully rose ace, crossed to dummy in clubs and finessed \$10 for 10 tricks; 3 IMPs to EW.

Board 22, East deals, EW vul



Here Tully paid a heavy price for her vulnerable one-level overcall. NS came after her with all guns blazing in the Moysian fit EW escaped to; not a comfortable place to be, missing all four honours.

Bourke led a heart to South's ace and a heart came back to Tully's king. She tried \mathbf{AQ} , which Bourke jumped on, to lead $\mathbf{v}Q$. Tully had no tricks to cash, and drawing trumps was not an option either.

Tucker, in with a low diamond ruff of a top spade exited with &K, on which Bourke discarded a spade. On a club towards ♣]10, Tucker rose with $\mathbf{A}\mathbf{Q}$, and played another club. The defence were now able to score their five remaining trump tricks separately on a defensive crossruff for +1100.




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Match 3—Open Butler Stage 2 Ewart—Howe v. Edgtton—Bach

I was only present for part of this match, in which there were not a great deal of major swings.

Towards the end of the set, Bach made an innocent-enough bid which had at least one of the players at the table looking at him with suspicion:



Here is what I think was going through Neil Ewart's mind as the bidding progressed: "Ashley has a fit in diamonds, and he has bid partner's suit to muddy the waters".

Howe intended $3 \lor$ to show a strong Michaels Cuebid, spades and a minor, and as a kibitzer, I knew he had spades and clubs.

Now Edgtton went into a huddle for several minutes. He was not sure either whether Ashley was psyching or not, but made the value bid of 5, trusting partner to have a partial diamond fit.

Poor old Ashley—the heart slam is cold, but nobody was willing to trust his bidding.


Ewart blithely corrected $5 \pm$ to $6 \vee$, with his fixed idea that Ashley was psyching. Edgtton had seen enough. He doubled, and led $\vee K$. Howe ruffed and played a top spade. On winning $\pm A$ Edgtton continued hearts; declarer was two down for -300.

I heard a sad tale at another table on this deal.

South made a Lightner Double of 6, after showing a black two-suiter. So what did North lead?

9, picking up South's king. Such is our game!

A rare defensive error by Edgtton on this deal led to a positive for NS in their precarious contract. NS are cold for all sorts of contracts, including 4NT, but 3¢ is not one of them.

Bach led his singleton heart, to $\mathbf{v} \mid \mathbf{0}, \mathbf{v} \mid \mathbf{a}$ and $\mathbf{v} \mid \mathbf{A}$. With no quick way to dummy, and the likelihood of a defensive ruff coming up, Ewart played a diamond to dummy's jack and Edgtton's queen. Instead of giving Bach his ruff, Edgtton switched to his singleton $\mathbf{A} \mathbf{Q}$. Declarer was home.



Howe led a diamond from the South seat, as declarer ruffed. I watched Neil finger +K, unblocking to lead a diamond through dummy's tenace, then +9. Back and forwards they went in his fingers until he changed his mind—and discarded a club!

He was obviously thinking about the next trick.
