You lead ♣7: queen – four – two. Declarer plays ♥ 2: seven – ten – king. How do you continue?











Try this problem—answer



Against 2♥, after ♣7 lead, won by ♣Q and a heart to the ten and king, West can see that there are no club tricks for the defence (♣A at trick I might have made life tougher for you if East cannot give a clear discouraging signal). At most, you can collect one diamond and it looks like there are no more heart tricks. You have to play East to be strong in spades. Either KQx or KJx is good enough. Switch to ♣4. East takes ♠Q, ♠K and plays a third spade to you. Your fourth spade is ruffed with ♥J, which promotes a trump trick for you and declarer is one down.

TESTAMENT TO PARTNER'S DECLARER PLAY

Australian Butler Pairs, Match 6, Board 4, West deals, EW vul



Playing 1430 Key Card, Di bids 7♥ after finding I have three Key Cards + one extra king.

East lead ♠10, Di puts down dummy, and I go into "here we go again mode".

First emotion —
"B...er!!!" Then

me: "Never,
never give up!"

Here goes—a hand for all the Christchurch earthquake victims! After thinking for aeons, I won A. I drew



trumps in three rounds, cashed A and crossed to dummy, throwing I on the third diamond and a small club on the last diamond.

Now I cashed A and my two remaining hearts. Now a club to the king and A was miraculously high, both opponents believing my A falsecard and both desperately holding onto a club.

By the way, eight is my lucky number!

After the hand was finished, I quietly mentioned to my adorable partner "Next time you ask for kings and find there is one missing, please reconsider bidding seven."

Di replied: "But you play the cards so well, pard". One shakes one's head and moves onwards and upwards.


MAKE THE PRACTICAL BID

Open Butler Stage 2, Match 6, Board 12, West deals, NS vul ♠ J 10 5 A J 9 8 2 • Q92 **♣** 85 943 ΑK K 3 Q654 A 10864 **♦** 53 AK97643 - 1 Q8762 107 KJ7 ♣ Q 10 2

I watched a very experienced pair bid the EW hands (Pass)- I♣; I♦ (showing hearts)-3♣, All Pass. Surely the practical bid on this hand, where partner has passed is 3NT?


Bill Haughie produced a nice line to land 5♣ on Board 10, Stage 2, Match 1:



- 1. Either diamonds or both majors
- I, ♥A, ruffed
- 2. **♣**K
- 3. **♦**Q, run to **♦**K
- 4. Diamond to the ace.

Now, given the auction, South knows that West started with 5-5 in the majors and East began with jack fourth in clubs.

- 5. ♠4, West takes the king
- 6. West plays ♥K and dummy ruffs, leaving this ending:



Declarer cashed ♣Q and simply ran the diamonds. East was skewered. Datum: NS 230. No one else in the Open was in 5♣. There were four pairs in 5♦, three making (once making doubled and once one off doubled). Women's datum: NS 210. One was in 5♣ making, one in 5♦ doubled making and one EW pair made 4♥.

1. Asks partner to bid six with club control

Whose fault is it that NS missed their opportunity to cash out for one down on this deal? South's, for not bidding 3♦ for the lead, expecting EW to end in 4♠, or North for cashing ♠A at trick one and continuing clubs, playing for partner to hold a singleton club and ♠A?

I leave it to you to decide.

This contract made on the nose for a terrible Butler score of –670.

This one is easier, I believe. East doesn't quite have his double of 2NT, which says he can penalize one of North's suits at the three-level, and he surely doesn't have his second double.
