HOW'S THIS FOR LONGEVITY?

A little birdie has informed me that **Tony Jackman** (Queensland Seniors' Team)
has now been attending Australian National
Championships for 50 years.
Congratulations Tony.
That's some record!

(I started in 1979 so encompass five decades but 50 years will take me to 2029, seemingly years away.)

QUEENSLAND v VICTORIA OPEN

Round 1, Match 1

North: Pete Evans (Qld)
South: Rosie Green (Qld)
East: Ben Kingham (Vic)
West: Neil Ewart (Vic)

The match started with a few tame boards, allowing the players to settle into the event. Blood started to flow (potentially) from Board 4:

J972 Α Q10 Q109542 KQ6 A8543 K109 J7642 K753 A2 K73 J 10 Q853 J9864 A86

WEST EAST 1D 1S

1NT (12-14) 2C (2-way checkback) 2D 2H (invitational)

4S Pass

Seeing all four hands, the contract looked doomed. At the table, a different situation arose. South led the S10, and declarer cashed three top trumps, then led a heart from hand to finesse the H10. North won the HA and exited with a club which South won. The next club was won with dummy's CK. At this point it looked to me that South was going to be squeezed in the red suits if a club was ruffed (she had already had to discard one diamond and one club on the trumps).

The beauty of bridge is that people find different ways to survive. Ben Kingham led to his DA to finesse again in hearts, finding the bad break. When North didn't ruff either the H10 or the HK, he was home without the squeeze. He simply eloped with his trumps. After the hearts, he ruffed a club to hand, crossed back to dummy's DK and ruffed another diamond, for 5 trump tricks, 2 hearts, 2 diamonds and 1 club.

With the other table playing 3S making, this was 10 IMPs to Victoria.

I found Board 5 fascinating. Deep Finesse says that 3NT always makes but I think the defence can challenge declarer:

AQ1092 J65 K984 J 8765 KJ4 A9743 82 Q3 J762 93 AQ52 3 KQ10 A105 K108764

South played 3NT on the H4 lead. At trick 2, Rosie Green led a small club to dummy's CJ. East won the CQ rather quickly and returned a heart. At this stage declarer had few problems, given the C9 dropped doubleton. However, if East ducks the CJ declarer has not got the entries to hand to establish the club suit and it looks like 3NT should fail.

3NT failed twice (and 2NT failed once) but it made four times. In this match, it was just another flat board.

Big hands are difficult enough to bid without the constant pre-empts we encounter. In the first three matches there were several very big hands where the opponents had opportunities to make the opponents' lives more difficult and, sometimes, easier. You hold:

AKJ
5
AKQJ93

PARTNER WEST YOU EAST
Pass 2D (a) X Pass (a)
Pass 2H

2D was a mini-Multi (3-7 HCP), East's Pass showed diamonds and South's Pass also showed diamonds! So now you have to find a sensible way to bid your monster. I liked Pete Evans's practical solution, given he knew partner had 'some' values to make a penalty pass of 2DX, which was to bid 6C now. This made in comfort when partner held:

Q64 10982 K10743 10

East held, and led, the DA so this was an easy contract. If West had passed, 2DX goes for 800 on optimal defence.

Queensland won the match by 20 IMPs.

SOUTH AUSTRALIA v ACT SENIORS Round 1, Match 2

Although the South Australians won this match by 38 IMPs, I thought the boards were rather flat and unexciting.

Two boards surprised me: Board 11

AJ1094	KQ7
AQJ	K83
A1075	KQ9
5	J983

On this hand, 6S is a good contract but you have to pick to finesse North for Jxxxx in diamonds, which is an unlikely option. My surprise is that so many of the 6S contracts made.

And on Board 13 (all vul) you hold:

6 52 KQ1063 Q5432

If your partner opened 2H, showing hearts and another suit (presumably at least 5/5 when vulnerable), would you bid 4NT if your RHO overcalled 4S? [I can't believe that people thought partner might hold spades.] Surely you would save if 2H showed hearts and a minor? There were barely any 5C saves taken. Perhaps it is indicative that Multi 2s are losing favour or that Constructive 2-Majors are popular in this field, along with 'Specific Two Bids' (spades and another suit.



3C STORIES

First of all we have the story of the "Whibley 3C bid". A few years ago, Michael decided that a 3C opening bid, at favourable vulnerability, just showed any weak hand with 4+ clubs. It was a bid designed to make everyone guess.

One night, Wil Keyte was playing with a youngster who was keen to use the bid. He explained it to Wil who thought it sounded like fun. In fact, he thought it was so much fun that he couldn't wait to use the bid. He opened a Whibley 3C bid OUT OF TURN!

Even Michael was astounded by this turn of events; sure, he wanted chaos at the table but he hadn't anticipated such a usage.

Today, I was told about insufficient 3C bids in country town bridge clubs. Apparently you should never allow the opponents to escape on this infraction. After all, if they have to correct to 4C then they are using an artificial bid, since they all play 4C as Gerber. So, if you make the opponent correct the bid, their partner will be barred for the remainder of the auction. (I must admit I'd never thought about that.)

And lastly, try this auction:

1S 3C (alerted)

3NT 4C

4S 69

After partner led a heart, where I held AKJxx, I asked about the auction, to be told that 3C was "Mini Gerber".

3NT therefore showed 3 aces - although that became first-round controls when my heart was ruffed. 4C was more Gerber, with declarer showing 2 second-round controls.

When both the SK and CK were offside (and I held the HK already), I concluded that declarer had shown his void as both a first-round control AND second-round control.

Don't worry, I don't plan to play Mini Gerber ever.



VICTORIA v WESTERN AUSTRALIA YOUTH Round 1, Match 3

North: Justin Howard South: Pete Hollands East: Rhys Cooper West: Michael Bausor

I didn't watch all of this match, but the six boards I saw generated plenty of IMPs. Rhys Cooper and Michael Bausor play Forcing Pass, where openings are limited to 8-12 HCP (with various specific meanings) and 1H opening bid shows 0-7 HCP (any hand except those that involve preemptive bids).

We started with Board 8, where West played 5DX holding:

5	opposite	AKQJ10
2		K9543
AKJ98765		42
753		J

This failed by a trick when North-South cashed their two top winners and North had a trump trick. Several declarers were allowed to make 5D on the lead of HJ, when South tried to cash a second heart rather than leading a club. In the Youth, one East even made 4S!

In this match, at the other table, East-West played in 3NT (either it was Gambling without the solid suit, or a pre-empt of 4-minor unwisely left in). This sad contract failed by 6 tricks for 5 IMPs to WA.

Things were sedate for a couple of boards, even if the auctions were contorted if East-West got to 'open' the bidding. Justin Howard and Pete Hollands had spent some time developing a comprehensive defence to the artificial methods and knew what they were doing.

I'm no fan of Specific Two Bids, so I'll just say that on Board 11 they got their just desserts.

Nil vulnerable, South opened 2D to show diamonds and spades (at least 4/4) on:

QJ632 103 Q974 108



When North decided to respond 3C, natural and nonforcing, with:

they were in trouble. East made a take-out double with his balanced 20-count, and West opted to pass for penalties. The rescue mission to 3DX was Unsuccessful, failing by 5 tricks (although it could have been 1400).

6H can make on the East-West hands, but when team -mates failed in some high-NT contract this was 15 IMPs away.

The next hand was a cold grand slam for North-South but Pete and Justin had an accident and stopped in game. I'm not going to give credit to Rhys's baby psyche in response to his partner's 2H opening bid, because it actually left them plenty of space to explore and/or show their hands better. However, they were unlucky that the WA Youth pair at the other table were one of two pairs in the four fields to actually bid to 7D so that was 17 IMPs to WA.

The auction started:

Does 4D retain its meaning as a big hand after partner's double of 2NT? I think this is something most partnerships would not have discussed.

Western Australia blitzed Victoria by 72 IMPs to move up the field.


