

MEMORIES MAY BE BEAUTIFUL

Croco-dill continues his memories:

"A strange, young, completely but pleasantly mad John Steele arrived in town and took me to Canberra where I was completely dazed and bewildered by all the gadgets people used.

For the Ansett Teams, a group described as 'aggressive' were one short and he asked me to fill in. Me, the most gutless (?) passer in bridge history, to fill in—what a joke. Yes, I was so timid that my partner had to keep bidding; we came second by a whisker. Great trauma but not a patch on the first game...

Where I sat South and had Australia's great man on my right and his revered partner on my left. These men had been the subject of so much of my reading that my leg began to shake, my face froze into an inane grin and whatever little I knew of the game disappeared as I lapsed into a come of bolus hystericus.

I opened: 1C P 1H P 2C P 4C P

I was an absolute nervous wreck at this stage and blurted out, "I should probably alert 4C as I have no idea what it means." How embarrassing it that? I still blush at the memory.

Anyhow, I bid 5C and Steele went 6C. As in all good bridge stories, the Rabbit has to have their day—instead of playing in our 5-5 club fit, I chose to bid 6H and hearts broke 3-3 so we took IMPs off Seres and Cummings.

Don't condemn stupidity because there is always a chance.

Whilst nothing could surpass watching Seres and Cummings play, there were many others who were marvellous to watch.

Imagine sitting between the Borins? How 'four-bidding' is that?



I had the classic Mollo-ian rabbit moment when I reached this end-position:

AQ

Needing two more tricks for my contract, I planned to cross to dummy with the club to take the spade finesse. I had forgotten that there was a trump still out AND that it was higher than mine, so when I led my carefully preserved C6, Jim (my LHO) was forced to win his C9 and led into my spades. Having learnt to fake disinterest so young, I accepted his congratulations and revelled in the look of amazement on my partner's face.


Ah.... the power of memory."

Ann Paton (TAS) recalls her first bridge session, now appreciating that her lack of knowledge led to minibrilliancies.

Defending 1NT, she held AQJx so led the Queen. Dummy tabled Kxx in that suit, and declarer ducked. She continued with the Jack, again winning. Now she knew enough to cash her Ace and small card. Having run out of that suit, she switched to another Queen, and again dummy held the Kxx. Her Queen won, so she continued with her Jack. That won too, so once again she cashed her Ace and the small card.

She just thought that bridge was a fun game!

THE BRIDGE BOYS ON THE LOOSE

I had already decided to investigate Board 13 from Round 10 when I heard this lovely story.

The Bridge Boys were playing against Forcing Pass. West Boy (Ed Burrowes) held the following hand:

The minute Ed made the bid he realised there was a small problem—they hadn't agreed any trump suit yet. His other problem was that 4D would be natural, so he had no cuebid available. As such, over whatever his partner replied he was forced to settle in 6C.

I had already heard one SA Open Team auction, where East had opened 1NT. They now had the opportunity to reach 7H (or perhaps 7C) but only if they played EKCB, which they don't.

That is one way to bid to the grand. They had to settle in 6H as a result of bidding limitations.

Now for an auction on the same hand where South was the opening bidder (we have already had North and East open the bidding):

I'm not keen on East's 4H bid—I would rather bid 4D over the 3D bid, but the outcome was reasonably successful.

The hand obviously caused players problems, especially for those who started by overcalling South's 1D opening with 2C.

They played 1NTXX and claimed 9 tricks at trick 1.



The problem arose when South didn't know what North's 4NT bid meant so bashed the grand on the basis he had all the aces.


Rhys Cooper and Michael Bausor also had a mishap. When you are playing Forcing Pass and all the relay bids, you simply cannot afford to make an insufficient bid—once an insufficient bid is artificial your partner is barred from the remainder of the auction. Therefore Rhys (South) punted 3NT and that was that.

In the Open field, no one bid the grand slam, with 3 pairs playing in game.

In the Women's field, everyone bid to slam, with Karen Creet and Sheila Bird bidding the excellent 7D. In the Seniors, only 2 pairs bid small slam, the others playing game.

And the exuberance of Youth show 2 pairs bidding the grand—Ella Pattison and Jamie Thompson bid to 7D and Renee Cooper and Kirsty Fuller bid to the slightly inferior 7S. Well done. On the other hand, the less experienced Youth pairs played in game 3 times, so only one pair bid the small slam.

THE YOUTH FIELD

Peter Gill has provided us with an insight into the players in the Interstate Youth Teams.

VICTORIA

Spearheaded by Justin Howard and Peter Hollands, Victoiria are the favourites to win the event. Juzz and Pete took on a bevy of Open world champions three months ago in Japan at the NEC Cup and Yeh Cup, qualifying easily in each event before losing to the eventual winners in close finals matches. The back-up cast consists of three players with international experience in 2012 (and earlier, in some cases) - Ellena Moskovsky, Jamie Thompson and Ella Pattison - and Peter Bolling who did well in the final ten pairs in the national Under 25 selection event in January.

WESTERN AUSTRALIA

Defending champions WA have the Forcing Pass pair, Rhys Cooper—Michael Bausor, with Year 12 student Renee Cooper, from last year's Australian Under 20 team which made the quarter-finals at the World Championships, and Kirsty Fuller (now living in Manchester, UK) who won this event a year ago. Tom and Ailsa Peacock are relative newcomers, with Ailsa apparently learning bridge only a month ago!

SOUTH AUSTRALIA

SA won the first round robin. Playing captain Shane Harrison won the Asia Pacific Under 21 Teams Championship in 2011 and his former long-term partner Sam Schulz has returned to bridge this year. Jessie De Garis and George Evans finished 2nd in the ANOT Restricted Teams two months ago. Jarrad Dunbar from Whyalla has been around for a few years and is partnering David Gue, from a rather well-known bridge pedigree.

ACT

Stephen Williams was in the same team as Shane, winning the APBF Under 21 in 2011. His partner is Zaiga Thomann, one of his many friends he has taught to play bridge. John Yoon is the main organiser of the ANU Bridge Club and also organises an annual youth invasion of the Batemans Bay Bridge Congress every March. The other three players are ANU players with Andrew Spooner's father, John, won the bronze medal at the World Juniors 20 years ago.

NEW SOUTH WALES

NSW and Queensland are relatively inexperienced teams. Tomer Libman is the youngest player, aged 14, and has a bright future. His partner Natasha Jacobs played for Scotland's Under 21 team some time ago, used to live in Glasgow, but has Australian parents and, for some reason, prefers our climate. She's a geologist who has worked in Broken Hill and Cobar. Ed Burrowes and James Ferguson (aka 'the Bridge Boys') are Sydney Uni students who finished 2nd in the Interstate Youth Teams last year. Alan Stoneham and Stephen Guo learnt bridge about 9 months ago and are the Sydney Boys High students mentioned in yesterday's article—in other words, they learnt to play bridge after the school banned all card games because cards are evil.

QUEENSLAND

Only Jessica Brake and Chris Larter have previous experience, having played for the State last year. Their respective partners are Russell Skellerton and Andrew Gosney (no relation to Paul, we are told). The team is rounded out by Angus Gray and Anastasia Mulcahy (who is related to ABF Marketing Manager, Sandra).

THE FUTURE

Although Australia came 4th in the World Under 25s and 5th in the World Under 20s last year, turnover rates (mainly due to age limit issues) are high in youth bridge. Due to Year 12 unavailability and the like, only one player, Renee Cooper, is likely to be in next year's Under 20 team, with most of the five newcomers probably coming from teams here in Adelaide.

The Under 25 team will continue to be selected at Youth Week in January. It's a great week and anyone interested in attending should check out the details on the ABF website or contact the Youth Coordinator, David Thompson.
