

AUTUMN NATIONALS 2019

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1 General

1.1 The Autumn Nationals (AN) comprises eight events:

- AN Open Swiss Pairs (ANOSP)
- AN Seniors Swiss Pairs (ANSSP)
- AN Women's Swiss Pairs (ANWSP)
- AN Under Life Master Swiss Pairs (ANULMSP)
- AN Open Teams (ANOT)
- AN Under Life Master Teams (ANULMT)
- AN Consolation Teams (ANCT)
- AN Graded Pairs (ANGP)

The Swiss Pairs events will be held on 2 – 3 May, the ANOT and ANULMT on 4 - 5 May, with the ANCT, ANGP and Final of the ANOT on 6 May. These events are conducted by the South Australian Bridge Federation Inc (SABF) under licence from the Australian Bridge Federation (ABF) in accordance with the ABF Tournament Regulations (ABF TR) as augmented by these Supplementary Regulations.

1.2 The venue is the Ridley Centre, Adelaide Showgrounds, Goodwood Road, Wayville.

1.3 Players must use the methods and equipment in the manner specified by the Chief Tournament Director (CTD) or Tournament Organiser (TO). Players must record the score for each board after it is played and before the commencement of the next board. It is an offence to leave the table at the conclusion of a match without first confirming the completeness and validity of the data entered into the scoring unit. Every player present at the table is equally responsible for the accuracy of the scores.

1.4 Smoking is not permitted in any area inside the Ridley Centre. Breach of this regulation incurs a disciplinary penalty (see 6.3).

1.5 Mobile telephones, iPads, iPods and other electronic communication equipment must be switched off during session time. Breach of this regulation incurs a disciplinary penalty, after one warning (see 6.3).

1.6 Mobile telephones, iPads and other electronic communication equipment may not be consulted or used during the session, unless a specific exception is permitted by the CTD. Breach of this regulation incurs an automatic disciplinary penalty (see 6.3) in the first instance. In the case of further breaches by the same unit, the CTD will assess a more severe penalty, which may include forfeiture or disqualification.

1.7 The TO may grant permission for still or moving photographs to be taken during the course of the event. Players may only refuse to be photographed for religious or cultural reasons deemed valid by the TO or CTD

1.8 Expressions used here that have not been assigned a specific definition will be interpreted by referring first to the ABF Tournament Regulations, thereafter to the Laws of Duplicate Bridge, 2017, and finally to their ordinary English meaning. In the event of doubt or dispute, the decision of the CTD shall be final and conclusive.

2 Officials

- 2.6 The Recorders are Therese Demarco, Sue Lusk (Pairs) and Russel Harms (Teams).

3 Eligibility, Augmentation and Substitutions

- 3.1 At the time of commencement of an event, each Australian resident entrant must be a financial member of the ABF Masterpoint Scheme and of an organisation affiliated to the ABF or to an Australian State Bridge Association. Overseas players become honorary members of the Foreign Players Club.
- 3.2 Overseas players may apply to enter events restricted by masterpoint status only if they are eligible to play in events with similar criteria within their own NBO. Entry to any such event will only be granted after the applicant's eligibility has been verified. The TO's decision in respect to such eligibility is final and not subject to appeal.
- 3.3 To be eligible to play in the ANSSP, both players must have been born before 1 January 1959.
- 3.4 To be eligible to play in the ANWSP, both members of the pair must be female.
- 3.5 To be eligible to play in the ANULMSP:
 - i) neither member of the pair can have attained the rank of Life Master as at 31 December 2018;
 - ii) a player may not have previously won two or more ABF events with the same masterpoint restriction as the ANULMSP or higher. Notwithstanding, a player who has already entered the ANULMSP at the time of winning their second such ABF event will be deemed eligible for the ANULMSP.
- 3.6 To be eligible to play in the ANULMT:
 - i) no more than one member of the team can have attained the rank of Life Master as at 31 December 2018. The remaining members of the team must be below the rank of Life Master as at 31 December 2018. Players who have attained the rank of Bronze Life Master as at 31 December 2018 are ineligible;
 - ii) a player may not have previously won two or more ABF events with the same masterpoint restriction as the ANULMT or higher. Notwithstanding, a player who has already entered the ANULMT at the time of winning their second such ABF event will be deemed eligible for the ANULMT.

3.7 With the consent of the CTD, a team may augment until the conclusion of Round 5 up to a maximum of 6 players. Any player so added to the team must not have played previously in another team in the same event.

3.8 The CTD may approve a maximum of four substitutions per pair or team in any one event. In addition, the CTD may allow emergency substitutions for substantial cause and may impose any conditions in doing so and may take whatever other action is considered necessary to keep the tournament in motion.

3.9 To ensure the smooth running of the tournament, the TO may nominate a “house contestant” to compete in any event. The TO will make every effort to nominate eligible players, but is at liberty to nominate others in case of necessity. The conditions under which the “house contestant/s” compete will, subject to ABF TR 1.9, be at the discretion of the CTD.

4 Systems and Defences

4.1 GREEN, BLUE and RED systems only are permitted in the ANULMSP.

4.2 GREEN, BLUE and RED systems and BROWN STICKER conventions are permitted in the ANOSP, ANSSP, ANWSP, ANOT, ANULMT, ANCT and ANGP.

4.3 In the ANSSP, ANWSP and ANULMT, ‘Protected Pair’ status may be claimed by eligible pairs in accordance with ABF System Regulation 2.9. Opponents of a ‘Protected Pair’ may not employ BROWN STICKER conventions during that round. Pairs seeking ‘Protected Pair’ status must advise the CTD at least 30 minutes before the start of the relevant event.

4.4 In addition, YELLOW systems will be allowed in the ANOT from Round 3 onwards, but may not be played against a contestant with a current position in the lower two-thirds of the field (decimals rounded up). Pairs intending to play a YELLOW system must provide the TO with an adequately completed ABF system card and a *bona fide* defence before 26 April 2019.

5 Seating

5.1 Except in the Final of the ANOT, teams registering one or more YELLOW systems lose all seating rights in all stanzas against teams not employing a YELLOW system.

5.2 YELLOW systems may be played only if the seating is posted within 10 minutes of the publication of the draw.

5.3 In other cases, seating rights for each match will be determined by toss of a coin.

6 Disciplinary and Procedural Penalties

6. In a Swiss movement penalties are included in the overall ranking, but the draw is determined by the scores excluding penalties.

6.2 The general provisions of ABF TR 10 concerning punctuality and slow play apply. The table of penalties is included in Appendix A.

6.3 The disciplinary penalty for breach of regulations relating to smoking (1.4) and mobile phones, etc (1.5, 1.6) is 3 VPs.

7 Correction Period and Time of Appeal

7.1 The Correction Period (Law 79C) for each preliminary match expires 15 minutes after the scheduled conclusion of the following match. The Correction Period for the final match expires 30 minutes after the scores are made available for inspection.

7.2 The Time for lodging an Appeal against a Director's Ruling (Law 92B) for each match expires 30 minutes after the score is made available for inspection, unless the next round or session is scheduled to commence within that period. In that case it is extended to the expiration of the Time of Appeal for the next match.

8 Fouled Boards

8.1 In Teams events, the result of a fouled board is cancelled and a substitute board is played at both tables unless the result of the match is known or any of the players has left the table at the conclusion of that round. In these cases where a single board is cancelled, a score of 3 IMPs is assigned for both sides.

8.2 In Swiss Pairs events, where a single board is fouled, the board is scored by:

- (a) treating the board as two separate entities and calculating separate datums after eliminating the two (4-6 results) or four (more than 6 results) extreme scores, respectively; or
- (b) cancelling one or more of its results and awarding a score of 2 IMP to those contestants whose score was cancelled.

8.3 In the case of multiple fouled boards, artificial adjusted scores are awarded as detailed in the Appendices.

8.4 For boards on which a result is unable to be obtained and the Director awards an artificial adjusted score of average plus, the provisions of 8.1 to 8.3 will apply.

8.5 In the Teams Final, a fouled board in any stanza except for the final stanza of that stage will be replaced by the play of an additional board in the following stanza.

8.6 Where due to the fouling of multiple boards, direct comparisons are available on less than one-half the boards in the match, the match will be scored in accordance with ABF TR 15.1 (Forfeits), treating both units as non-offenders.

9 Ties

9.1 Ties will be broken for qualification to and carry-over in the Final of the ANOT and in other circumstances for first place, in accordance with ABF TR 15, as detailed in the Appendices. Other ties will not be broken.

10 Event formats

10.1 Swiss Pairs

10.1.1 The ANOSP, ANSSP, ANWSP and ANULMSP will be played as distinct single field Swiss events consisting of 8 x 14 board matches, played over 4 sessions on each day.

10.1.2 Scoring will be by IMPs against a datum calculated as in 10.1.3, 10.1.4 and 10.1.5. IMPs are converted to VPs in accordance with the WBF 10 board continuous VP scale. Separate datums will be calculated for each event.

10.1.3 The datum will be the arithmetic mean of all the scores under consideration after eliminating the highest and lowest $x/10$ scores (0.5 rounded up) where x is the number of scores under consideration.

10.1.4 If there are fewer than 24 tables entered in an event, the datum will be calculated considering the scores obtained at all tables.

10.1.5 If 24 or more tables enter an event:

- a) for Matches 1-3, the datum will be calculated considering the scores obtained at all tables; and
- b) for Matches 4-6, the datum will be calculated considering the scores obtained at the top $n/2$ tables (0.5 rounded up), where n is the number of tables in play; and
- c) for Matches 7-8, the datum will be calculated considering the scores obtained at the top 12 tables.

10.2 Open and Under Life Master Teams

10.2.1 The ANOT Qualifying and ANULMT will be played as distinct 9 round single field Swiss events consisting of 12 board matches in Rounds 1 - 5 and 14 board matches in Rounds 6 - 9.

10.2.2 In each match, IMPs are converted to VPs using the appropriate WBF continuous VP scale.

10.2.3 At the conclusion of Match 9, the two highest placed teams in the ANOT Qualifying will play in the ANOT Final. The Final will be played over 4 x 14 board stanzas. The team finishing higher in the ANOT Qualifying will carry-forward 0.1 IMPs to the Final.

10.3 Consolation Teams and Graded Pairs

10.3.1 The ANCT and ANGP will be played as a Swiss Pairs event consisting of 6 rounds each of 8 boards. The number of sections and method of scoring will be announced once the total number of entries is known.

10.4 The time allowed per round will be announced by the CTD.

10.5 The match / session starting times are:

Thursday 2 May: 10.00 am, 12.00 noon, 2.30 pm and 4.30 pm

Friday 3 May: 9.30 am, 11.30 am, 2.00 pm and 4.00 pm

Saturday 4 May: 9.30 am, 11.15 am, 1.30 pm, 3.15 pm and 5.00 pm

Sunday 5 May: 9.00am, 11.00am, 1.15pm and 3.15pm

Monday 6 May: ANOT Final – 9.00am
 ANCT and ANGP – 9.30am.

11 Playoff Qualifying Points

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11.1.1 In the ANOSP, Playoff Qualifying Points (PQP) are awarded to each eligible player as below:

Place	1	2	3	4

11.1.2 To be eligible for PQP, each player must play at least 4 matches.

11.2.1 In the ANWSP, Playoff Qualifying Points (PQP) are awarded to each eligible player as below:

11.2.2 To be eligible for PQP, each player must play at least 4 matches.

11.2.1 In the ANSSP, Playoff Qualifying Points (PQP) are awarded to each eligible player as below:

11.2.2 To be eligible for PQP, each player must play at least 4 matches.

11.3.1 Playoff Qualifying Points (PQPs) are awarded to each eligible player in the ANOT as below:

Place	1	2	3
PQP	36	18	9

11.3.2 To be eligible for PQP, each player must play at least 4 matches, and at least two stanzas in the Final (if applicable).

11.4 Players in tied pairs or teams share the available points.

APPENDICES

A Penalties for late arrival or slow play

0 - 5 mins: warning for first offence, then 1 VP (3 IMPs) for each subsequent offence

5 - 10 mins: 1 VP (3 IMPs)

10 - 15 mins: 2 VPs (6 IMPs)

15 - 20 mins: 3 VPs (9 IMPs)

20 - 30 mins: 5 VPs (15 IMPs)

For late arrival in excess of 30 minutes, the CTD may assess a more severe penalty including forfeiture of the match and / or disqualification from the event.

When boards are cancelled by the director due to a failure to complete them on time, the following penalties may be applied at the director's discretion:

One board: 1 VP (3 IMPs)

Subsequent boards: 2 VPs (6 IMPs)

B Calculation of multiple Average Plus awards during a match

Where the Laws require the Director to award an artificial adjusted score of average plus on more than one board in a session or match (as in the case of fouled or otherwise unplayable boards), the score awarded per board shall be:

IMP-scored Teams events: an IMP score of $3\sqrt[3]{N} / N$

IMP-scored Pairs events: an IMP score of $2\sqrt[3]{N} / N$
where N is the number of unplayable boards.

The net IMPs in a match assigned due to these formulas will be rounded to the nearest IMP (0.5 IMPs rounded up).

The following table lists the IMPs to be assigned for each successive board in the case of multiple average plus boards:

C Failure to enter or check scores

Should the players leave the table, when they have failed to enter one or more scores into the scoring unit or when an incorrect score has been entered and agreed, the following penalties may be applied to both pairs:

First offence: warning

Subsequent offences: 1 VP per occasion

D Tie-breaking

Significant ties are broken by (in order): sum of opponents' VPs, number of wins, net IMPs, lot.

E Anticipated finishing times

The following times are provided solely as a guide to players and may change depending on event formats and other circumstances:

Swiss Pairs: Friday 3 May, 5.45 pm

ANOT and ANULMT: Sunday 5 May, 5.00 pm

ANCT and ANGP: Monday 6 May, 4.30pm

ANOT Final: Monday 6 May, 5.30pm
