CHINESE TAIPEI IN 3 FINALS- WOMEN, MIXED & SENIORS INDIA IN SUPER MIXED AND SENIORS FINALS CHINA IN MEN AND WOMEN FINALS

ASIA PACIFIC

Chinese Taipei dominated all the three semifinals they played in the 3 rd Asia Cup and will feature in Three of the Five Finals. Hosts India and fancied China figure in two finals as well.

MEN : China A steamrolled their countrymen China Training by close to a ton of Imps whereas Hosts India bowed out of the Men's Event losing to China Hongkong by 20 Imps. It will be China vs China Hongkong Final. WOMEN : Chinese Taipei crushed hosts India - B by well over a century of Imps, to cruise into the finals against the strongest team in the competition, the world champs, China, who beat Australia by over 50 Imps.

MIXED : The women from Down Under, Australia will be pitted against Chinese Taipei, who put it across hosts India B by 10 imps. Going into the last set up by 5 lmps, India B conceded 15 in the last set to exit the semifinals.

SUPERMIXED : In the closest match of the day, the Japan edged out Thailand by a mere 8 Imps, their 12 Imp carry over seeing them through. The home affair of India A vs India B saw the latter get into the Finals by 16+ Imps.

SENIORS : Both the Seniors semi finals were were damp squibs, though the India B vs China was a tight match going into the last segment. India pulled out all stops to breeze into the finals where they will run into Chinese Taipei whose first set against China Hongkong was enough to set the tone for the rest of the match

PAIRS

MENS: 24 Pairs out of 48 have qualified for the all play all Finals today

WOMEN :The 14 Women Pairs will continue from where they left off yesterday, to complete the all play all 7 board matches. Today they will finish the remaining six rounds

MIXED : 22 Mixed Pairs who played 11 rounds of 4 boards per round yesterday, will play 10 more of them to determine the winners.

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THE STAMP OF Patrick Choy

The man is a charmer. And his Curriculum Vitae makes him the numero uno bridge administrator in the Asia and Pacific region. So many firsts. We will deconstruct as well go along.

Patrick started bridge in the late 60's, and by his own admission, " not the 1860s but the 1960's", making it clear that he is not a fossil. Not by a mile, Patrick. Age is but a state of mind. And it's not important unless you are a wine or cheese.

He initially set up the Hong Kong Intercity tournament in 1980. It was not just any international Tournament. Patrick had a vision. China and Chinese Taipei had not interacted since 1949. Patrick pull the rabbit out of the hat when he brought them together on the table literally, in the next Hong Kong tournament in 1981. He had executed his plan perfectly. It was a diplomatic and sports coup. The world took notice. Patrick had arrived. China appointed him as a member of the National Committee of Chinese People's Political Consultative Conference (CPPCC), the Upper House of the Chinese Parliament. Patrick thus became the first appointed multinational corporation executive (and non Chinese) as a CPPCC member. A very rare distinction indeed.

Patrick's baby, the landmark Hongkong Intercity Tournament, went on to become a hugely successful event, attracting international teams from the U.S.A., Europe and the Pacific.

World bridge and Patrick: Both WBF and Patrick seem to have an affinity for each other. Patrick started off as a proxy of the world famous film maker, Raymond Chow, the maker of Bruce Lee and Jackie Chan movies, at the WBF in1988.

The Jackie Chan of Bridge : In 1991 Patrick was

appointed as a member of the Executive Council and various Committees of the WBF and became the Vice President in 1998, till date. He was largely instrumental in bringing the 1995 and 2007 World Bridge Team Championships to China. This was followed by the First World Mind Sports Games held in Beijing in October 2008. WBF elected Patrick to the Committee of Honor in 2014.

PPRO

Patrick is planning to have the APBF Championships in Singapore next year in 2019. This is a selection trial for Zone 6 for the World Championships in China, where Zone 6 has a quota of not 3 but 4 countries, the extra one allocated for the host country.

His goal for the Zone is to get bridge included in the next South East Asian (SEA) Games in Manilla, Philippines next year. With the entry of bridge into the Asian Games in Djakarta, Indonesia this year, as a mental sport and likely to be continued in the next, Asian Games in Hangzhou, China in 2022, the dream of getting into the Olympic Games proper as medal sport, is inching towards reality feels Patrick, the eternal optimist.

Leaving His Stamp:

Patrick is also a world renowned philatelist and a world stamp juror. During the past decade, Patrick has won no less than ten Large Gold and Gold medals in three different categories - Traditional, Postal History and Literature at various World Stamps Exhibitions. This indeed is a unique feat in the world of philately.

Well, Patrick has left his stamp on the bridge world in the Asia and Pacific in general, and on the 3rd Asia Cup in particular. He is that China Red Revenue small one dollar stamp-priceless!

He is truly a Collector's Item.





Declarer can still get home with careful play. He ruffs on the table and plays the spade 6. South must split his honours. Declarer wins, enters dummy with a club and plays the spade 7. Whatever south does, with careful play declarer can get home. With such heated discussion during lunch, the chicken stroganoff went cold.

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

The curtain comes down on the 3rd Asia Cup today. This is virtually a dress rehearsal for the Asian Games in Djakarta, Indonesia later this year. The week just flew by; soaked in sunshine, rains and bridge. For India it was a new experience having all you wonderful people from the Asia Pacific region over. We were very impressed with the courtesy, politeness, and civility exhibited by our guests. The arrangements here in this laid back sea resort of Goa were better than we expected. In fact, superb. Most of us didn't get to venture out to taste the flavour of Goa; the sun, sea, surf, spirits and the sea food. Bridge tournaments are like that.

The Bulletin room would wind up at 3 am. The reliable multi tasking - Diganta, and his brother, Reetu, drove all of us whenever and wherever. We wanted returned the compliment and drove them too.... round the bend. Thanks guys.

The technology set up by T C Pant and his team of Srinivas Iyenger and Sudhir Agarwal was so good that we didn't have to hassle them much at all. Everything popped up on the monitor, way ahead of time. Of course, the deal records came after the round. As did the results. The time lag was 3 seconds.

It's been fun working at these Championships. The Bulletin Room always had our Associate Editor, Anil Padhye and the think tank of the Indian teams, captains, S.K.Iyengar, Vinay Desai and Debashis Ray, analyzing deals threadbare, discussing the single suit squeeze for an overtrick or a stepping stone and strip squeeze to make ten tricks, when the whole field was in + 110. A standard discussion would go like," Four Spade is cold. Declarer just spins the spade six to finesse defenders A J 10 X. If defender splits, then declarer eliminates hearts, and plays low to low holding AQxx opposite Kxx". My layout editor Bholanath Das mercifully is still not fluent in bridge wise, but we were caught in the back wash. And of course I always alluded to the above average bridge player, for whom these gurus should write. I had randomly picked an Indian lady player as their role model. The next day their analysis of the hands came out crisp and fresh like the perfect French fry. We had fun, gentlemen.

And of course, Patrick Choy, the rock star of Asia Pacific bridge, was a frequent visitor to the Bulletin Room. He was full of anecdotes and a great raconteur. We nicknamed him the Jackie Chan of Bridge. Any physical resemblance to the real reel life Mr. Chan is coincidental. He charmed our socks off.

These Championships have been spectacular, just like the Goan sunsets. As the sun goes down on these Championships its time to raise a toast. Cheers! Editor
