

Pwned by a Little Kiddie

On Board 15 of the first Pairs Qualifying, I was declaring in 1NT by East playing against Matt Kirkland and Finn Rennie, two little kiddies from Melbourne who have been brought up by Laura Ginnan, Pete Hollands, and Justin Howard.

South led the \blacklozenge Q which I allowed it to hold the trick, thinking that with the \blacklozenge K in dummy (along with a non-heart lead), Rascal No. 2 would continue with another spade.

I won the spade continuation in hand and led a diamond to the queen losing to the singleton king. Rascal No. 1 now plays the ♥K which I ducked and another heart was continued to my ace as South discarded a club. I now had seven tricks to cash but there was potential for more.

I next cashed the AK (North discarding a heart) followed by my three diamond tricks carefully winning the last round in my hand. During those tricks, Rascal No.1 discarded the A5, A6, and A9!!

The count was complete. Rascal No.1 is marked with two spades, six hearts, one diamond, and hence four clubs. How could he have pitched down to the singleton A? Most likely he discarded three clubs away from four small clubs or four clubs headed by the jack.

Therefore, the clubs were now coming in for three tricks (or so I thought). I confidently led the AQ (intending to pin a now-stiff jack) which Matt casually won the AK and claimed the rest of his hearts.


Q: What do you do? I look after people.




Double dummy says 5♠ can be made by EW on **any** lead. Let's assume East is declaring 5♠.

On a heart lead, you play as follows: Win \checkmark A discarding a club (1st trick), heart ruff (2), duck a diamond; assume South wins and continues with the \bigstar K, win \bigstar A (3), \bigstar A (4), diamond ruff (5), cash \bigstar K removing South's trump (6), heart ruff with the \bigstar 6 (7), diamond ruff (8), heart ruff with the \bigstar 8 (9). With \bigstar AJ and \bigstar 10 left in hand, exit with a club. Whoever wins, you can take the spade finesse for 11 tricks.)

On a club lead, you play along similar lines. Win ♣A (1), ♥A discarding a club (2), heart ruff (3), duck a diamond; assume South wins and exits with ♦J, win ♦A (4), diamond ruff (5), cash ♠K (6), heart ruff (7), diamond ruff (8), heart ruff (9), and now you are in the same position to exit with a club with ♠AJ as the last two cards. OK, it's more of a trump reduction rather than a dummy reversal, but it does seem counter-intuitive to be ruffing in the long trump hand.

There is more than one variation. Say the $\frac{1}{2}$ K is led, you can duck the first trick. A club is continued to the $\frac{1}{2}$ A (1), \forall A discarding a club (2), ruff a club (3), duck a diamond; South wins and returns a diamond to your ace (4), diamond ruff (5), $\frac{1}{2}$ K (6), and $\frac{1}{2}$ 8. You are now down to $\frac{1}{2}$ AJ86 $\frac{1}{2}$ 7 opposite dummy who still has a trump left. If North ruffs with $\frac{1}{2}$ 10, you overruff, ruff your diamond, ruff back to hand and draw trumps. If North discards on the $\frac{1}{2}$ 8, you pitch your diamond and take the spade finesse. Here is the board again if you want to play the hand as you cross out cards in the diagram:


The rule for Board 16 of the Crazy Pairs was:


Before the auction begins, each person selects 3 cards to pass to their Right-Hand-Opponent. Continue the auction as per normal.

This was the original full deal:



At my table, this was the full deal after we all passed 3 cards to our respective RHO:





Of course, this wasn't an outright top as this is Crazy Pairs. This happened at another table:



The auction was 1♥-4♠-6♥-7♦ // 7♥-7♠(!)-7NT(!!)-P // P-X-XX-All Pass.

A finesse in spades and a finesse in clubs meant 13 easy tricks for Sam who declared the 7NTXX. +2980.

Other results of this board were $6 \forall X+1$, $6 \forall X-1$ (North on lead gave South a spade ruff).
