The History of Cliff Wake

Cliff Wake was first seen at the last Tumut congress ever held, which was long enough ago that Griff Ware had sent in a badly scrawled physical entry form. Cliff has attended two weddings and now has a trohpy dedicated in his honour.

The Cliff Wake Playoff was first envisaged during the 2008 Youth Teams, in which there was a tie between the leading teams at the end of the event and the regulations called for a four board playoff. This was extremely exciting and it became clear that we ought to have a tied event every year!

When Board 27 arrived, I took my hand out of the board and sorted my hand. To my surprise I was dealt <u>◆</u>- ♥AKT97643 ◆A7 <u>◆</u>Q87 and it wasn't even Goulash!

To my excitement, my partner Finn opened the bidding with 1^{\bullet} . Nick overcalled 2^{\bullet} and I bid 2^{\heartsuit} thinking I was probably showing five hearts, but what I didn't know was that I was only showing four hearts. Over my 2^{\heartsuit} , Finn now jumps to 4^{\bullet} !!

I cracked up and couldn't stop laughing, and Kate who was kibitzing next to me wondered why I was laughing so hard. So I showed her my hand, she also started laughing, and then said "Alright Finn, you better have a good hand", so I passed the 4 bid. This was the full deal:



Nick led a diamond and before I placed my hand down as dummy, Finn now said, "it would be funny if he [me] has no spades."

I then put down my hand and the whole table cracked up with laughter! The whole room stopped and looked at us, wondering what was so funny. Finn then says, "I got this", so I gave him a challenge. I said "if you make this board, I will give you a can of Coke!"

He had no trouble accepting the challenge. He played out the hand and fortunately goes down by two tricks. Upon seeing Finn's hand however, I then realised that he had two hearts (which would've made my hearts much stronger); the jack and the queen!!! *sigh*

A Nice End Position

By David Skipper I encountered a nice end position on Board 8 of the fourth round of the Youth Teams.



I was in 3NT by East and South got off to an unfortunate start with the $\mathbf{V}Q$ lead. With eight top tricks available (with the help of the heart finesse), I won in dummy and went about establishing my ninth trick in spades.

I led the \diamond Q off dummy and North now erred by rising with \diamond A to switch to a low diamond. I held up my ace until the third round (discarding a club from dummy) and cashed four rounds of clubs. This was the position with the fourth club to be played:



South was now squeezed in three suits. A spade discard would be obviously bad, and a diamond discard (a defensive winner) allows me to continue with a spade. A heart discard on the other hand is equally fatal as I could then pick up the entire heart suit via a finesse.

Sometimes second hand high is the correct defence, but not this time.



A fascinatingly disturbing thought by Dr. Neil Degrasse Tyson

If you look at the closest genetic relative to human beings - the chimpanzees - we share approximately 98+% identical DNA, yet we are smarter than a chimpanzee.

Let's invent a measure of intelligence that makes humans unique. Let's say intelligence is your ability to compose poetry, symphonies, do art, math and science. Let's make that as the arbitrary definition of intelligence for the moment. Chimps can't do any of that. Yet we share 98/99% identical DNA. The most brilliant chimp there ever was, maybe can do a little bit of sign language. Well, our toddlers can do that. Toddlers. So, here's what concerns me deeply.

Everything that we are that distinguishes us from chimps, emerges from that 1% difference in DNA. It has to be, because that's the difference! The Hubble telescope, high rises, The Golden Gate Bridge, that's in that 1%! Maybe, everything that we are that is not the chimp is not as smart compared to the chimp as we tell ourselves it is.

Maybe the difference between constructing and launching a Hubble telescope and a chimp combining two finger motions as sign language, maybe that difference is not all that great. We tell ourselves it is. Just the same way we label our books optical illusions. We tell ourselves it's a lot. Maybe it's almost nothing.

How would we decide that? Imagine another life form, that's 1% different from us, in the direction that we are different from the chimp! Think about that. We have 1% difference and we are building the Hubble telescope. Go another 1%! What are *we* to **they**? We would be drooling, blithering idiots in their presence. That's what we would be!

They would take Stephen Hawking and roll him in front of their primate researchers and say well this one is like the most brilliant among them 'cause he can sorta do astrophysics in his head. "Aww, isn't that cute. Little Johnny can do that too. Well that's so cute. In fact, Johnny just did that... let me just get it... it's on the refrigerator door. Here it is. He did it in his elementary school class." Think about how smart they would be.

Quantum mechanics would be intuitive to their toddlers. Whole symphonies would be written by their children. And like I said, just put up on the refrigerator door, the way our pasta collages are on our refrigerator doors.

So, the notion that we're going to find some intelligent life and have a conversation with it!? When was the last time you stopped to have a

conversation with a worm? Or a bird? Well, you might have had a conversation but I don't think you expected an answer, alright. So, we don't have conversations with any other species on Earth with whom we have DNA in common. To believe that some intelligent other species is going to be interested in us, enough to have a conversation!? They'll look at our Hubble telescope and say, "isn't that quaint... look at what they're doing."

So, I lay awake at nights wondering whether simply we as a species are simply too stupid to figure out the universe that we're investigating. And maybe we need some other species 1% smarter than we are, for which string theory would be intuitive, for which all the greatest mysteries of the universe... from dark matter, dark energy, the origins of life, and all the frontiers of our thought would be something that they would just self-intuit.

I'm *jealous* of that possibility because I want to be around for those discoveries.

Damaged Goods

shortness, but was not. Now West is still glaring, but he hasn't made a lead yet. I tell him that they should play the hand and call me at the end if he still feels there was damage. However, I decide to stick around.

West leads the A and after everyone follows, he continues with the A and declarer faces his hand claiming down 1.

Despite the result, West is still clearly steaming. I'm a bit confused as to how there is damage.

He tells me that had 3^{*} been alerted as a "singleton," he would have doubled. I said, "But you're defending 6NT." He then told me that he knows people don't bid slams off two aces, therefore North had to have a void, so he couldn't double. I again stated that he was defending 6NT. As he started to argue with me further, his partner piped up with, "Just shut up."

When I told this story to one of my colleagues, he told me that he wished I could hand West a note telling West he's defending 6NT so that when he looks at it later, with a clearer head, the light bulb would go off. But for now, he would just have to settle for a top board beating 6NT undoubled.
