## Soccer

Get warmed up for the soccer on Friday. Approach one of the young guys if you'd like to play.

3NT/S on a passive spade lead, he won in dummy and ran ◊9 to West's king.

This was a mite dangerous as the defence could have four clubs to cash (give East ♣8) but West was stuck in matchpoint mode and continued spades.

Dyke ran his major winners, forcing East to come down to bare &K in order to keep ♦K guarded. The second diamond finesse won, then declarer exited with his bare \$10 in this ending.
