Against Neville Francis, North's 4\& over South's $1 \diamond$ opening was a Gerber-style ace ask. South showed two odd aces and that was that.
Others had impressive scientific auctions - Voidwood anyone? - but few were prepared to punt. Datum was just +990.

A tougher field this year with Hans Nunn making the trip. No playoff points available, so they were here for the money. (Playoff Points - like masterpoints - have lost some lustre. Upwards of dozen ABF events offer the PP hook. Fish are harder to attract these days)
Tony \& Sartaj stumbled in round two against two more heat-seeking Kiwis:

The alternative is to play low second time, gaining when South has honour-doubleton. It's close.
Anyway, Boughey cleared clubs as the defence cleared hearts, then he played $\uparrow A$-another, making when he found North with a doubleton honour there. Curious black suits!

4® looks an okay spot，probably on $\diamond A$ onside．Nunn led $\nabla 3$ ，ruffed． Back came a 9－3－T－4．This meant South had three entries to give North three more heart ruffs for +800 ．
East might have saved a relatively meaningless trick by playing 2 J at trick 2．Then North might not risk a second underlead．
Very few bid high enough here：

## Soccer

Get warmed up for the soccer on Friday．Approach one of the young guys if you＇d like to play．

3NT／S on a passive spade lead，he won in dummy and ran $\diamond 9$ to West＇s king．
This was a mite dangerous as the defence could have four clubs to cash（give East 8）but West was stuck in matchpoint mode and con－ tinued spades．
Dyke ran his major winners，forcing East to come down to bare KK in or－ der to keep $\diamond K$ guarded．The sec－ ond diamond finesse won，then declarer exited with his bare $\mathbf{1 0}$ in this ending．


If West ducks this，East is left on lead with $\diamond K-5$ ．It＇s no better for West to hop A like a crocodile， because that would leave dummy＇s \＆Q－7 over his 8－6． 11 tricks either way．$\diamond$ か
