Admittedly $4 \triangle$ is better but 4s should make with careful play.
On a diamond lead, you may as well ruff the second diamond with 48. Then you draw trumps and need to pick hearts to make.
Even if you carelessly ruff low at trick two, you can still make. Win the club return, draw trumps in two rounds, ruff dummy's last diamond then play QA-another.
West is down to diamonds. The ruff \& sluff takes care of the club loser.

After a club lead to the queen, declarer should lead $\uparrow \mathrm{K}$. East wins this to lead another club.

When declarer leads a spade to the jack, East should duck. Declarer is in strife but the cards are very friendly.

Lead a heart, ducking East's 810. Win the club exit to duck another heart to West..
After cashing the hearts, finesse $\diamond 10$ then lead $\diamond Q$ to West for the enforced diamond exit. Did you do that? (Or did East win the second spade?)

## Transferring to clubs

Do you transfer to minors? May as well. That 24 response isn't doing anything useful. It's true that bidding 2NT to show diamonds takes away a useful bid but bear with me.
If $2 \boldsymbol{\alpha}$ over $1 N T$ shows long clubs, opener has the choice of 2NT or 3* to accept the transfer.
Traditionally, opener bid $3 \%$ with a dull hand and 2NT to super-accept. Modern theorists have suggested it's better to swap these. So

## $2 \wedge^{\text {clubs }} 2 N T \quad \min$

This allows opener to declare clubs when it matters.
It also allows you to use 2 as a 2-way bid - either clubs, or a raise to 2NT with no major. (That is, the hands that used to bid 2NT until some people decided it was better to use 2NT to show diamonds)
This in turn means that 2\& Stayman always contains a 4-card major. Why is this good? Consider
1NT $2 a^{\text {clubs or a raise }}$
3. ${ }^{\max }$ 3NT

As compared to ....
$\begin{array}{ll}\text { 1NT } & 24 \\ 24 & 2 N T\end{array}$
3NT
East had to start with 2e because 2NT shows diamonds. This gave the next hand room to act but luckily she didn't.
West showed spades and denied hearts, providing a roadmap for the defence. Not good!
