He played 3NT/E on a diamond lead. He won the third diamond and went after spades, keen to keep South off lead. First he ran the &8-9-J-7. Then he crossed to the  $\heartsuit$ A and ran the &6-5-2-10. That way he lost two spades to North, none to South.
