General Conditions of Contest

- 1. Entries must be made using an entry form (hard-copy or electronic) and accompanied by full payment of fees.
- 2. The Sponsoring Organisations (ABF and QBA) reserve the right to refuse admission to any entry which includes a player who does not qualify under the conditions of contest or who is not in good standing with any registered bridge club, bridge association or the sponsoring organisation. Any rejected entry will be returned as soon as possible and money refunded. No correspondence will be entered into.
- 3. A minimum of neat casual dress (in accordance with policy of the Gold Coast Convention Centre) must be observed at all times in the venue.
- 4. Entries are open only to financial ABF registered players and bona fide overseas residents. Entrants eligible to play in the Restricted Event must be eligible to play in Restricted Events in their own NBO.
- 5. The ABF System and Alerting Regulations (as at 31st December 2006) will apply. Players are responsible for ensuring the accuracy of their system classification. If in doubt, submit your system in advance to the Chief Tournament Director—e-mail address: *Iskelso@ihug.com.au*. Supplementary Regulations will be posted at the venue. They will also be published on the QBA & ABF websites at least a week prior to the event.
- 6. Masterpoint Awards: Gold in main events, red in walk-ins. Seniors events at 75% of Open awards. Restricted events at approximately 47.5% of Open. Substantial awards for outright places (top half of field in pairs, top third of field in teams/swiss pairs).

Event Information/Eligibility

Open Events: Open Pairs and Teams carry playoff points. Swiss Pairs do not carry playoff points.

Seniors Events: Open to players born prior to 1st January 1950 and attracts ABF playoff points.

Restricted Events: Open to players who have not attained Life Master status as of 30 September 2006. (You are a Life Master if you have 300+ Masterpoints, 180+ of which are Red or Gold, including at least 30 Gold.)

(As per inquiry: Anyone ineligible to play in Restricted events in their home bridge organization may not play in a Restricted event here, regardless of their Australian Masterpoint holding.)

System Information You Need to Know

The ABF's streamlined system regulations are in force. They closely parallel the WBF regulations with the usual colour-coding. However, the sole criterion is now your system's one-level opening structure.

Green: Natural, includes those who open 1♣ on 4-

4-3-2.

Blue: Strong club systems, where 1♥, 1♠ & 1NT

are natural (think Precision).

Red: Intermediate 1♣ systems, (e.g. Polish Club)

or strong 1♣ where 1♥/♠ or 1NT are not

natural (e.g. modern Moscito).

Yellow: Strong pass or multi-meaning one-level

openings.

You can play Green/Blue systems in all Pairs events, but no Red systems in the Restricted Pairs. (Restricted means no Life Masters in your pair or team.).

Yellow is okay in Open & Senior Teams if you prelodged. (No one has as of this publication.)

Note that Opening Points are no longer relevant. If you wish to agree to open a weak 2♥ on 0-5 points, that's legal.

Brown Sticker

Some overcalls & two-level openings attract a Brown Sticker. Weak two-level openings without an anchor suit (RCO & Myxo Twos, etc) are Brown sticker—pairs should attach brown spots to their cards. Also, multi one-level overcalls (think Ziggy & Jim!) are Brown, although gadgets used over 1NT or a strong 1♣ are not.

This is largely academic since Brown Sticker is permitted in the Open & Senior Pairs, though not in the Restricted Pairs.

Protected Pairs

Pairs playing a Green system can apply for an Orange sticker if both are below National Master or one is

below Local Master. This affords protection from Brown Sticker conventions in Pairs events and in the Restricted Teams.

Alerts

There are no changes here. (Same as last year.) Here's a summary:

Pre-alerts

List your unusual or complex treatments in the prealerts section of the system card. For instance, RCO 2s, Bergen raises, DON'T dbl vs 1NT, unusual carding (leading low from doubletons, etc.).

Alerts during the auction

Alert by circling partner's call and saying "Alert" but don't offer an explanation unless asked (then aim to be concise, yet complete).

Don't alert:

Any double or redouble

- Any call beyond 3NT.
- A bid in a suit bid or shown by an opponent.

Do alert

- All other conventional calls (such as Stayman, 1♣ opening that could be a doubleton, 2♥ = hearts and a minor).
- 'Unusual' natural bids. These include: weak jump shift responses, pre-emptive jump raises, inverted minors, canapé tendency, negative free bids, transfer accepts that deny four trumps, etc.

At the end of the auction, the declaring side should mark any unusual calls that weren't alerted at the time. Do this with a plus sign (+).

If partner stuffs up

If partner fails to alert or mis-explains, wait until the end of the auction before calling the Director and correcting. If your side ends up defending, wait until the end of the hand before piping up.

Substitutes

Section 7 of the GCC Supplementary Regulations reads: "Substitutes will be permitted for cause (with the consent of the CTD) as follows:

Pairs Qualifying: For up to half the total boards
Pairs Finals: For up to half the total boards
Swiss Teams: For a total of 4 matches
Swiss Butler Pairs: For a total of 4 matches
Teams Round-of-Four: For a maximum of 12

boards

Teams SF/Final: For a maximum of 20 boards"

In addition, "a substitute may not be an entrant in the current stage of an event, but may be an entrant who was eliminated in a previous stage. In allowing substitutes, the rights of the other contestants and the integrity of the event will be considered."

Colour Coding

For the whole event, the Open Area will be dressed in light and dark blue, the Restricted in green and dark green and the Seniors in pink and lilac. Coloured balloons will identify your section results and playing areas.

Withdrawals

Players are permitted to withdraw from a pair event at the end of the qualifying rounds provided that they notify a Director within 1 hour of the qualifying scores being posted. No portion of the entry fees will be refunded.


BROADBEACH

SURFERS PARADISE


Below is courtesy bus route servicing Surfers Paradise the area.

Unpaid Entry Fees

Entry Fees: A few players, because of extenuating circumstances, have not been able to pre-pay their entry fee. If this means YOU, please proceed to Reception and take care of the matter. Play cannot commence if an entry fee is unpaid.

Parking

There will be a weekly pass issued from Saturday 17/02/07 to Saturday 24/02/07 for \$20.00 (8 days) or a flat rate of \$5.00 per day. Our understanding is that you will pay on arrival at the car park.

Player Survey

We have been granted funding for the 2008 GC from the Qld Regional Tourist Board, but one of the requisites is that we supply certain facts and figures about our players. We also need these demographics when applying for Sponsorship (which would keep our costs down). So we have bitten the bullet and compiled a Player Survey form that you will find in your satchel. Dinner Dance

This year's Dinner/Dance will be held in the Gold Coast Convention Centre on Saturday, 24 February, at 8:00 pm. Come at 7:30 for a complimentary drink. As in the past, entry to this event is by ticket only and the onus is on the individual to make arrangements. The only procedure is to pick up a "table list" from Reception and return it as soon as possible, but no later than 8 pm Wednesday. Bridge Defense - What's Going On (1)?

West deals, no one vulnerable.

NORTH ♦ J7 ♥ K642 **♦**AQ83 ♣ K104 WEST **♠** AK864 ♥ A87 **\$9 ♣** J975 West North East South 4♡ 1 Dbl 2♠ All Pass

You lead the ♠K and East plays the nine. Is East saying he likes spades or is it suit preference for diamonds? What is your plan? Why?

In defense, there are three messages you can give your partner.

- * You can give an attitude signal saying you like or dislike what he is doing.
- * You can give a count signal telling him how many cards you have in a particular suit.
- * And you can give a suit preference signal telling him indirectly which suit you would like him to shift to.

Here is a useful rule which should help you sort out what is going on.

RULE.


A suit preference signal takes a back seat to BOTH of the other signals.

If a signal can be interpreted as attitude or count, it is so interpreted.

A suit-preference signal is always the last interpretation. Partner's ♠9 is therefore

encouraging, showing the queen.

Remember the bidding? Partner raised spades. He is not showing a doubleton. Your plan therefore is to lead your singleton diamond and then to put partner in with the ΔQ for a diamond ruff.



Here is the winning defense. Once you think of it, it isn't too hard to find.

The key is not to lose track of the bidding. If you forgot that partner raised spades, you will realize that the ♠9 can't be a doubleton.

Following the rule above, the $\clubsuit 9$ can only be an encouraging card telling you he has the $\spadesuit Q$.

NOTE: A suit-preference card is usually defined as an unusually emphatic card. If East absolutely wants a diamond shift, he has to play the queen!

NOTE: If East has QJ5, he will play the queen, which shows the jack. The queen will be interpreted as suit preference only when West can tell that East doesn't have the jack. On this hand, the jack is in the dummy so East could play the queen and be sure of getting a diamond shift if he needed one.

Rudolph Wins Again

It was the second annual North Pole Bridge Tournament and Rudolph, the famous reindeer, had returned to defend his championship in the Open Pairs. He and his partner, Randolph, were the hottest pair on hooves; but they now faced their arch rivals, Mush and Slush (inventors of the Eskimo Club System).

Randolph, North, opened 1♠ and Mush overcalled 1NT. This might have influenced the bidding of many South players; but not Rudolph, who had diamonds coming out of his antlers. "7♦," he said with defiance. "Double," shouted Mush.

The excitement had drawn a large crowd to Rudolph's

table and the kibitzers were buzzing. "Rudolph bit off too much this time," said one. "It can't be made," whispered another.

Slush led the $\nabla 8$ and the contract seemed doomed, as the club finesse was clearly offside. But reindeer have a magic of their own and, to Rudolph, an "impossible" contract only means that he has to play a little harder. How did Rudolph make his grand slam?

The $\heartsuit 8$ lead was covered by the nine and queen, and Rudolph ruffed with the $\diamondsuit 7$. Dummy was entered with a spade to lead the $\diamondsuit 4$: three; two (East cannot gain by playing his king). Then the $\heartsuit 10$ was led, covered by East and ruffed.

Rudolph led all but one of his diamonds, discarding clubs from dummy, and then led a spade to dummy to reach a three-card ending. North remained with ♥J3 and the ♣A.

There was no defense. East had to keep \heartsuit A2 (else a low heart lead would ruff out the ace); West had to keep \heartsuit 76 in hearts (else the \heartsuit J lead would force East to cover and establish the \heartsuit 3!); so each defender could keep only one club.

Rudolph cashed the A and won the last trick with his club three.

And yes, his name will go down in history.

Where's the Excedrin?

This deal from the first qualifying session of the Nail Life Master Open Pairs held last November at the Fall NABC in Hawaii, gave a great many declarers headaches.

DIr: North **♦** QJ876 ♥ K103 Vul: N/S ΦK ♣ Q85 4 **♦** K103 **2** ♥ A752 ♥ J9864 ♦ Q653 ♦ 9 ♣ A963 ♣ KJ72 **♦** A954 QΩ ♦ AJ108742 **4** 10

Against 4♠ by North, East might be tempted to lead a diamond. Declarer wins in hand and then has to guess whether to pass the ♠Q or play a spade to the ace and another to try to avoid a trump promotion. The first line

works, the second does not.

If East can keep his fingers off a diamond lead, a heart to the ace forces West to cash the A and continue the suit. That shortens dummy and defeats the game. Declarer plays low on the club continuation, ruffs in dummy, crosses to the ♦K and leads the ♠Q. East must play low on the ♠Q. If East covers the ♠Q, declarer ruffs a diamond to hand, cashes the ♥K and ruffs a heart, ruffs a diamond, ruffs a club to dummy and leads the fifth diamond to pitch his last club. If East ruffs any of dummy's diamonds, the ♠9 in the entry to dummy.

But if West plays the ♣A and shifts back to a heart, declarer wins the king, pitching a diamond. Now he unblocks the ♦K, passes the ♠Q, which East does best to cover, then leads the ♦A and pitches his last heart. Now East can ruff but declarer can take a heart ruff in hand to draw the last trump. He has preserved the entry to dummy to allow him to set up diamonds.
