

Ebery-Klinger Lead Open Pairs Bignall-Januszke Lead Seniors, Hurst-Cooney Lead Restricted

After two of three final sessions, Jamie Ebery and Ron Klinger lead the GCC Open Pairs with a score of 865. In second place with 834 are John Armstrong and Howard Melbourne. In the GCC Senior Pairs, Robert Bignall and Roger Januszke have a narrow 3-point lead over R. Wallis and J. Brockwell. And in the Restricted Pairs Dave Hurst and F Cooney have an 11-point lead over D. McKenzie and J. Verver. Today's third final session will determine who takes home the trophies. General Conditions of Contest

- 1. Entries must be made using an entry form (hard-copy or electronic) and accompanied by full payment of fees.
- 2. The Sponsoring Organisations (ABF and QBA) reserve the right to refuse admission to any entry which includes a player who does not qualify under the conditions of contest or who is not in good standing with any registered bridge club, bridge association or the sponsoring organisation. Any rejected entry will be returned as soon as possible and money refunded. No correspondence will be entered into.
- 3. A minimum of neat casual dress (in accordance with policy of the Gold Coast Convention Centre) must be observed at all times in the venue.
- 4. Entries are open only to financial ABF registered players and bona fide overseas residents. Entrants eligible to play in the Restricted Event

must be eligible to play in Restricted Events in their own NBO.

- 5. The ABF System and Alerting Regulations (as at 31st December 2006) will apply. Players are responsible for ensuring the accuracy of their system classification. If in doubt, submit your system in advance to the Chief Tournament Director—e-mail address: *lskelso@ihug.com.au*. Supplementary Regulations will be posted at the venue. They will also be published on the QBA & ABF websites at least a week prior to the event.
- 6. Masterpoint Awards: Gold in main events, red in walk-ins. Seniors events at 75% of Open awards. Restricted events at approximately 47.5% of Open. Substantial awards for outright places (top half of field in pairs, top third of field in teams/swiss pairs).







Interview of Roch Colker by Dianne Brinkworth:

Q: Hello, Rich. What brings you to Australia?

A: Well, For years Richard Grenside has been asking me to come to Australia to do bulletins for one of your big congresses. Then in 2005 Ron Klinger was at the NEC Bridge Festival in Japan, and liked the bulletins that Eric Kokish and I do there. He spoke to me about coming and soon thereafter I was invited to do the bulletins here at the Gold Coast.

Q: Is this your first time on the Gold Coast, Rich?

A: Yes. In fact, this is my first time south of the equator.

Q: So how do you like it down under?

A: Aside from the toilets flushing the wrong way and the occasional low-leaping kangaroo, I find Australia delightful. But seriously, everyone has been quite marvelous to me ever since I arrived and I feel quite at home here—and after only six days.

Q: Are you a keen bridge player in your home town of Wheaton, Maryland, near Washington DC?

A: Yes I played serious tournament bridge for 30 years before I became a bulletin editor. I don't have much time to play anymore, but I still like to when I get the chance.

Q: How long have you lived in the DC area?

A: I've lived there since 1977. I came to DC when I got a job teaching at a local University there.

Q: So about how long have you been editing bridge bulletins?

A: In the 1980's I began doing appeal committees both locally and at NABCs. After a while I was asked to write a column on appeals for our unit's bridge publication, which attracted the attention of some members of the ACBL's Board of Directors. Soon I was asked to do appeals at World Championships and later was hired as Appeals Administrator for the ACBL. I began doing more bridge writing, VuGraph commentary for the WBF, and even helped write a couple of World Championship books. That, along with my work with Eric Kokish doing bulletins for the NEC Bridge Festival, led to wider recognition and my being asked to do other bulletins, such as at the

Cavendish and the US Team Trials. Q; *Okay, thanks for the interview, Rich, and we look*

forward to reading your bulletins.

A: You're very welcome, and I'm glad to have you on board.

Interview of Di Brinkworth by Rich Colker:

Q: *Hi Di. Thanks for assisting me with the bulletins. How are you enjoying your new role?*

A: It's interesting and fun learning the ropes. Gives you a look at the bridge world from a different perspective...sitting behind a computer instead of sitting behind a table.

Q: How did you come by the job?

A: Therese Tully said how you'd be coming over from the US to edit the Gold Coast Congress bulletins this year and asked me if I would I consider "giving you a hand." Unlike you, I haven't had any experience with big congress bulletins; my main experience is editing the Toowong Bridge Club newsletter. It's a 12-page quarterly production. Hi to all Toowong (and Brisbane) players down for the Congress.

Q: So what's your background then, Di?

A: I was a high school teacher originally. Then, after a Graduate Certificate in Applied Linguistics, I taught ESL (English as a Second Language) for a number of years.

Q: So how did you get interested in bridge?

A: I took lessons in Melbourne in the mid-80's but only started playing duplicate when I came to live on the Gold Coast in the late 80's. When I moved to Brisbane in the early 90's I joined Toowong Bridge Club—the closest club to where I live (Taringa).

Q: *Apart from bridge, what else do you enjoy doing?* A: I enjoy spending time with friends, seeing movies, walking (preferably bush walking). I like reading, including bridge books and also do some volunteer work each week at Catholic Psychiatric Pastoral Care in the Valley.

Q: Great, Di. Thanks again for helping out with the bulletins. Nice talking and working with you.

Bridge Defense - What's Going On (3)?

East deals, N/S vulnerable.

After a hectic auction, West leads the \diamond 4 against their 6 \triangleq contract. You win the ace and declarer drops the ten. What do you do now? Are you sure or are you guessing?

The correct play is clear. It is not a guess.

West is ruffing clubs and you should know it. How do you know? You know because of partner's lead. West opened the bidding with 4 \diamond . Whatever else West has, he has a fistful of diamonds. What, therefore, is the \diamond 4?

Is it fourth best? Can't be. If it were fourth best, the rule of eleven tells you there would be seven diamonds higher than the four in the other three hands. You are looking at the ace and dummy has the eight. That means declarer has five diamonds higher than the four.

Nonsense.

The \diamond 4 is a suit-preference signal. You come to this conclusion because it can't be accounted for any other way. All reasonable interpretations are impossible. By default, the only thing left is suit preference.

You might for a moment think you have a club trick coming anyway if partner is really void, but there is a chance, even a likelihood, that South will be able to get rid of that club loser on dummy's hearts.

Return a club and spare partner from further anguish.

Give West credit for a good lead. If West had led a reflex $\Diamond K$, East might or might not do the right thing, but he would have had to think twice about it. East would have to overtake the king, and then talk himself into leading a club. West's thoughtful lead did two things. It forced East to take the ace and it woke East up to the fact that something was going on. If West was afraid that leading the four might give declarer a free trick (if East had no ace OR ten) West could lead the $\Diamond J$. It should wake East up, but it might not. The four is a loud card and should succeed.

Opening Lead Gives Declarer a Ruff Time

Today's deal occurred many years ago in the town of Dorfburg, West Germany, a small fishing village in the Black Forest. Or was it Katmandu, Nepal? I can't remember, it's been so long; but I was right there at the table.

The bidding was lively as both sides found their superb trump fits. East and West held the ultimate fit—13 cards—but they finally succumbed when North persisted to 6° . This was a wise decision since 6° appears to be unmakable.

West led the A and the declarer surveyed his

chances. Wow! A ruff and a sluff on the opening lead! He quickly made use of one of dummy's small trumps and discarded a small diamond from his hand. Trumps were drawn in two rounds, then spades were attacked. Everything would have been cozy if East had taken his ace on the first or second round; but West gave a count signal with the eight, and East correctly held up. After winning the third spade, East returned a diamond and declarer could not avoid a diamond loser. The dummy had two good spades, but there was no way to get there.

East was quick to point out that declarer should have ruffed the opening lead in his hand, throwing a spade from dummy. Then when East held up the A twice, declarer could lead the J to West's king and eventually discard his last spade on dummy's fourth diamond. South rebutted that East could cover the Jwith the queen. East argued that it didn't matter since West would have to duck the second diamond, and then a spade lead would force East to concede another ruff-sluff; South agreed, but then realized that East could simply win the first spade if South played in this manner.

How to make it? *Ruff the opening lead in both hands.* Trumps are drawn in two rounds, then spades are led twice as East must duck. The \diamond J is led, covered by the queen (best), and won by the ace. The next diamond lead is ducked by West (best) and won by dummy's ten. Finally, a spade is conceded to East who has no more diamonds and must return a club.

Making an Impression

On this deal from the second qualifying session of the NABC Nail Life Master Open Pairs, last November in Hawaii, two of the top qualifiers met, and the encounter left Sue Picus highly impressed with the defense found by Norway's Martin Andresen. Picus was playing with Alex Ornstein, Andresen with Tor Helness.

Picus sent for the higher-scoring game and found herself in a delicate spot. Andresen led a top heart and could have assured the defeat of the contract by continuing with another high heart. Instead, he shifted to a club, which looked to Picus like a singleton. Perhaps it is best to win that lead in the South hand and run the ♠J, but if East wins and gives partner a club ruff, another heart dooms the contract.

So Picus ruffed a heart to dummy and played the $\blacklozenge 9$, letting it ride. Had Andresen taken this and played another heart, Picus would have won in dummy, crossed to the $\diamondsuit A$ and drawn trumps. Even on a club return, declarer can win and give up a diamond and still have the rest. But Andresen ducked the $\bigstar 9!$ Declarer was now dead, twist and turn as she might.


