

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




Annabel Tully is an award winning artist who lives and paints in the Outback. She has generously donated a diptych painting entitled "Landsdowne Vista" for the raffle.

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### MEET THE PLAYERS - RON KLINGER

One of the things I have noticed over the years is how little many of us know about the top players. For instance did you know that the late great Paul Soloway was Bugsy Siegel's (gangster and visionary who founded Las Vegas) nephew.

Anyway in this series I would like to tell you a little about some of the players starting off with the world famous Ron Klinger.

Ron was born in Shanghai, China in 1941 as his family fled Vienna and war torn Europe. He spent his first four and half years there before migrating to Sydney where he has lived ever since. I recently had the wonderful experience of visiting the family's home in Shanghai which still stands today.

Ron was an Australian Junior Chess Champion at the age of 17. While competing at these championships the play took place during the afternoon and evenings with little to do in the mornings. At this championship Ron learned a simplified version of bridge and has been hooked ever since. Earning a Law Degree in 1965 and working in the profession for two years he decided that law was not for him and took up a five year research post.

During this time he started playing regularly in tournaments and after the late great Tim Seres took Ron under his wing he won his first national title in 1969. In 1971-1972 Ron was asked to teach at the New South Wales Bridge Association and with each course the numbers kept doubling. As he was earning much more from bridge than anything else he took the life changing decision to make bridge his profession.

Ron and his wife Suzie met on stage performing in a university revue. Suzie not understanding how Ron could prefer playing bridge to taking her out learned the game. She learned the game and won Ron's heart at the same time. After winning the Australian Women's Individual and Australian Women's Interstate Teams she decided to retire on a high note and focus on the family and business. Suzie is full-time on the administration of the Klinger bridge enterprises and participates in the numerous annual bridge holidays

Ron has written more than 50 bridge books and still gets a kick out of publishing a new title. In 1991 he won the American Bridge Teacher's Book of the year award for Guide to Better Card Play.

**Favourite Books**: Card Play Technique (Mollo/Gardner), Better Bridge for Better Players (Goren), Killing Defence at Bridge (Kelsey).

**Favourite Team Mates**: Stephen Burgess and Paul Marston, who with a policy of no post mortems and everybody tries their best and if you have a disaster it's your partnership's issue not the team's have set a standard to be matched.

**Toughest Opponents**: the American pair of Meckstroth-Rodwell whose aggressive methods and toughness as well as their ability to accept their losses in the light of the fact that overall they will be in front Ron greatly admires. Others that Ron admires include Chagas, Garozzo, Hamman, Kaplan, Wolff, Soloway, Martel, Stansby and Helgemo.

**High Spots**: Winning selection for his first World Championship the 1976 Bermuda Bowl together with Bols Brilliancy Prize for the best played hand.

**Low Spots**: In the opening match of the 1989 Bermuda Bowl in Perth misplaying a 64 contract which he should have made.

The 1NT rebid showed 15-17 points. 2♣ was artificial, asking for more about opener's hand. 3♦ showed five diamonds and did not deny three spades. That was enough for West to launch into 4NT and settle in 6♦ and +920 was worth +10 Imps as the contract at

the other table was 4♠. East-West there started the same way but in reply to 2♣, East jumped to 3♠ to show the 3-card support and West signed off in 4♠ for +450.

6♦ is the superior slam although 6♠ will make most of the time. In another match East-West also played in 4♠ while the other E-W pair bid to 6♠, making when North started with ♣A and another club.

Both tables made twelve tricks for +680. 7♣ doubled is a good save at three down, -800, and 6♠ would be even better at -500 but the play is trickier there.

In another final

With a beautiful eight-card suit, a fit with partner's long spades and no defence against 6H, it was strange for East not to sacrifice in 74 or 64. It will usually be safer in 74 but on this layout, 6S works well enough. Declarer made the twelve obvious tricks for +1430.

At the other table:

This was a good auction by East. Recognising that a 4♠ raise would almost certainly lead to more bidding, East bid 5♣ first and sacrificed in 5♠ later. The 5♣ bid had a dual benefit. It might cause North to think there were two black losers in slam and it masked the degree of support for spades.

South might have done better by raising to 5♥ than by doubling 5♣.

Against 5♠ doubled, North started with the ♥K and switched to the ♣7. South won and cashed the ♦A before returning a club. Declarer ruffed high and had ten tricks. Minus 200 but a gain of 15 Imps.

### SYSTEMS - WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW

#### Laurie Kelso & Nick Hughes

The ABF's system regulations are in force. They closely parallel the WBF ones with the usual colour-coding. However, the sole criterion is now your system's 1-level opening structure.

Green Natural, includes those who open 1♣ on 4-4-3-2

Blue Strong club systems, where 1♥, 1♠ & 1NT are natural (think Precision)

Red Intermediate 1♣ systems, (eg Polish Club) or strong 1♣ where 1♥/♠ or 1NT are not natural (e.g. modern Moscito)

Yellow Strong pass or multi-meaning 1-level openings

You can play Green/Blue systems in all Pairs events, but no Red systems in the Restricted Pairs or Novice Events. *Restricted* means each member of your pair or team has less than 300 masterpoints. *Novice* means they possess less than 100 masterpoints.

Yellow is okay in the Open & Senior Teams if you pre-lodged. (No one has yet)

Note that Opening Points are no longer relevant. If you wish to agree to open a weak 2♥ on 0-5 points, that's legal.

### **BROWN STICKER**

Some overcalls & 2-level openings attract a Brown sticker. Weak 2-level openings without an anchor suit (RCO & Myxo Twos, etc) are Brown sticker - pairs should attach brown spots to their cards. Also, multi one level overcalls (think Ziggy & Jim!) are Brown, though gadgets used over 1NT or a strong 1♣ are not. Please also note that a Multi 2♦ (or 2♣) showing a Weak Two in either major is another exemption from the Brown Sticker category. This is largely academic since Brown Sticker is permitted in everything except the Restricted Pairs and the Novice Events.

#### PROTECTED PAIRS

Pairs playing a Green system can apply for an Orange sticker if both are below National Master or one is below Local Master. This affords protection from Brown Sticker conventions in Pairs events and in the Restricted Teams.

#### **ALERTS - SUMMARY**

#### PRE-ALERTS

List your unusual or complex treatments in the pre-alerts section of the system card. For instance – RCO 2s, Bergen raises, DONT dbl vs 1NT, unusual carding (leading low from doubletons, etc).

#### ALERTS DURING THE AUCTION

Alert by circling partner's call and saying "Alert" but don't offer an explanation unless asked (then aim to be concise, yet complete).

#### **DON'T ALERT:**

Any double or redouble

Any call beyond 3NT

A bid in a suit bid or shown by an opponent

#### DO ALERT:

All other conventional calls (such as Stayman, a 1.4 opening that could be a doubleton, 2.7 = hearts and a minor)

'Unusual' natural bids. These include: weak jump shift responses, pre-emptive jump raises, inverted minors, canapé tendency, negative free bids, transfer accepts that deny four trumps, etc.

At the end of the auction, the declaring side should mark any unusual calls that weren't alerted at the time. Do this with a plus sign (+).

#### IF PARTNER STUFFS UP

**Declarer/Dummy**: If partner fails to alert or mis-explains, wait until the *end of the auction* before calling the Director and correcting. **Defenders**: wait until the *end of the hand* before piping up.

#### **PROBLEMS**

### **UNPAID ENTRY FEES**

Entry Fees – A few players, because of extenuating circumstances, have not been able to pre-pay their entry fee. If this means YOU, please proceed to Bridge Administration Desk and take care of the matter. Play cannot commence if an entry fee is unpaid. Pairs \$240 per pair, Teams \$500 per team, Butler Pairs \$160 per pair, Mixed Teams \$200 per team, Stratified Pairs \$20 per player.

### **EVENT INFORMATION/ELIGIBILITY**

OPEN: Carries ABF Playoff points. Swiss Pairs do not carry playoff points

SENIORS: Open to players born prior to 1st January 1951 and attracting ABF

playoff points

RESTRICTED: Open to players who have not attained 300 MP's as at 30th

September 2007. Entrants eligible to play in the Restricted Event must be eligible to play in Restricted Events in their own NBO.

NOVICE: (New event) Open to players who have not attained 100 MP's as at

30th September 2007

#### **TEAM CATEGORIES**

There was a place on the entry form to do this when entering however there will be lists around the Convention Centre listing teams who have entered into each category. Once winners have been published or announced, no correspondence will be entered into.

## **NOVICE EVENTS**

Help will be on hand for 2 hours before start of play for all novice & restricted events. Assistance will be available for filling out system cards, helping you find your seat & working out where you go & where the boards move etc. We can also assist with any queries re alerting or anything else you might like to know.

## MASTERPOINT AWARDS

Master Point Awards: Gold in main events, red for walk-ins and stratified pairs

Seniors Events 75% of Open awards.

Restricted Events Approximately 50% of Open.

Novice Events Gold Master Points at approximately 40% of Open.

Substantial awards for outright places (top half of field in pairs, top third of field in Teams and Swiss pairs.

## **WITHDRAWALS**

Players are permitted to withdraw from the pairs event at the end of the qualifying rounds provided that they notify the Chief Director or Bridge Administration Desk within 1 hour of the qualifying scores being posted. No portion of the entry fees will be refunded.

### SUBSTITUTES

If you do not feel well and require a substitute, see the Bridge Administration Desk.

#### STAFFING

Our Floor Managers, Marj, Sue, Kim and Amber are dressed with the white overshirt. Our Caddies are in purple however they are only here to caddy – see Marj, Sue, Kim or Amber if further assistance is required. Our Directors led by Laurie Kelso have the blue shirts. ### **ROOM SETUP - COLOUR CODING**

For the whole event, the Open Area will be dressed light and dark blue, the Restricted in green and dark green, the Novice in yellow and gold and the Seniors in pink and lilac. Coloured balloons will identify your section results and playing areas.

#### **PARKING**

There will be a weekly pass issued from Saturday 23<sup>rd</sup> February to Saturday 1<sup>st</sup> March for \$20.00 (8 days) or a flat rate of \$5.00 per day. ## **DINNER DANCE**

This year's Dinner Dance will be held in the Gold Coast Convention Centre on Saturday 1<sup>st</sup> March at 8.00 pm. Doors will be open at 7.45 pm. As in the past, entry to this event is by ticket only and the onus is on the individual to make arrangements. 
### **COURTESY BUS**


