On the run of the spades, North discards ♥Q and another heart as well as a club. East discards two clubs and South a diamond and a heart. At trick 6, West gets off play with ♣Q won with ♣A.

The critical position is reached.

squeeze on East.

The odds favour the former. Play 3 rounds of diamonds forcing East to let go a heart, promoting the ♥8 to a winner.

Squeeze defence is even tougher than squeeze play. Here West could try to disrupt declarer's line of play by declining to cash the spade winners. If West switches to ♣Q after just two winners in spades, declarer has to exit with ♠Q. If West now plays a 4th spade (but not the 5th) and gets off play with ♦T, Declarer can counter by winning ♦K and then re-enter dummy with ♦J to play ♥Q ducked when East covers with the King. The 4th heart in declarer's hand is now declarer's 8th trick.

And what happens to the "Born Loser" in the West seat who defends in this fashion. Declarer wins the ♣Q at Trick 3 and cashes 4 more clubs (having started with 5) followed by 3 diamonds. Simple defence (5 spades + ♥A) would have defeated the contract.

I surveyed the table, and in doing so I failed to notice my partner's signal of the ♠2 (encouraging as we play reverse signals), instead of continuing with spades. I now laid down the ♣A and now a fireball greeted me – Declarer ruffed and 12 Tricks were duly made for –1430 instead of +100.

But the story does not end there. At the other table ...

The opening lead was ruffed in hand. Declarer now led towards the ♣Q, East rising with the ♣K. West now mis-signalled playing the ♦6, causing her partner to switch to a spade ... and that fireball lit up all Canberra! The doubled slam rolling home for −1550 a grand total of 2980 or 21 IMP's.

This is a larger loss than that reported in NOT News 2001 (Kamikaze Comes to Canberra). That was a mere 2000 points!
