## National Non-Life Masters Teams Championship

14-16 January, 8 sessions, Rydges Lakeside Canberra Session times Wed, Thu 11.30, 3.00, 8.00; Fri 11.30, 3.00 ENTRY FEE: \$400 per team (4, 5 or 6 players)

Each player must not have achieved the rank of Life Master as at 30/9/2003. Members of Grand Slam playing in any of the 0-49, 0-99 or 0-149 categories must have a rating under 58%. Players eligible to represent a country other than Australia may not enter this event.

There will be only one field in this event. Matches may pair teams from different categories. A win will earn about 0.67 of a gold point for each player in a team of four. The winner of the 0-149 category is awarded the Trumps Trophy. The leading teams in the categories 0-49, 0-99 and Non-Life Masters are awarded Perpetual Salvers. Teams winning multiple categories will be awarded only the trophy for the highest category.

The prize giving will be held at the Michigan Room, Rydges Lakeside Canberra at 7.00pm on Friday, 16th January.

A win will earn 1.6 gold points for each player in a team of four.

ENTRY FEE: \$720 per team (4, 5 or 6 players)

The 2004 South-West Pacific Teams will be seeded into two fields; one field will play at each venue. Teams may elect to play at either venue. Teams qualifying for the National Open Teams are **not** eligible for the SWPT category trophies.

The eligible team scoring the highest number of VPs in each category regardless of venue will be declared the winner.

Teams are not eligible to win more than one category; winners of multiple categories are awarded the highest ranked trophy in the list above.

Should no Zone 7 or ACT team qualify for the NOT then the NOT trophies will be awarded to the leading team in that category in the SWPT. This does not prevent that team from also winning an SWPT trophy.

## Playoff Qualifying Points (PQP)

PQP are awarded to players eligible to represent Australia who have complied with the board rule. Players who wish to transport PQP awarded for an Open event to the Senior List must register their date of birth with the Chief Tournament Director.

## **Alert Regulations**

The new ABF Alert Regulations are in force during the Summer Festival. The following is a summary.

Alerts are compulsory - you may not ask the opponents not to alert. The requirement to alert applies even though the convention or other agreement may be listed on the system card.

Calls are alerted during the auction by audibly saying "Alert" and by circling the alertable call on the bidding pad.

All conventional calls (other than self-alerting calls) must be alerted. Note that an opening 1♣ or 1♦ bid that may hold less than 3 cards in the suit is conventional. Note also that any call showing two suits is conventional, even where one of the suits is named, e.g. 2♥ showing hearts and a minor.

A natural call must be alerted if it is forcing or non-forcing in a way the opponents might not expect (e.g. inverted minor raises, preemptive jumps, negative free bids) or if its meaning is affected by other agreements (e.g. a 1 vegening that denies 4+ spades).

Your policy should be to alert any call by partner (other than a self-alerting call) that the opponents could reasonably misunderstand.

There are four different types of self-alerting calls, viz doubles, redoubles, cue bids of an opponent's suit, and all calls at the four level or higher. These calls carry their own alert and should not be alerted during the auction, but may need to be alerted in the pre-alert or the delayed alert stage. Be aware that such calls by opponents may not mean what you assume, and ask if necessary.

For the purposes of these Regulations, a **cue bid** of the opponent's suit is defined as a bid of the suit bid by the opponent or of a suit shown by the opponent's bid. Example: If an opponent opens 1 ♦ showing spades, then 1 ♠ and 2 ♦ are both cue bids.

The Laws and Alert Regulations require full disclosure of your agreements. You should make active efforts to ensure the opponents are aware of your agreements. You do so by pre-alerts (before the auction), alerts during the auction and delayed alerts at the end of the auction.

The pre-alert is the stage where you warn opponents of any very unusual agreements. Pay special attention to calls that may surprise the opponents, (e.g. transfer pre-empts, canapé style bidding) and to any unusual agreements to which the opponents may need to devise a defence. Highly unusual carding (e.g. leading low from doubletons) should also be pre-alerted at this stage.

At the end of the auction, draw attention (via a delayed alert) to any unusual features of the auction, particularly any unusual self-alerting calls. Upon inquiry, your side must disclose fully, not only the specific meanings of all calls, but also any inferences they have drawn from the auction based on partnership experience (as distinct from general bridge knowledge). These explanations may occasionally need to include negative inferences, such as hand types partner probably does not have for his bidding.

When opponents make an alerted or self-alerted call, you are entitled to ask specifically about that call, but only at your first turn to call after the alert. Otherwise any questions should be directed at the whole auction, not a specific call; an appropriate method of asking would be "Please explain the auction".

When explaining, do not use the names of conventions; give specific explanations. For example, do not just say "Michaels", but explain the meaning of the bid by saying "At least 5-5 in hearts and a minor suit, any strength". Similarly, do not use the terms 'weak', 'strong', 'intermediate', 'natural' or 'standard' without qualification. The opponents' views of these descriptive terms may differ from yours.

You may ask questions only at your turn to call or play. It is improper to ask questions for the benefit of partner.

# Systems Regulations

All events at the 2003 Summer Festival will be subject to the ABF Systems Regulations, a copy of which is available on the ABF's Web site. All players must use two identical ABF Standard or WBF System Cards to disclose their partnership agreements.

There are four categories of system coded by colour.

**GREEN** Natural systems. May include Benjamin-style 2C and 2D openings.

**BLUE** Strong club systems, e.g. Precision, Blue Club; systems where 1C shows one of several types of hand, e.g. Power, Polish Club. May include European Multi-2D, with one option being a weak two in either major.

RED Systems, otherwise GREEN or BLUE, which include HIGHLY ARTIFICIAL CONVENTIONS

- e.g. (a) An opening bid at the two or three level which is weak and does not specifically identify at least one suit.
  - (b) An opening bid which shows a 4.4.4.1 distribution of <17 HCP with an unspecified singleton, or a 5.4.4.0 distribution of <16 HCP with an unspecified void.</p>
  - (c) Opening bids of 1H or 1S which promise at least four cards in a suit other than that named by the bid.
  - (d) An opening bid of 1NT which shows neither a balanced hand (where balanced means no singleton or void, no 6-card or longer major suit, or no 7-card or longer minor suit), nor an unbalanced hand of 17+ HCP.
  - (e) Radical change of method according to position or vulnerability.

YELLOW Systems which comprise HIGHLY UNUSUAL METHODS

- e.g. (a) A strong or intermediate pass in opening position.
  - (b) An opening bid at the one or two level which in principle is as weak as pass and which makes no positive statement as to distribution.
  - (c) An opening bid at the one level which has more than one potential meaning (may show length or shortage in the suit named, or may be two-suited with neither suit specified).
  - (d) Non-descriptive or "random" overcalls.

YELLOW systems may, subject to the conditions specified in their Supplementary Regulations, only be used in the South-West PacificTeams, the National Open Teams and the National Womens Teams.

RED systems may be used in all events at the Summer Festival but pairs playing a RED system must revert to a GREEN or BLUE system when drawn to play against a Protected Pair in those events where protection applies: i.e. the National Non-Life Masters Teams and all pairs events other than the Final of Australian Open Pairs. GREEN and BLUE systems may be used in all events.

PROTECTED PAIR STATUS. A pair, playing a GREEN system throughout a pairs event at the Summer Festival, which has both of its players below National Master or one player below Local Master may apply to the Chief Tournament Director to be a PROTECTED PAIR identified by a BROWN sticker on the front of its system card for that event. Pairs playing RED systems must ascertain before the start of each round whether their opponents are a PROTECTED PAIR. If so, the pair playing the RED system must revert to a GREEN or a BLUE system for that round. Coloured stickers are available from Directors prior to each session.

**SYSTEM DISCLOSURE.** YELLOW: Pairs wishing to use a YELLOW system must submit a concise summary, printed or written in black ink on an ABF Standard system card plus a maximum of two supplementary A4 sheets, to the Convener on or before 7.1.2004

The onus rests with all players to classify their systems appropriately. You are advised to read the article on the ABF's Web site before classifying your system. Players who make opening bids without the required opening points risk a procedural penalty and reclassification of their system as YELLOW.

In 20-board matches a difference of 1, 2, 3 or 4 IMPS is treated as a

draw for masterpoint purposes.

- \* Players from overseas should write "overseas" in the space for ABF or NZCBA Number.
- \* If you enter the SWPT and have a preference, don't forget to specify at which venue you wish to play. Remember that space at each venue is limited.
- \* Please provide a contact phone number when entering using a credit card or when entering a Teams event. In the latter case your team captain's telephone number will suffice.
- \* All fees must accompany entries, no telephone entries will be accepted. Fees paid by credit card are only considered received when cleared by the credit provider. If your details are not accepted by the credit provider we will contact you by telephone.
- \* Receipts will be mailed only if a stamped, self-address envelope is enclosed with your entry.
