


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Linguistic Handicap

I find that my powers of analysis are hugely improved if I listen to the post mortem before analysing the hand. Watching the first round of the Men's Pairs, I was severely handicapped on this one.



After an uncontested auction, South declared 4H.

A trump was led taken by the Ace and declarer played the seven of diamonds, 4, Queen and King. A second heart took out dummy's King and declarer cashed the King of clubs. Next came the Jack of clubs to the Queen, Ace and 6. The 4 of clubs was ruffed with the Jack of trumps as East played the 9 and West discarded the 3 of spades. The Ace of diamonds was cashed and the 2 of diamonds was ruffed with dummy's 10. The 7 of clubs came off dummy with West and South discarding spades while East's 10 scored. Two rounds of spades were played and declarer conceded 1 off.


After the score had been written up, a light-hearted conversation followed between all 4 players, who were Jacek Pszczola, Ryszard Jedrichowski, Adam Bujak and Bronek Burza. This did not help my powers of analysis one bit. It looked as if Ryszard was being told by Jacek that he could have made while Adam and Bronek seemed to be stirring

things along. Eventually, Ryszard let me in on the joke.

A question for you. On which trick did the defence give Ryszard the chance to make?

The answer, of course, is trick 2. Had Ryszard inserted the 2 of diamonds instead of the Queen, West would have to play the Jack. Now, when next in, Ryszard can play Ace and Queen of diamonds which pins the 9 10 in East's hand and the 6 of diamonds is now high.

In the second session, Ryszard was the beneficiary of some defensive signalling in the auction and the play. He was quick to use it to wrap up a doubled slam.



Brian O'Hara passed as North and Jacek opened a nebulous 1C. Stephen Burgess bid 2D – a WEAK jump overcall, with the accent on the WEAK. Ryszard bid 2S and Brian tried 4D. Jacek wasn't interested but Ryszard raised to 5D. 5S from Jacek saw Rysard offer a choice of slams with 6C. Jacek bid 6S and, when this reached Brian, he doubled.

Brian then compounded by leading the Ace of clubs. A second club to declarer's King saw Ryszard push out the Jack of spades and, when this scored, the 10 of spades. Having finally disposed of Brian's trump Queen, Ryszard turned his attention to the diamond suit and took a confident ruffing finesse. Making 6 with

just a little help from the defensive signals:

- 1 Stephen hey partner (and Ryszard) I've got the Ace of diamonds
- 2 Brian hey partner (and Ryszard) I've got a trump stack
- 3 Brian hey partner (and Ryszard) guess where the Ace of clubs is.

Not all of Brian's operations on Saturday resulted in a dead patient. Consider this exhibit. You, West, hold:


The auction proceeds

Your partner leads the 2 of clubs and dummy goes down with

On dummy's 7 of clubs you play the Jack and declarer takes his Ace. Out comes the Queen of hearts, 5 from partner and 4 from dummy and it's your play.

The West in question decided to duck so as to prevent declarer using the Jack of hearts as an entry to dummy to get at the diamonds; a suit of which declarer was clearly void.


This was not a good idea as the next card from declarer was a small diamond. Making 3.



Dealer S, Vul EW

Stephen helpfully suggested to West that, as there were 7 diamonds in dummy and he had only 2, if declarer was void in diamonds, then East must have 4 to the 10 and the diamonds weren't actually a problem.

Of course, playing with Stephen, Brian was not the only operator around.




Dealer N, Vul EW

After 2 passes, Stephen opened 1NT – in public and without blushing. Double from West, 2S from Brian and double from East.

+ 470 And once more the ungodly triumphed.

Early Ending

Ishmael DelMonte brought this one to my attention on which declarer had the opportunity for an ednplay at trick 4.



West opened 1C and North overcalled a heart. 1NT from South saw West repeat his clubs and North his hearts. 2S from East drew 3H from South which ended the auction.

The Ace of clubs was led and the suit continued to declarer's ruff. The Ace of hearts was cashed.

Now be honest – as West would you have unblocked the King on this trick?


If you don't then the second heart endplays you. You can take your diamonds but must then concede either a ruff/sluff or a spade trick.

Mistakes I Have Made

When the Westwood Team played the Brockwell Team in the last round of the Senior's qualifying, both knew that a reasonable result would secure them a place in the last 6. Needless to say, aone imp win for Westwood was an all round disappointment.

I could have helped the cause on Board 20 when John Brockwell played 3NT from the North hand.



Warned by the bidding that John had a heart suit, Steven Bock led the 10 of diamonds even though I had not mentioned my ratty 6 card suit in the auction.

Mechanically, I covered the Jack with my Queen and declarer took the King. A spade to my Queen saw me continue the diamond suit, hoping that partner had begun with 3. This, of course, was an illusion because if he had 3 diamonds then they were precisely the 10 9 8 and the suit would block.


"What I should have done," I explained to DW was to duck the Jack of diamonds. This avoids a blockage and, when declarer plays the 9, I know the whole story and will find the heart switch.

"Nonsense!" exclaimed DW. "A competent declarer like John will know that you have the ◆Q, both by the lead and the inevitable hesitation before you duck. He will overtake the Jack, concealing the 9 and you'll still go wrong!"

"Ah yes," I said, "but then I'll have an EXCUSE for doing so."


