

Tim Bourke's Problem - Solution

This occurred in a local IMP-pairs game and, as here, most pairs landed in three notrump. The full deal was:



Most defender's took East's queen with the king and ran the queen of clubs. East took this with the king and returned the seven of spades. As the cards lay, the defenders had no trouble in making four spade tricks and those declarers finished down one.

One declarer allowed the queen of spades to win the first trick and played the jack of spades on the next trick. After some thought the West at this table ducked, retaining his •A-10 tenace over South's remaining honour. This was not successful because when East won the king of clubs and returned his remaining spade. West took three more spade tricks to defeat the contract.

The final declarer judged that West had led from spade length and, as he had not overcalled in spades, judged that the king of clubs was likely to be wrong. Consequently, he played the two of spades at trick one and the four of spades under the seven of spades at trick two. East continued with a third round of spades to the jack and ace. However, that was the spade trick the defenders took; when the club finesse lost that was the last trick for the defence. Declarer made a spade, two hearts and six tricks in the minors.

Jumping On The Last Train

The fifth round of the Last Train saw an all international table. Andy Braithwaite and Ian Robinson were opposing Ishmeal del Monte and World Seniors winner, Ross Harper. A surprising number of the hands seem to hinge around jump bids.


Have a bidding problem. At nil all you hold

Your rho deals and opens 3♣ - your move?

There is quite a disparity between the two suits both in length and quality. Do you try 3♥ or show both (hopefully) with a double?

Andy chose to bid hearts and lan raised him to game on




Three minor suit losers and an unkind trump position quickly killed this one without declarer having any chance. In 4♠, he will need to find the trump Queen and that may not be automatic with North figuring to be shorter than South in trumps.

Two boards later and Ishmael gave a display of table presence.







The uninterrupted auction was

Andy, after considerable thought, led the ♥ 9, taken in hand with the Ace. Ish played a diamond to dummy's Ace and then a small

club back to his King. He gave up a club to Andy's Jack and took the trump return on table with the Queen. He ruffed a club with the ♥ K and then ruffed a diamond on table. Another club was ruffed high before he crossed to the Ace of spades to draw the outstanding trump and claim his contract with 6 trumps and two tricks in each of the other suits.

Why did Ish play the clubs as he did? He explained that there were two straws in the wind. Firstly, Ian had enquired about the number of keycards shown, which Ish believes people don't do unless they have an interest. Secondly, Andy had taken a long timeto lead and was clearly reluctant to lead the trump. As he might well have led an Ace had he had one, Ish added this factor to the first and described it as "an 80% play."




Then on the next, there wasn't much jumping about, although the outcome was surprising, at least to this observer.



Ian was guickly in 4♠ from the West seat.

Ish led an ominous looking ◆ 10 which lan ran to the Queen and King. He cashed two high clubs, sneering disdainfully at Ross's Queen on the second round. He ruffed a club in dummy and was over-ruffed. Somewhat embarrassingly for lan, the defence also took the next three tricks as a defensive cross-ruff ensued. And the Ace of trumps was still to come.

A few boards later, Andy found his way to a playable spot after a jump from Ross, though probably not in a flavor he had anticipated.




After two passes, Andy opened 1 → and Ross jumped to 2♥. Ian was not upset by this and passed, as did Ish. Andy re-opened with 2NT. Ian gave this a lot of thought but eventually left Andy to play no trumps with

two singletons!

A heart was led and Andy tried the Queen, taken by Ish's King. Ish switched to a spade and Ross ducked as Andy's Queen became the second singleton honour to score. The hat-trick was missed when Andy led the ◆ K, pinning Ross's Queen. Ish ducked and also ducked the Jack which came next. Ish took the third round of diamonds and the defence cashed its spade winners to enable Andy to claim his contract.

Onto the next and some mild pre-emption pushed Andy and Ian overboard.



Ish opened 1♦ and Andy overcalled 1♥. Ross pre-empted with 3♦ and Ian introduced his spade suit. Ish went straight to the diamond game, putting all the pressure on Andy, who eventually emerged with 5♠.

The defence took its three minor winners and lan claimed for one off at trick 4.

The a couple of boards later, Ross made a brick without any straw, Ish nearly leapt into the unknown but settled instead for a small plus when Ian and Andy were pushed out of their depth.






lan opened 1♥ and Ish doubled. ♣ Andy called 3♣, which systemically showed 6-9 and 4 hearts. Ross found a 3♠ bid which others might have missed. Ian called the heart game and Ish, after a wistful look upwards, bid 4♠. This went back to Ian who sacrificed in 5♥ and Ish doubled.

Ish led a trump which lan took on table to play a club. Ish cashed the other two Aces for one off.

Two boards later and a baby pre-empt

pushed Ross overboard.



Andy opened 2♥ to show hearts and a minor. This drew two passes and a double from North. Ross bid the no trump game.

lan opted to lead from his club sequence and Ross took the second trick on table. He led a diamond to Andy's 10 and his own King and then was disappointed by lan's contribution to the next diamond trick. He let Andy take his Queen. The defence took their two club tricks before lan led the ♥ Q.






Ross took this and cashed his diamonds before finessing the ♠ 10. Ian's Kin g scored and Andy happily took his heart tricks for three off.

Onto the last board of the match and Andy faced a lead problem. How would you have fared.

The auction was simple !NT – 4NT and you hold

▲ AQ9 ♥ 8632 ♦ 873 **♣** 852

Somewhat ruefully, Andy commented after the event that, if it would ever be right to lead an Ace from this holding, now must be the time – the opponents have plenty of points and if you're going to beat the contract then you need to step lively. At the table, Andy was more passive and thirteen tricks were collected on



This is the quite rare 2 or 7 hand. You want to be in partial, if they are going to lead a spade, and grand if they aren't!




Match Of The Day

Round 8 of the Seniors saw the two top seeded teams finally face off.


Terry Brown (East) and Avi Kanetkar were opposed by Ron Klinger (North) and Bill Haughie.

It was a fairly ho-hum match for much of the time but there were some boards of interest. Firstly, when Avi pre-empted his team out of game with the tiniest possible pre-empt.



Avi opened with a weak 2 and Terry could see nowhere to go. The Queen third of clubs and King of hearts meant that 3NT would have had few terrors. So it proved in the other room where Henry Christie and Peter Buchen cruised into the nine trick game and wrapped it up for 11 imps.

Then two boards later, the teams pushed in 4♥ x making!



Terry opened 3♠ and Bill overcalled 4♠ to show clubs and hearts. Avi passed and Ron bid the heart game. This ran round to Avi and he doubled.

The defence's three aces stood up but there weren't any more tricks. Henry and Peter doubled Zolly Nagy and David Lilley in the same contract for the same result – so no harm done (or something like that).

I'm not sure what to say about the next hand. If it had been played against me, I would have known exactly what to say. I would have started with "Lucky b*****s" and everything thereafter would have carried an Indecent Publications Tribunal Certificate. Still, you can't argue with success (though that wouldn't stop me trying!)






Bill opened 1♣ and Avi overcalled 1♥. Ron put in 1♠, which (obviously) showed diamonds. Bill rebid 2♠ - natural and forcing and Ron bid 3♣.Bill now asked for a FULL heart stop by calling 3♥. Ron admitted to having such (???) with a 3NT call.

Subsequently, Bill told me that, had Ron temporised with 3,♠ then he, Bill, would have upgraded his Qx to a stop and bid 3NT himself. (See what I mean about "lucky b*****s?)

There were no terrors in the play.

We are frequently reminded that "a little knowledge is a dangerous thing" but Ari and Terry avoided a making slam by having too much knowledge. (Mind you, it didn't matter because Henry and Peter were equally over-informed.)



Terry opened 1♠ and Avi responded 2NT – game forcing. Terry called 3♥ to show a shortage and Avi marked time with 3♠.

Terry cued with 4♦ - simultaneously denying either first or second round control in clubs. Avi tried again with 4♥ but Terry had no more to say and bid 4♠







As Terry had bid spades first, Avi's ♣ K would be exposed to the lead so he gave up.
