




Tim Bourke's Problem

SOLUTION

Once the trumps are not 4-0, the contract is assured. You have ten top tricks and sure eleventh available from the queen-jack of clubs. You key point of the hand is to avoid two club losers, which will be straightforward if the suit breaks 3-2. Also, if you knew East held four clubs to the king, you could simply lead twice towards the honours in the South hand. However, suppose the full deal is:




You will win the lead in dummy and draw trumps in three rounds. You will then play the two top hearts and ruff a heart in your hand, eliminating that suit. After returning to dummy with a diamond, thereby eliminating that suit you must lead a low club and, after East follows with a low card, play the queen from hand.

On the above layout, if West takes this with the king, you will be home. He will either have to play a second round of clubs or give you a ruff-and-sluff. If he returns the seven of clubs, you will play dummy's eight and that will win the trick. If instead he leads the ten or nine of clubs, you will run this to your jack and finesse the eight the next round. An expert West will avoid the endplay by allowing your queen of clubs to hold. Your counter is to lead the two of clubs and play low from dummy when West follows. Here, he will be left on lead and forced either to lead away from the king of clubs or to concede a ruff-and-discard.

Notice that this plan works automatically when clubs are 3-2. If East had four clubs to the king, you would rise with the ace of clubs on the second round when west showed out, and lead a club towards the jack. Finally, if West had begun with a singleton king of clubs then, on winning a trick with that card, he would be endplayed and forced to concede a ruff-and-discard, giving you your twelfth trick.

Making Life Difficult

Hugh Grosvenor conned his opponents on this one from the Swiss.



Steve Boughey passed as dealer and Annette Maluish opened 1♣. Carol Richardson called 2♣ for the majors. Hugh announced his truly splendid major stoppers with a 3NT call which was passed round to Carol. She tried again with 4♣ and Hugh made the marginally more representative










call of 5♣. The 3NT bid had done its insidious work as this became the final contract. Annette's declarer play was not extended and the score of +600 brought in 13 imps against the datum.

Hooray For Al Roth

John Brockwell

Board 11 in round 9 of the National Open Swiss Pairs Championship was a tough one. It was played 104 times. Slam was reached at only nine tables: 6S four times (once doubled), 6D four times, and 7Cx (the par contract for -500, by Jonathan Free and Ross Harper) just once.



Tony Jackman was one of four to get to 6S, thanks to his great call.



A classic negative double (according to its inventor Al Roth) shows some values, interest in the unbid suits and tolerance for partner's opening. After considerable thought and hoping that his partner was familiar with the classics, Tony found the

wonderful bid of 5S at his second turn. The rest was easy.


Winning Ways

Swiss Pairs winners, Sartaj Hans and Michael Ware, enjoyed this one from an early round.



Michael declared 4♠ from the East seat and received a heart lead. He played a trump to dummy's King and was given a clue to the trump split when North played the Queen.

He played a diamond from dummy, ducked by North, but South ruffed Michael's Queen. South continued hearts to dummy's King and two rounds of trumps, on which North discarded clubs. Michael now played a club to the 9 and Jack to bring about:












North exited in hearts, ruffed by declarer but Michael picked the now bare ♣K to take his tenth trick.

Let The Teams Begin

Stephen Burgess sat North facing Gabi Lorentz while Bob Geyer (East) was in harness with George Lovrecz.

The action started immediately:




East opened 1♠ and got a 2♠ response. East repeated spades and West called 3♠. East tried 4♠ and West raised this suit to game.

Declarer should probably have been looking at setting up the spade suit but, mesmerised by the diamond shortage in dummy, he ruffed a diamond. Now there was no way to limit his trump losers to one unless they broke 2-2. They didn't -50.



East opened 3♣, South doubled, West called 5♣ and North bid 5♥. The ♣A was led and switched to the ◆J. West ducked this and North won with the Queen. .

There are a number of ways to make this but Stephen found the most elegant. He drew trumps, played a diamond to the King and Ace, finding out the bad news. He won the diamond return and played all his hearts to leave:




The last trump saw Stephen discard dummys diamond and West played a smooth small spade but Stephen was not fooled and played A followed by a spade to the King.












East opened 2♠, after two passes. South passed and West felt that their minor fit would be better and they settled in 3♦ - North-South having passed throughout on their combined 24 count!

Gabi led the ◆A and continued a diamond to Stephen's King. A small club went to the Jack followed by the ♣A and a club to North's King. Only now did Stephen play the third diamond. This now went quietly down for -400.




East opened 4♥ and West bid 4NT, looking for slam. This stopped Stephen from bidding 4NT for the minors, so East-West got to play 5♥, making for an excellent result.

At table 2, Kirsten and Steven Thorne were playing against Peter Gill and Martin Bloom.


Steven again opened 4♥ and Kirsten again responded. A 5♣, no Aces reply saw Peter double. Kirsten called 5♥ but Martin could now sacrifice. 6♣x went only 3 light.

Kirsten and Steven did better on:



Steven opened 1♠ and Kirsten responded 1NT. Peter led a small club from North and Kirsten's Queen scored. She took an unsuccessful finesse of the ♠J and Martin returned his partner's suit to dummy's Jack.Kirsten laid down the ♠K, losing to Peter's Queen. He continued clubs to enable Kirsten to claim via three more diamonds and the ♠A.

Back to Bob and Geore versus Stewphen and Gabi:



South opened 3♣ and West passed. It is not clear what west should have bid but 3♦










would have won all the brownie points. As it was North bid 3NT. This may well be a safety play against East-West making a major suit game.

Bob led the ♠K, as we all would, and it went

K 2 8 9!


Naturally, Bob played a second spade and, when the Jack scored, North claimed.



West opened 2♦ and North bid 4NT for the minors, unfortunately undiscussed. Gabi bid 5NT, whatever that meant – our best guess is that 4NT was seen as inviting slam and 5NT invited grand but we are prepared to be corrected. It seemed rude to ask at the table.


North bid 6♦ and this went quietly one off as the second spade was never cashed. This looked to be a good save against 4♥. However, Bob and George's team-mates played 5♦x making 750 for 13 imps.

East bid his diamonds to the three level but North-South still reached an easy 4♥ but George, with no defence, sacrifised in 5♠. This went two light for a 4 imp pickup as team-mates were allowed to play the heart game.



East opened a 13-15 no trump, West staymanned, made a try when he found the heart fit but East was not interested.

A spade lead is probably best but South found a very reasonable ♥2 lead. This went to the Queen and Ace and now West found an excellent line.









Ace, King of diamonds were followed by a third round ruffed with the *J. If he had ruffed with a small heart, it would have been over-ruffed with the 6 and then *A and a heart would have beaten the contract. However, *J, *A meant that South could only play one more round of trumps. Now,another diamond ruffed and over-ruffed but the last diamond was established for declarer's ninth trick.






Appearances Can Be Deceptive


For the number one seeds, Liam Milne (South) and Nye Griffiths faced Robert Gallus and Robert Stewart (East)..

Board1 did not represent a good start for the top seeds



After two passes, South opened 1♥ and West bid 2♣. North raised to 4♥ (although 3♥ appeals more to the editors. But what would we know?) East found a sporting take out double which West passed. Akthough DeepFinesse says that East-West can make 3NT (on 13 opposite 9) it really isn't biddable. Note however, that DeepFinesse also says that West can make 1♥ so North-South going 3 shy for -500 is no real surprise.

Two boards later,



Board 1 must still have ben on Liam and Nye's minds. Liam opened 2♥, West doubled and North only bid 3♥. In fact 4♥ is only 2 shy for 300 but East-West got to 4♠, making for 620.

On the next, East-West wrong sided 3NT, which went down for -200













After two passes, East opened 1♦. South overcalled 1♥ and West bid 2♣, alerted as showing a good diamond raise. East rebid 2♠ and West bid 2NT which exposed the ♣K when East raised to game.



West opened 1♥, East responded 2♣, South overcalled a very reasonable 2♠ and, after two passes, East doubled for take out. West passed this for penalties. This only goes one light but North was not happy and pulled to 3♠. This was also doubled for penalties and went for 500. Once again East-West can make 3NT (with 11 opposite 11) but once again not really biddable.

Despite all this Liam and Nye's team won the match by 19.6 to 0.4.

What's new in brain and mind research at NeuRA?

Who says older people aren't tech savvy?

NeuRA's Dr Kim Delbaere is part of a new project that sees older people embracing the latest technology. Through an exciting project called iStoppFalls, Kim is working with international research and industry partners developing technology-based monitoring and exercise programs providing individual assessments, by-passing the need for human assessors. A sensor pendant, designed to detect falls, is modified to assess balance, strength and mobility of the wearer and indicates where they might be at risk. Information is fed into a software program and will automatically design an individualised falls prevention exercise program using video games. This will see older people having access to a falls prevention program that helps them regain their confidence. Losing their fear of falling improves their quality of life.
