




Tim Bourke's Problem

SOLUTION

The layout you want to overcome is one similar to this:



Suppose you draw trumps and run the queen of diamonds. When this loses to East's king, you will have only one spade discard on dummy's diamonds and making the contract will rely on the spade finesse to win. On the above deal that approach would restrict you to nine tricks.

The best line is to draw a second round of trumps with dummy's queen and then lead a low diamond towards your hand. Barring a defensive ruff, this will make the contract whenever East started with the king of diamonds. (If East rises with the king, you will have three diamond tricks and the entries to take them. If instead East plays low, you will not lose a diamond trick and then you can happily withstand the loss of a trick to the king of spades.) When the lie of the cards is similar to that above, the defence has no counter that prevents you from taking ten tricks.

Notice that drawing a third round of trumps and the leading a low diamond would enable East rise with the king of diamonds and force dummy with a club, thereby preventing you from untangling your diamond winners.

The last question to ask is "What would happen if the queen of diamonds lost to the king with West?"


Luckily, that would mark West with ten high card points and, since he failed to open the bidding, the king of spades with East! As a result, after drawing trumps, you would be able to discard one spade loser on a diamond winner and then take the known-to-be successful finesse in spades.

One club required transfer responses as required by current fashion. One Spade showed diamonds. Re-double was an offer to see that contract played. Two hearts showed sound opening values with four hearts and longer diamonds; three clubs completed the picture 1453 12+.

To cater for a South hand like Jxx xx Jxxx Jxxx I tried six clubs. Ruffing in the short hand produces extra tricks. Six clubs was certain unless clubs were 5-1 or 6-0. Since our diamonds are solid the best spot is 6D; it will make seven if declarer guesses the heart queen.

So we made 920.

At dinner we discussed the auction and Tony opined that it was time to test the dread device. After all we had a good score on the board anyway.. No argument could dissuade him and directly he disappeared from view.

This time Tony had a different auction



Wild stuff, the known 4-1 fit. The defence did double dummy perfect by leading clubs and taking the club ruff. Thus they took four tricks. 1Sxx +2 was worth 920.

Presumably this means that if you travel to before your father was conceived and kill your grandfather then your father was a bastard all the time.


Pressure Play

NZ international player, Wayne Burrows, brings us both sides of squeeze play – subjecting as declarer and suffering as defender. First up a remarkable three suit guard squeeze.



Wayne declared 3NT from South.

A club was led to the Ace and the &J was allowed to stand at trick 2. Wayne took the &9 which followed with the King and cashed a high diamond. The &A came next, followed by a spade to the King, dropping the Queen. Two more high diamonds followed to bring about:














When Wayne advanced the ◆10, East had all sorts of problems.

If he discards a club, then Wayne will score a club, a diamond, two hearts and a spade.

If he discards a spade then Wayne will score two spades, two hearts and a diamond.


So he discarded a heart and now Wayne scores his spade, diamond and three hearts by finessing against East's now vulnerable Queen.

And the obverse:



West was playing 3NT and North led the ♥7, overtaking dummy's 10 with the King. A club was played to dummy's King and the ♣Q was taken by North, while declarer discarded a spade.

North exited with a heart, taken on table with the Jack and a club was conceded to North's Jack. North switched to a spade to Wayne's Ace and he continued spades to declarer's King. Declarer crossed to dummy via the ♥A and started cashing clubs. With one to go, the position was:



If Wayne pitches a spade.then declarer will just concede trick 13 but pitching a diamond is no better as the •K then pins Wayne's Queen and North has to yield trick 13 to the •J.

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
 What is the title of the pamphlet in the British Museum which is believed to describe the ultimate ancestor of Contract Bridge?

Humorous but wrong answers = 1 point











AUCTION BRIDGE = klaxon!!! = minus 10 points

Biritch, or Russian Whist = correct = 5 points

2) Auction Bridge was modified into Contract Bridge by whom?

Humorous but wrong answers = 1 point ELY CULBERTSON = klaxon!!! = minus 10 points. Ely Culbertson was the great populariser of Bridge in the 1930s via his Blue Book (and its sequels) and via such publicity stunts as the Match of the Century, but the game was invented by Harold Vanderbilt = correct = 5 points. However when Contract Bridge was invented by Harold Vanderbilt in 1925 similar card games existed elsewhere in the world, for example the French card game of Plafond.

3) What was the name of the person who suggested to Harold Vanderbilt that he incorporate the concept of "vulnerable and not vulnerable" into his new game?

Humorous but wrong answers = 1 point Nobody Knows = correct = 5 points. In yet another example of sexism in history, Harold Vanderbilt merely stated that she was a young woman.

4) What is the single fundamental difference which makes Contract Bridge a greater test of skill than its predecessor Auction Bridge?

Humorous but wrong answers = 1 point VULNERABILITY = klaxon!!! = minus 10 points. Although vulnerability does apply to Contract Bridge and not to Auction Bridge, it is not the single fundamental skilfull difference.

Must bid game to get the game bonus (and must bid slam to get the slam bonus) = correct = 5 points. In Auction Bridge if you bought the contract in 1H and scored ten tricks you automatically gained the game bonus (and if you scored twelve tricks you

automatically gained the small slam bonus). In Contract Bridge you need to learn and correct apply more sophisticated bidding systems to arrive at the right level.

You (West) pass as dealer. North opens 1♥ and partner doubles. South responds 4♥ and it's your call.












This was the problem faced by David Lilley on the very last board of the Seniors' final. David's team were ahead by 6 and as the board landed the BBO commentator said that the Neill team (of which David is a member were in the box seat as in the other room, NS had been allowed to play 4♥x for − 300 with 600 available to EW in 5♦. The commentator added "unless something strange happens".


Something strange did -



David called 4♠ and there it rested. He really did have nowhere to go for honey and 3 down meant that the Brown team had reversed the margin from -6 imps to +6 imps and won the National Seniors' Teams.

Another combination falling at the last hurdle were Ashley Bach and Mike Cornell. They had squatter's rights on NS at table 1 for almost the whole of the Swiss. They finally lost in round 10 (of 11) but were still ensconced for the last round. It was not a happy time and this was the last act.





In play against peter Gill and Paul Dalley, the auction was

Paul won the diamond lead, cashed the ♥A and gave up a heart. He ruffed the diamond continuation, ruffed a heart with dummy's ♣Q and claimed.

Meanwhile, Pauline Gunby and Warren Lazer had been chasing Bach/Cornell for two days. They faced this auction

The offer to play 6♣ gave Warren, sitting North, on lead, a hefty hint to lead a club. In with the trump King, he led another club for Pauline to ruff.

-8 to bach/Cornell but +11 to Gumby/Lazer who took the title.












Mike did enjoy one hand from the last set though he probably didn't enjoy the auction.


He held:

♦643 **Y**K85 **♦**732 **♣**10832

Peter opened 2♥ on his left and Mike passed, as did Paul. Ash doubled and Mike had to find a bid. Reluctant to commit to the three level on 10832, he tried 2♠ and was, no doubt, delighted when Ash raised him to game.



A heart was led to the King in the North hand. Mike played two rounds of trumps, Paul taking the second. He switched to a club and Mike won with dummy's Ace. He cashed a high trump and then exited with a club to Paul. Paul played a diamond to to Ace to produce



Mike continued with the ♠J on which Peter pitched a diamond. The spade ten then left Peter with a choice of suicide means.

If he pitched a second diamond, Michael would cash the ◆K and then lead a heart towards the 8 in his hand – endplaying Peter in hearts.

If instead, Peter discarded a heart, Mike would lead a heart and then take the last three tricks with two hearts and a diamond.

Fairly unusual, I think, Peter was not so much squeezed out a trick but rather out of a defensive riposte.

Not Peeing On The Electric Fence Leigh Matheson

Ed: I love apposite quotations. Of all quotations, probably my favourite is from Will Rogers – "There are three kinds of men. The one that learns by reading. The few who learn by observation. The rest of them have to pee on the electric fence for themselves"












Leigh submitted the following hands and, on reading his material, it became apparent that Leigh belongs to Will Hay's category 1. Hereinafter, all italicised comments are mine (the italics probably caused by electric shock.). The stuff in plaintype and which makes sense is Leigh's. All the hands relate to the first day of the Swiss.

I believe that the term "Intra-finesse" was introduced into the bridge vocabulary in an early Bols Tip from Gabriel Chagas.

I was one of several declarers who found the right play on this one from round 1 of the Swiss.



I was in 3NT. How should I play the club suit to the best advantage?


The answer is to start by leading the ♣3 towards dummy. If North plays the 10, you cover with the Jack abd South wins. On the next round, you play the ♣A, dropping the Queen.

When I led the ♣3, North, in fact, jumped in with the Queen. Later, I got to dummy and led the ♣J, pinning North's 10.

I'm reasonably sure that one of the most appreciated early Bols Tips was from Jeff Rubens. Jeff recommended that you should

cosset your partner. Leigh demonstrates, once again, his allergy to electrocution.

Richard Grenside produced a very thoughtful defence on this one from round 2 of the Swiss.


The ♠10 was led, losing to declarer's Jack. A diamond was played to the Queen and then a club to the 7 and 9. Richard "exited" with the ♥Q, only to find that he'd won the trick. Trying again, this time successfully, he exited with a diamond to declarer's Ace. A diamond was played to dummy's Jack and a heart played off dummy. South chose to play low and declarer won the ♥K. Declarer then cashed the top diamond and club before putting Richard on lead with the ♠8. The layout had become:











Many defenders would cash the ♠A and then exit with a spade. This inflicts a memory squeeze on South who needs to be paying close attention to get it right. Richard, recognising the situation, exited with the ♠3, gaining style points, without cashing the top spade. Now South could keep the top heart and top club without getting squeezed so one down.

Back to Leigh


A good defender will try to envisage partner's problems and take active steps to solve them.

Is there anyone except me who finds "The Rodwell Files" totally unreadable? Is there anyone except me who hates Rodwell's habit of attaching a soubriquet to every single play situation?

Ho hum, minority of one again, I guess. Back to Leigh.


One of the most recent additions to my bridge armoury is what Eric Rodwell calls "the Left Jab". (For more detail read "The Rodwell Files' – go on I dare you!)

I had an opportunity to use it in Round 3.

Against 2♥, I led the ♣A and switched to a trump, in case declarer had a third club to ruff in dummy. Declarer won with dummy's Ace and played a diamond to the 10 and my Queen. I returned another trump and declarer drew trumps to then lead spade on this layout:



When declarer led the ♠4, I followed with the Queen (left jab!). Declarer won with the Ace and now there was no way to set up and enjoy the spade suit. One down.

You can see what happens if I had followed suit with a low spade. Declarer would












finesse and later finesse again to establish spades.and make at least one overtrick.

Rodwell's book gives the following advice,"
Don't use the left jab from honour third
versus a 6-2 fit, count on partner to duck
with honour doubleton onside. It's true that
this defence will also kill the suit but, on this
deal, it will give declarer the one extra trick
to make the contract. The only chance on
this deal is to use the left jab and hope that
declarer doesn't counter it by ducking the
•Q and then playing the •A on the next
round, dropping the •K - a difficult line of
play to find. Perhaps this chapter of
Rodwell's book needs editing.

This illustrates one of my issues with TRF – I understand why the Merrimac, Dechapelles, Vienna Coups, Morton Forks etc are called as they are and so with most bridge terms but Left Jab??????? Back to Leigh for a totally comprehensible piece of nomenclature.

Richard McAuliffe found a neat play on this one:



West played in 3♣. I was North and cashed the two top diamonds and the top spade, South discouraging. I then reverted to diamonds and Richard ruffed with the King to uppercut West's AQ and give the defence a trump trick to hold declarer to 9 tricks.
