
Women first

Some firsts for women: the USA team than won the recent Bermuda Bowl in Paris included the first ever female winner, Rose Meltzer. We saw the first Melbourne Cup winner trained by a women and the SNWT

has moved to the start of the Spring Nationals.

Parking

The SNWT

The field will be about 32 teams, slightly down on last year. Perhaps the recent increase in airfares is a factor. Two teams stand out as likely final candidates:

Qualifying is over nine 20-board matches, then the top two play a 64 board final on Sunday. Winners receive 36 play-off points, 18 to the runners up.

Smoking

The smoking area at the Hakoah Club is on the ground floor, in the gaming area.

Any player discovered smoking in any other area, in particular the stair wells, will be suspended for either the remainder of the current session, and/or for the following session.

The will be no warnings! Smoking in the stair wells is against the law!

Mobile phones

Mobile phones must be switched off in the playing area. A procedural penalty of 3 IMP applies to any player whose mobile phone is switched on unless the director determines that there is a valid (e.g. medical) reason.

Lunch menus

Menus will be provided during morning sessions for collection before 12.30. Coffee is available, including cappuccinos etc. There is a bar on the ground floor, as well the bar next to the playing area will be open at the end of a day's play.

35 teams played the Women's last year, with the final featuring a number of foreign players. Here's a hand from that final featuring three Kiwis and an Englishwoman:

6° is safer as a glance the West hand shows but that's hard to diagnose. Sue Weal knew she had to find partner's black ace and chose an unlucky \clubsuit J.

Despite this setback, the top seeds Margaret Bourke - Lidia Beech (Lidia died 2 months ago) Felicity Beale -Di Smart, Sue Weal - Kathy Yule hung on to win by 5 IMPs.

Paris

As you know, the Australian teams didn't go so well in the World Championships, the Open Team came 12th of 18, the Women a disappointing 15th. Tough European and American teams made the final stages, as expected. In the Women's, Germany came from the clouds to defeat France in a thriller.

Against this auction, Helgemo led the A for -1430 and a 26 IMP swing against A at the other table.

After Stansby's bold limit raise, Martel was always going to bid at least six and started with a psychic short suit slam try.

A club or a heart lead looks normal enough but a trump lead would have shot it and probably stopped the recovery in its tracks.

ABF Alert Regulations

Alert by circling partner's call and saying "Alert" but don't offer an explanation unless asked (then aim to be concise, yet complete).

Don't alert these 'self-alerting' calls:

- any double or redouble
- any call beyond 3NT
- a bid in a suit *bid* by an opponent

At the end of the auction, the declaring side should offer an explanation of any 'self-alerting' calls.

Do alert:

 all other conventional calls (including Stayman)

Note: This natural-sounding bid:

2♡ = hearts & a minor

is conventional because it conveys a meaning other than a desire to play in hearts.

• 'unusual' natural bids

These include: weak jump shift responses, pre-emptive jump raises, inverted minors, canapé tendency, negative free bids, transfer accepts that deny four trumps, etc.

Pre-alerts

The Pre-alerts section of your system card should include 'unusual' self-alerting calls, such as a double of 1NT that shows a 1-suiter; lack of negative doubles.

Also list methods that may require a prepared defence – complex defences to 1NT or a strong club; RCO Twos; transfer pre-empts; etc.

If partner stuffs up

If partner fails to alert or misexplains, wait till the end of the *auction* before calling the Director and correcting. If your side ends up defending, wait until the end of the *hand* before piping up.

If you stuff up

Call the Director as soon you realise, then correct your error. The Director might allow your opponents to change their last calls, or award an Adjusted Score.
