# Parking

On-street parking is metered and the Hakoah car park is generally unavailable so go to the Secure Parking under the nearby Swiss Grand.

**Before retuning to your car collect a ticket from one of the ABF officials**. Go to the Secure Parking pat station insert your original ticket followed by **this** ticket to pay as you are leaving the parking station. Parking for the whole day and/or evening will cost only **\$3.50**.

# No Evening Sessions on Tuesday and Wednesday

This is good for locals and visitors. Now you can devote 8 hours to bridge, with shortish breaks (1 hour for lunch, 15 mins at 3pm and 5.15pm).

# The SpNOT

The field is about 50 teams, the same as last year.

Qualifying is over twelve 16-board matches, then the top 2 play a 64 board final on Sunday.

Winners receive 36 playoff points (PQPs), and the runners up 18.

## Masterpoints

In the Open Teams, (16 bd matches), 5.12 Gold Points per team, divided between all team members.

# Signing In

You will need to sign in each time you arrive at the club.

# Smoking

The smoking area at the Hakoah Club is on the ground floor, in the gaming area. Any player found smoking in any other area, in particular the stairwells, will be suspended for either the remainder of the current session, and/or for the following session. There will be no warnings. **Smoking in the stairwells is against the law!** 

# **Mobile Phones**

Mobile phones must be switched off in the playing area. A procedural penalty of 3 VPs (or 9 IMPs) applies to any player whose mobile is switched on unless the director determines that there is a valid (e.g. medical) reason.

# Lunch Menus

Menus will be provided during the morning sessions for collection before 12.30. Coffee, including cappuccinos etc, is available. There is a bar on the ground floor.

Charity IMP Pairs

for Mission Australia This will be held next Thursday 20<sup>th</sup> November, with a 10 am start. There will be 3 x 16-board matches. The boards will be the same as those being played simultaneously in the SpNOT final and scores will be I MPed against the closed room results.

## ABF Alert Regulations

Alert by circling partner's call and saying "Alert" but don't offer and explanation unless asked. Then aim to be concise not complete.

Don't alert these 'self alerting calls:

- any double or redouble
- any call beyond 3NT
- a bid in a suit *bid* by an opponent

At the end of the auction the declaring side should offer an explanation of any 'selfalerting' calls.

# Do alert:

All other conventional calls (including Stayman)

Note: This natural-sounding bid:

2 H = hearts & a minor

is conventional because it conveys a meaning other than a desire to play in hearts.

• 'unusual' natural bids

These include: weak jump shift responses, pre-emptive jump raises, inverted minors, canapé tendency, negative free bids, transfer accepts that deny four trumps, etc.

## **Pre-alerts**

The Pre-alerts section of your system card should include 'unusual' self-alerting calls, such as a double of 1NT that shows a 1suiter; lack of negative doubles.

Also list methods that may require a prepared defence - complex defences to 1NT or a strong club, RCO Twos, transfer pre-empts, etc.

#### Scoring and Datums

Normal result sheets will not be used in this tournament. Instead datum sheets must be completed at all tables and handed to the director at the completion of each round. From these, the match result will be computed.

As an ongoing service, each pair will receive a datum analysis, by board for each match, and in total for the whole tournament. There will also be a cross table on display, showing the results of all matches.

In order to achieve this, the datum sheets must be completed and returned.

# **ABF Convention Cards**

Would you like your system card prepared on computer, using the ABF Convention Card Generator? As a service to Spring National's participants, Spring National's staff will prepare 2 copies of your system card, and give you a floppy disc with the computer files on it for a \$10.00 fee to cover costs.



In perhaps the most dramatic finish in Bermuda Bowl history, USA I gained 12 IMPs on the last board of the event to emerge with an amazing 304-303 victory over Italy.

The issue was not settled, however, until an appeals committee had rendered a ruling on a disputed ending to the final board. In the closed room, Eric Rodwell and Jeff Meckstroth had gone plus 400 against 4♥ by Italy's Norberto Bocchi and Giorgio Duboin.

In the open room, Paul Soloway had doubled Lorenzo Lauria in  $5 \blacklozenge$ . If Lauria could get out for down one – minus 100 – it would be an 11-IMP gain and the match would be tied.

As play wound down, Lauria had already lost two tricks and still had the trump ace out against him – plus the losing  $\checkmark 9$  in his hand. With a singleton spade in his hand, Lauria had played the king from dummy's holding of  $\bigstar K Q$  to five. Soloway could have cashed the  $\checkmark 10$  to guarantee two down, but he played back a spade instead.

Lauria's partner had left the table after putting down the dummy, so

Lauria was playing the cards himself. Lauria apparently expected Soloway to cash his winning heart, so he pulled the  $\bigstar$ 7 from dummy – which held only clubs and spades – realizing too late that a spade had been played. He tried to change his play to the queen, which would have allowed him to discard the losing heart and get out for minus 100. Hamman, who had started with the  $\bigstar$ J 10 doubleton, had played the jack to the first lead of the suit, and he covered the  $\bigstar$ 7 with the 10.

A tournament director was called, and the ruling was that the ♠7 was a played card, resulting in two down for minus 300. That gave the Americans a 12-IMP gain and a 1-IMP victory.

The Italians appealed the ruling, but the appeals committee, citing rule 45B from the law book, backed the director. The rule states that when a card is touched it is played.

In the World Transnational Open Teams, the Italian Lavazza squad cruised to a win over Zhuang of China.
