Solution to this morning's puzzle

Contract: 6 Hearts; West leads the ♦ 5

Solution: Having ruffed the Diamond lead, south should cross to dummy with a trump and discard ♣ 3 on the ♦ A. After a second Diamond ruff, he should re-enter dummy in trumps to lead a Club to the King. Here west wins. West now has no safe exit. If he elects to lead a Spade or a Diamond, all is over. On the Club lead from West, South gets the free finesse with ♣ 10, making his slam without having to risk a finesse in Spades.

A Tale of Infractions

In a low key. lower half match, East and South were chatting about old times, whilst North and West were patiently awaiting their attention.

Becoming aware of this, East said to South, "OK, let's get on with it," so South immediately made a (light) opening of 1 Diamond.

The bid out of turn was duly noted and the director called. He made the appropriate ruling that, on non-acceptance of the bid out of turn, North was required to pass for the remainder of the auction, including passing in the first seat.

After 2 passes, South elected to open 1 Spade, thus showing Diamonds and Spades. West overcalled 2 Hearts which was passed

During the course of the play, East, with three brandies behind her, commented that declarer should now know how to play the Heart suit, since South was marked with a shortage. (This is a clear infraction, but the director was not called.) West took no notice and proceeded to go 3 off.

However, it transpired at the end that North had revoked, which was picked up by East, but this was now legal, because the hand was complete.

This effectively made the hand 1 off, and clearly all this had to happen to match Deep Finesse's analysis.

Solution:

Baker took the DA and returned a diamond, won by North who switched to the HQ. What now? This was the complete deal.

Baker took the HA, drew trumps, cashed CA, CK and exited with a low heart. If South rose with the HK, dummy's H10 would be high. When South ducked, North won and had to give declarer a ruff-and-discard. Away went the heart loser and +420 was worth 6 Imps against the E-W 170 datum.
