A popular start, after East passed, was  $1 \Leftrightarrow$  or  $1 \Leftrightarrow$  by South and  $3 \Leftrightarrow$  by West. North doubled, primarily for takeout. East has one sure winner and one potential winner, two tricks at best. Given that West's trick-taking expectation is 7 tricks on a good day and 6 tricks in the modern game, East has a sound pass. You hope that the pre-empt has done its work and that the opposition will do the wrong thing.

That's the theory. Now for the practice. Hurd, East for USA2, raised to 4. You can see what he was thinking. North-South probably have a game on, so let's push it a bit higher. Everyone passed. That was lucky for East-West, since one is usually on safe ground in doubling when a pre-empt is raised to game by a passed hand. Here a double by North or South would have netted 500.

West, Wooldridge, took the heart six lead with the ace and went two down, North-South +200. Ducking would have saved a trick. At the other table it went  $1 \diamond : 3 \diamond$ , all pass. The diamond two was led and declarer went one down, North-South +100, 3 Imps to China.

Both Easts for Bulgaria and Sweden bid 4♠ and both went two down. However, Sweden was doubled, –500 and 7 Imps to Bulgaria for –200.

North led a trump and declarer finished two down, North-South +500.

West led the spade king and the spade queen was ruffed, followed by the diamond jack, winning, the  $\diamond 3$  to the  $\diamond Q$  and the  $\diamond A$ . Declarer lost two hearts, but had the rest, North-South +130 but 9 Imps to England.

After Pass : 1, Bessis (West for France) overcalled 1. North-South played 4, Poland +130. The other table:

West led A and East followed with the 49. If this was suit-preference for hearts, West should have disobeyed it. It is hard to see how any heart tricks for the defence could run away. However, West switched to 7: five – eight – ten and South made 4, +600, 10 Imps to France. A top spade or anything but a heart at trick 2 beats 54.

Maybe it is being wise after the event, but North's 8 HCP with that potential in clubs could justify a vulnerable game invitation, even opposite the 14-16 1NT. North led the  $\bigstar$ 9, ducked to West, who played the  $\forall$ 2. South captured the  $\forall$ J and switched to the  $\bigstar$ 2, nine, jack. North returned the  $\bigstar$ 5. West won and played  $\bigstar$ A and  $\bigstar$ J: queen –  $\bigstar$ 7 –  $\bigstar$ K. South played a third diamond, ruffed by North. West lost a diamond, a diamond ruff, two spades and three hearts, North-South +100.

Declarer also finished two down, no swing. Sweden also played in  $2 \clubsuit$  by West but went one down, North-South +50. At the other table Sweden's South was in 2NT, +150, +3 Imps.

West's double showed one minor or the majors or a good 2♠ overcall or some other good hand. After this start North-South might have headed for 3NT. West went one down, North-South +50.

No namby-pamby approach for Nickell. He produced the Nike bid, 'Just do it'. The spade four lead was won by the ten. South played a club. West won and returned the  $\diamond Q$ . South won and took nine tricks, +600, 11 Imps for USA1. The same view as Nickell's was taken in the remaining match:

With Bessis declarer, 3NT was passed out. West led the A and a second spade, taken by the king. South cashed the A and then led a low club. He had nine tricks, North-South +600.

At the other table, Tessieres elected to double 3NT. He led a low spade, won by the ten. South played a club, ace, and West continued with a low spade. Declarer collected his nine tricks, North-South +750, 4 Imps to Poland. Note that South is minimum for the 1NT opening and has poor shape, yet 3NT presented no problems.

- 4. West cashes the  $\bigstar J: \bigstar 6 \bigstar 6 \bigstar 2$ .
- 5. West cashes the  $\bigstar 10$ :  $\checkmark 6 \bigstar 3 \bigstar 5$ .
