252. Offensive action

With only North-South vulnerable, North passes and East opens a Gambling 3NT (solid 7+ minor, no outside ace or king). South doubles, penalties. What would you do as West with:

▲ J103
♥ J76532
♦ Q2
♥ 75


You can be confident that the vulnerable opponents have a game available, probably in spades, perhaps also in diamonds. They might even have a slam if one opponent has a singleton or a void in clubs.

You should certainly remove 3NT, but is 4*, pass-or-correct, enough? A better shot is 5*, pass or correct. Maybe your partner is the sort of player who might open 3NT with seven or eight diamonds to the A-K-J (not recommended). If 5* is doubled, you will be -800 if partner has seven winners and no more. That will be fine if the opponents have slam available, but a loss if they can make only game.

Then again, maybe partner has eight clubs or seven clubs plus a useful holding outside ($\bullet J$ -10-x, perhaps) that will provide an eighth trick. Then you will be -500, a good save against their vulnerable game and a huge result if they have slam available. It generally pays to be an optimist in the bidding, brave but not reckless.

The deal arose in the finals of the 2016 World Teams:

Board 85: Dealer North : North-South vulnerable




In the Open Teams' final, both Norths passed, both Easts opened 3NT (Gambling), both Souths doubled and both Wests bid 5. For Monaco, North doubled 5. All pass. After 5. at the other table, it went Pass : Pass : Double, all pass.

Monaco's North led the ♣2. Netherlands' North led the ♣4. Declarer has to lose two spades and a diamond. With hearts 2-2, there were only two heart losers and so eight tricks, East-West –500, no swing.

As the cards lie, North-South can make $5 \clubsuit$, but $5 \clubsuit$ can be defeated via \Delta A, \Delta K and a third club, which promotes West's $\blacklozenge Q$.

Not everyone is enamoured with the Gambling 3NT opening. You can include me in the list of the disenchanted.

In the Women's final, both Easts opened 1. USA East-West:

East led ♣K, ♣A, and switched to the ♥8. Declarer made the rest of the tricks, USA +650 and +4 Imps.

And now for something completely different for the East hand. Seniors' final, France East-West:

West led ♦A, ♠A, ♠K, ♦K. East ruffed and made the usual eight tricks, North-South +500 and 5 Imps to France.

You lead the ♦6: ace – jack – four. Declarer plays the ♥5: four – jack – queen. What do you play at trick 3?
