Youth Week, Canberra 2005

Youth Week in 2005 was conducted at Fenner Hall on Northbourne Avenue in Canberra during the first week of the Summer Festival of Bridge.

The event was notable for the best attendance in over a decade. Of particular note was the number of teenagers (and sub-teenagers) who attended. Not only from Queensland, New South Wales, Victoria, South Australia and Western Australia, but also from across the Tasman.

Of the 60 players who competed in the Youth Pairs, around one third of these were under 20. In the Australian Youth Teams, the ratio was over 40% of the 50 players who participated.

The young Sydney Pair, Adam and Nabil Edgtton, underlined their excellent results in the NSW Youth Championships by finishing second in the Youth Teams (with internationals, Daniel Geromboux and Griff Ware) and also by slipping into fifth spot in the Butler, edging out some handy pairs in the process.

Their were two common elements amongst this group of fledgling players: they all had a ball and could not get enough bridge.

Talk to any of those who attended the 2005 Youth Championships and they will no doubt tell you that, if you are eligible, you should be there in 2006 regardless of experience and skill level. Many of these younger participants have been playing bridge for less than twelve months.

The Gold Coast Youth Pairs replaced the Gold Coast Youth Individual as a two session pairs event for players under 30.


The attendance (five tables) may seem a bit on the thin side but it is an encouraging start.

Unfortunately, hand records were not posted for the GCC Youth Pairs. This gem was played by David Wiltshire in the open pairs:



Playing in 4♥, David received the lead of a top club followed by a switch to the ♥6. South won and played a club to West's King. West next played a spade to the King and East's Ace. When East led a second spade, South ruffed and was now in a position to make the rest.

He cashed the top heart, noting the bad break, played the *King* of diamonds to the *Ace*, ruffed

a club, then a diamond to the 10 and spade ruff. The last diamond entry left East with the J9 and declarer with Q10 of trumps.

A well contrived trump coup.

Helman-Klinger Awards The most fundamental principle of the Helman-Klinger Prizes is that they can only be awarded once to any individual. The Helman-Klinger award is generously donated by Rabbi Leonard Helman of the USA in recognition of Ron Klinger's contribution to bridge around the globe.

General Achievement Award: Gabby Feiler

Gabby just missed in 2003. In 2004, he has contributed to the ABF Youth Committee and has been a driving force behind Australia's most successful campus bridge club at The University of Sydney. Added to that was Australian representation and that wonderful silver medal at the World Youth Individual.

Masterpoint Award: Griff Ware

With about 20 masterpoints separating several pairs, Griff Ware finished just ahead of Fiona Brown , Paul Gosney and William Jenner O'Shea.

Hills-Hurley Award

Established by Richard Hills and Steve Hurley, the Hills-Hurley award acknowledges performance, not by individuals, but by partnerships. The performance of partnerships is taken into account but so too is the evidence of the effort players put into system and partnership understanding.

Youth Bridge at QCBC

Some time around mid-year 2004, the board of the QCBC, in its infinite wisdom, decided it would be a good idea to promote youth bridge in Brisbane by offering a series of interstate lessons in the first week of the Christmas holidays to young people aged 10 up. Working on the principal that fools rush in where angels fear to tread, the board diligently sought to determine who was the biggest fool in the club, and I was duly approached to teach the course. Being the fool they knew me to be, I had little hesitation in saying yes because I knew that a) It would never get off the ground and b) the Christmas holidays were so far off that life as we knew it on this planet would have long ceased to exist before they arrived.

We started with 24 young people aged from $9^{1/2}$ to 17 and finished with 23 and a volunteer ganny. Thank you Marie and Glenice. Four sessions, Mon – Thursday, 2 hours each.

The lessons were based on PLAY BRIDGE: A WORKBOOK FOR THE ABSOLUTE BEGINNER by Joan Butts, and at this point I must honour my extensive debt of thanks to Joan. Despite considerable experience as a teacher, I had never taught bridge before and as it became clear a few weeks prior to the holidays that the course was actually going to take off, I was beginning to feel just the tiniest bit enormously inadequate and more foolish than ever. Joan took the time to sit with me and take me through what needed to be done and how to go about it. Thank-you.

Sessions 1 and 2 we played **Starter Bridge** (see textbook p13). This basically focuses on bridge as a partnership taking tricks, estimating possible number of tricks, determining trumps and setting a target as to the possible number of achievable tricks. Session 3 introduced bidding, and by the end of session 3 we were bidding, playing and hopefully making responsible contracts. That's bridge isn't it? Did I forget something?

Session 4 we began a serious 6 table Mitchell, 2 boards a round with a skip, but somewhere between rounds 2 & 3 the whole thing fell apart with the arrival of the local press, the QBA manager/photographer (mother of two of the youth), the need to present certificates during the club session lunch break and various other factors. Follow-up sessions will be held for interested players during the school holidays and we'll see where things go after that.

Having thanked Joan, I also want to thank Paul Gosney, our youth champion for coming in to talk to the class. They were rapt and the q/a session lasted over 20 minutes. The kitchen staff were fantastic. They knew youth need to be fed and more than rose to the occasion. Of course, thank you to Toni Bardon and the board and thanks to the whole club. Everyone seemed to take ownership of the course and provided me with no end of support and helpful suggestions.

Well, that's it. I'm looking forward to the follow-up sessions, and if, next year, the board decides I'm still the most foolish member of the club, at least I'll have some idea of what I'm doing.
