A Bumper Event -The World Youth Teams

Australia has hosted only a handful of international events. The World Youth Championships were conducted in Sydney in August (7th-17th), the first truly international youth event to be conducted within our shores. Much will be written about the quality of the event. In short, everything seemed to go splendidly and David Stern, Peter Gill, Nick Fahrer, Kim Neale, Pauline Gumby and Mat McManus all deserve congratulations on their efforts with support from a host of volunteers over the period.

After a complete round-robin for all eighteen competing nations (an equal record), the event concluded with 64 board semifinals and a 96 board grand final.

Australia took a top four position after defeating Canada 24-6 but could not maintain a grip on the position. With a tougher draw than Canada, they slipped out of the finals race and finished 7th.

Squeezed by an 8 Year-old!



I recently had occasion to visit Loreto Junior School in suburban Adelaide, where Stephanie James manages a lunch-time bridge group for anything between 10 and 16 pre-teenagers. We had a short lesson on Opening 1NT and sat down to play. There was a vacant spot opposite Monica. To my right sat Millie and to my left, Clarissa.


Apparently I spoiled the exercise by opening 1♣ on the West cards but we all agreed that Millie's 1NT bid in the pass-out seat would be 16-18 since nobody had yet learnt anything about balancing principles.

Here was the full deal:



I led the \$2. South took the 10(?) with the Ace and began setting up clubs and hearts in that order. After driving out West's aces, and collecting the top two spades in dummy as West persisted, these cards remained with declarer on lead:



Declarer led the 9 of hearts and held the trick. When she next led the 7, correctly organising to take the last heart in dummy, I came to a grim realisation -- I was being squeezed by an 8 year-old. In the blind hope that my partner held the \blacklozenge Q, or perhaps that Millie had been shown how to take a finesse, I parted with the beer card.

Aussies Place Second at the PABFC

The Australian Youth Team finished a creditable second in the PABFC in Seoul. The Japanese team finished in first place, 17.5 VPs ahead of Australia.

The team drifted around fourth place for the early stages of the event but looked as though they could have overhauled the leaders going into the last day but 22-8 losses to Indonesia and China Hong Kong left the Australians with too much leeway to make up.

The event may have provided a grandstand finish if the Australians were in touch, for they played Japan in the final round. As a consolation, they defeated the champions by 24 -6 in that final match.

After the untimely withdrawal of Paul Gosney-Nathan Van Jole, the team travel to Seoul as a four man unit. With the more arduous schedule of the World Youth Teams, the Australian Team will need all of their six players.

Due to the unfortunate circumstance of Nathan's unavailability for the entire World Youth Teams Championship, the pair of Daniel Krochmalik and Justin Williams has been added to the team which represented in Seoul.

The result in Seoul is an indication that the Australian Youth Team has enough ability to perform well, especially on home soil.

History now reveals that Australia could only manage 7th place in the World Youth Teams Championships. Many would say that finishing well ahead of half-way was more than reasonable but, knowing the six players involved, they would be quick to point out that they could have done better.





The Aussies at The WYC

Two Australian pairs finished plus on the datums over the duration of the World Youth Championships. Daniel Geromboux and Griff Ware were particularly imprssive, finishing 5th. overall.

What follows are some of the more interesting hands of the event from an Australian perspective. There are plenty more to be found in the bulletins which can be accessed via the website.

Australia played their trans-Tasman rivals early in the event. This double game swing assisted the Aussies to a 53 IMP win:







South led the ♣8 and declarer won and played the ♠A and Queen. South took the King but could now only defeat the contract by underleading a heart to North's King for a diamond shift. This didn't happen, so Williams chalked up +420.


West led the ♠5 to East's Ace. Playing back either black suit will almost certainly lead to defeat but East shifted to the ♦Q. This went to the King and Ace and West, no doubt believing that East held Q-J or a singleton, returned the suit.

In the same match, Daniel Krochmalik had to play excellently in an inferior contract to avoid a significant loss:





Staring at a making 4♥, Krochmalik had to muster 9 tricks in NT on the lead of the ♣K. When West discarded a spade at trick one, declarer won at once and ducked a heart to South's 10. South returned the ♥Q, won in dummy. After four rounds of hearts, West was in again, so he exited with the ◆7. Krochmalik finessed and then played Ace and another diamond. South could claim one more diamond trick but was endplayed to give declarer the ♠J as an entry to dummy. The French were rarely beaten on slam hands but Krochmalik- Williams had the better of this one in their losing match (12-18)against France:



North led the ♠8 and it was evident that everything hinged on the club suit. Declarer unblocked the spades before cashing all of the hearts and the ♠J. When he led a club to the Queen in dummy, all was to be well for the Jack popped on the next club play.

Although it is acknowledged that the slam was only a shade over 50%, the swing was really a result of the auction.

At the other table, the bidding proceeded 'up the line'. Williams had the Acol-style rebid of 2NT to define the strength and shape of the hand. From then it was just a matter for Krochmalik to check-back on hearts and do the arithmetic.

Australia finished on 270 VPs in 7 th place, winning eight matches and drawing one. Very heartening were wins over eventual champions, USA1 and fourth placed Canada.

Thanks must go to John Roberts who, as non-playing Captain put a lot of work into preparing the team for both the PABFC and these World Championships.
