South opened 2\% and North bid 3- (showing a single loser suit). To keep my \&K protected I bid to 6NT.
I won the Heart lead and played a Diamond to the Ace. East showed out (West had the guarded Diamond Queen).
Then I miscounted my tricks.
Thinking I needed it for my twelve tricks, I led a Club to the King, which lost to the Ace.
East was on lead and I immediately knew I had 12 tricks - except I had twelve tricks without the Clubs.
East switched to Hearts, and I couldn't throw my hand on the table quick enough - making 12. If East had led Clubs back, I would have been four down.

Wally lead a small Heart, Ollie won the King and returned a small Heart. Maxy won the Ten in hand in order to play a Diamond to the Queen. Ollie won the $K$ then cashed his $\vee A$ and exited a Club. Because Wally would have risen $\forall A$ if he had held it, it was marked in Ollie's hand.
Maxy cashed the \& AK, ruffed a Diamond to Dummy and pitched another Diamond on the \&K.
At this point if Ollie had the $\triangle Q$ to at least three then he would have had a balanced 16 count and so would have opened a Strong No-Trump. Thus there was no gain to taking the Spade finesse, so Maxy laid down the $A A$ and $\uparrow K$, dropping the doubleton Queen to make an important matchpoint overtrick.

## Smirnov sees a Duck.

Repeat German visitor Alex Smirnov noted a classic ducking position on Board 25 in the second session of the Pairs Qualifying.
On a trump lead against 6a by South, East must duck their Ace-third trump at trick one. This allows Declarer to ruff one Heart, but maintains control in trumps so that when the A is won, a Heart trick is still available to be cashed.
If instead East plays two rounds of Spades at the start of the hand then declarer has an easy 12 tricks.


Justin Howard and Daniel Braun started their Pairs Qualifying yesterday with a less than ideal start. On the very first board of the tournament, their opponents bid to 7NT and there was nothing they could do about it.
7NT making.
What a poor start.
They bounced back in style! They bid and made 7NT on the very next hand.
They went on to win the Qualifying!

Nicola knew that our side was only going to win one Heart trick. She also had a void in Clubs and a strong wish to get her Club ruff(s).
She came up with a great idea to get me on lead to get her Club ruff. Rather than cashing her Ace of Hearts, she led a low Heart away from the VAKQJ95, in the hope that I could win the Ten, and lead her a Club.
Note that there was no guarantee that I had the - A or the A for any other immediate entry. Since I had raised Hearts, Nicola took a good gamble that I had the $\nabla$ T.
There was only one small problem. This was the full deal:

Ben's partner Jack Tarlinton led the $\$ 3$, Paul won in hand and continued Diamonds. In with the $\uparrow$ A, Jack correctly switched to the \&2 and Ben found the excellent play of the \&Q. Because the Gos had no indication as to the location of the $\% \mathrm{~A}$, he had to take the $\%$ at that point for fear of losing the whole suit if the \&A was offside.
This preserved communications to Jack's fourth Club, so that when Ben was in with the $\boldsymbol{\Phi} \mathrm{K}$ after Paul took a losing Spade finesse the defenders were able to cash a total of five tricks and beat the contract.
