# Ten minute Interview Plus Quotes Alex 'Pebble' Lockwood

#### Q. Mini Bio

I've been playing bridge for quite some time, and this is the first time I've ever done a Bulletin interview. I would rather travel and piss around and have fun than do any work of any sort – which is Project Managing. I have no pets. There's nothing else to say.

*Q: Which aspects of bridge are you best at?* Handing out overtricks. I'm good at getting partners who are better than me. I don't know how that happens.

#### Q. What mountains have you climbed?

Mont Blanc (France), 8 New Zealand Peaks and in 2 weeks I'm going to climb Mount Kilimanjaro in Tanzania. The ideal training for that is to sit around for two weeks playing bridge and getting drunk.

I've climbed Mount Kosciuszko, but that's not worth mentioning.

In the last three years, I've spent over 200 nights in the outdoors, either in tents or mountain huts.

*Q.* What is your optimal Rock-Paper-Scissors strategy?

That's easy. Rock every time. The Avalanche. I suppose that goes with mountaineering. I can justify it, I'm a bit slow with the timing, and you just leave your fist shut. You can't ever get seen in advance.

After Pebble opens 1♠ and puts down dummy in 3NT with ♠ 87642: "I have a stopper. Eventually." Alas, he didn't. Laura Tough led the Spades and won five Spade tricks.

After the auction:

1♠ 2♦

2♥ 2NT PASS

"We play 2-over-1 Game Force. Just not this time." Made exactly 8 tricks.

After putting down Dummy with no intermediate cards higher than the 8 and only a few scattered honours: "All I have is these X's. I am the X-man."



## Classic Rewind

# A Classic hand from 2010. **Two Edgttons, One Mind**

By Andy Hung Round 14 of the Butler witnessed two of the top four pairs reaching a thrilling 5-0 fit. The hand is Board 15, where at two tables South had a 2+ "very weak" multi option (5+ weak two in a Major, 3-7 HCP). This put East-West to the test on their Multi defence.

South opened 2 \* (Weak Multi) and here are the East-West hands:



At our table, Adam passed with the West cards and North bid 2♥ (Pass or Correct). I doubled for takeout and Adam bid 3♥. This is where the murky water arose.

Adam and I had not discussed if 2NT would have been Lebensohl (if so, 3♥ should technically show some balanced hand with no Heart stopper) and so I bid 3, temporising.

Adam proceeded with 4♥ and I hoped to close the auction with 4♠ if 4♥ was a Spade raise. Adam completed with 5. which seemed to me like a good hand with 5-5 in the minors. Adam can't really have a Spade slam try, since he passed over the 2♦ opening. I passed 5♣ and that was that. 4 off!

Here is the full hand:




Funnily enough, Nabil and Paul had an identical auction to rest in 5 also.

**End-Play Technique** By Pebble There was a good hand for a textbook endplay on



I was in  $4 \clubsuit$  by South, with West leading the  $\bigstar$ T.

With nearly mirrored shapes, this is a classic hand for an endplay.

You need to do all of the following things to setup the endplay – in no particular order. Yet.

With trumps splitting 3-1, draw 3 rounds of trumps. Play 2 rounds of Clubs (losing) and then the third round of Clubs, trumped.


Then play ♥A, ♥K and exit with the third round of Hearts to reach this position:



When you lose the Heart, either opponent is endplayed into giving you a ruff-and-sluff or catching the  $\blacklozenge$ Q for you.

The technical play here is get the timing right. Win any Heart leads in South early, keeping the  $\forall$ K as an entry to ruff the Club. Lose the Clubs as soon as possible.

Here was the full hand:



Deep Finesse doesn't even bother. Deep Finesse just looks where the Queen is and wins anyway.
