

Giving Declarer a Losing Option By Griff Ware

I found a cute play on Board 9 of the first session in the Youth Pairs Consolation yesterday.



Lauren Travis declared 1NT from the South seat, and my partner Sam Coutts led the \blacklozenge 2. Lauren played low from dummy. If I had made the natural play of the \blacklozenge 9 (winning), then she would have been forced to go up with the \blacklozenge K on the next round of Spades. This is because, with both the \blacklozenge Q and \blacklozenge J still outstanding there would be no prospect of a trick in Spades other than playing for the \blacklozenge A to be onside.

Instead, it was correct for me to win the first round of the Spades unnecessarily highly with the Jack. This meant that after a Club to Sam's Ace and another small Spade through, Lauren could choose to play for the AQ onside (rather than the A) by finessing with the AT. After a small thought this is exactly what she did, an unfortunate misguess which meant we could cash the whole spade suit and gain a trick in each other suit for one off. There were 10 pairs not in the Butler who played in a two-session matchpoint event. Here are the final scores. Congratulations to **Stephen Williams & Arjuna De Livera**.

The Godfather of Zool's next kid.


Q. Mini Bio

Youth Week. It's just good. It's the gas. Everyone's around. The Soup is too spicy though.



Youth Awards for 2010

On Tuesday evening the Youth Awards for 2010 were presented, alongside the trophies and prizes for the Youth Week Pairs and Teams. There are three separate awards presented each year:

The Hills-Hurley Trophy

This trophy, donated by Richard Hills and Steve Hurley, is intended to encourage talented young bridge players to form long-standing partnerships and reward a successful pair who has developed a well-organised partnership to harness their full potential. In 2010 the stand-out choice for the committee was Nabil Edgtton and Paul Gosney, two of our most successful youth bridge players in recent times, who worked hard on their systemic understandings throughout the year. Their results speak for themselves, including a win in the ANOT, a win in the ANC Youth Teams,

4th place in the ANC Open Butler, being the leading Australian pair on datums in the Rosenblum and spearheading the Australian Junior Team that qualified for the quarterfinals at the World Junior Championships. Congratulations Nabil and Paul. While a partnership can only win this award once, Paul and Nabil become the first players to win the Hills-Hurley Trophy twice. Paul first won the award in 2004 in partnership with Nathan van Jole. Nabil previously won the award in 2006 with Adam Edgtton.

The Helman-Klinger Masterpoint Award

This award, worth \$200 annually and this year supplemented with a further \$100 from the Friends of Youth Bridge Fund, is awarded to the Australian Youth Player who earns the most masterpoints in the calendar year in question. This year Michael Whibley won with 257.19 masterpoints, narrowly ahead of Adam Edgtton (255.67 MPs). This award can only be won once by a player and thus Nabil Edgtton (357.03 MPs) and Paul Gosney (356.33 MPs) were ineligible due to previous wins.

The Helman-Klinger Achievement Award

award, worth \$400 annually and this year This supplemented with a further \$200 from the Friends of Youth Bridge Fund, is presented each year to the Australian Youth Bridge Player whose ability, achievements, sportsmanship, attitude, contribution and commitment during the calendar year are most deserving. The 2010 award was won by Peter Hollands, who has been instrumental in organising various aspects of youth bridge in Melbourne, as well as having had an impressive list of achievements in various national and local bridge

events. This includes being part of the runner-up Melbourne 4 team at the GNOT. Pete's attitude and commitment to the game are exemplary and he is a worthy winner of the award.

Both Helman-Klinger Awards exist due to the generosity of Rabbi Helman, an American lawyer, prominent bridge enthusiast and philanthropist, who made a substantial donation to establish the prizes to honour Ron and Suzie Klinger's outstanding contribution to bridge in Australia.








Classic Rewind

A Classic hand from 2010. Sceptical Reversals

On **Board 18** of the 2nd round of the Youth Teams, Geoff Martin played 4♥ and used good dummy reversal technique to make his game:



The light overcall made the dummy reversal line more attractive, since Spade overruffs from West were impossible. Dummy reversals involve ruffing repeatedly many times in the long trump hand (usually a play that doesn't gain tricks). If you can trump enough times so that dummy has more trumps than your hand, then an additional trick or two can be made.

After a Spade lead, Geoff won the Ace, ruffed a Spade, crossed to the A, ruffed a Spade (East pitching a Club; ruffing would have lost a trump trick), crossed to the AK, ruffed the final Spade (East pitching another Club) and still had two trump tricks and the AK to come, for a total of 10 tricks.

The Bad Old Days

In 1972 it was mostly rubber bridge, and that was how professionals in Sydney survived. In a poker club in Bondi Road, a cut-in rubber bridge school started up in opposition to Double Bay. A young group formed, a mixture of professionals and keen duplicate players.

We resolved to play in the Junior Championships (Under 30) in Canberra the next year. Our team was Paul Lavings (c.), Brian Bedkober, Geoff Lewis, Andrew Markovics, Neil Mathiesen and Andrew Reiner. We even had our own system, LLMM&R, named after the five core members of our team. It featured all the latest gizmos from the USA, negative doubles, forcing 1NT response to a major, cue bids of the opponent's suit. We had even refined from 15-18 1NT to 14-17, and with our own special Stayman.


The venue was the Griffin Centre, a tin shed on the perimeter of what is now the parking area behind the Canberra shops. The sun beat down mercilessly through the corrugated iron roof, but we didn't care. We were there to play bridge. We were there to win.

Eighteen teams competed in a full round robin. With one round to play the standings were (with 8-0 a maximum win):

Lusk was undefeated to date, and won their last match 8-0. Havas defeated Bourke 8-0, and Lavings beat a lowly ranked team 8-0. The final was between the only two sixperson teams in the event.

John Horowitz, David Middleton, George Smolanko started strongly, and we were soon sadly aware we were up against a better team. On board 8 we were outbid:

Middleton's 3♣ raise enabled Horowitz to find the good 5♣ save, which turned into a 10 imp bonanza when NSW took the push to 5♥. In the other room South overcalled 2♣, but North passed over 2♥. What should East bid over 3♣? Why not an honest 3♠? Now if EW have a slow, invitational sequence to game, NS will be less inclined to save. Or West could bid 3♥, instead of 2♥.

The weak notrump was proving a thorn in our side. At red, a weak notump (12-14) on your left, and 4H by your RHO. You hold:



♣ AQ10753

Any bid could be a disaster, you have been fixed again by the weak notrump. At the other table NS were able to get into the auction:
