Ducking by Discarding

Sophie King found a neat play to gain overtrick IMPs on Board 12 of Round 14 in the Selection Butler:

♠ AKT6		♠ 82

Declaring 2♥ from the South seat, West led a Club, Sophie won the Ace and finessed a Heart low, losing to the ♥J. East continued Clubs and Sophie accepted the force to play another trump. West won the ♥A perforce, and played another Club. Had Sophie ruffed this as she did the previous Club trick, she would have been able to draw the last trump and run Spades for eight tricks. However, the defence would have had the communications, when in with the ♦A, to score two Club tricks to hold Sophie to contract.

Instead, Sophie discarded a Diamond on the third Club, thus severing the communications to East and allowing a ninth trick to be established in diamonds without the loss of two Club tricks. +140 and well played for an extra couple of (double) IMPs.

Note that the effect of discarding in this situation is very similar to a hold up play with an Ace: the purpose is to lose tricks early in an opponent's long suit so that when their partner gains the lead there is no communication to transfer the lead to the player with the set-up length.

Against a trump contract a singleton lead (in a suit not bid by the declaring side) is virtually always an excellent lead. Here are some example hands from the Teams Round 8:

Once West leads the ♥A there is no way to defeat the contract. In theory West can switch to a diamond and East can win the first spade to give partner a diamond ruff. In practice, East will never know to play West for a singleton diamond.

After the Club opening, even if West switches to a Heart East will have difficulty picking West for a singleton. Declarer misguessed the spades, but still got out for two down thanks to the friendly defence.

One Tough Defender

Here is a hand that was very well defended by the second youngest player in the field – **Laura Tough**. This is **Board 14** from the Pairs Qualifying session one.

Against 4♥, Laura led the ♦6 and here was the situation:

Modi won the ♦K and switched to the ♠2. The first unlucky choice was made when declarer stuck in the ♠J, covered by the ♠Q and ♠A. A small Diamond was led from dummy, to Laura's Jack, and she returned the ♠7 to Modi's ♠9 and declarer's King. Now the ♥Q was led and declarer made another unlucky choice by letting this run to Modi's stiff King.

His Diamond return was ruffed by declarer, leaving this position:

Now declarer set out to crossruff and so led a Spade from hand. Rather than thoughtlessly discarding a superfluous Diamond, Laura discarded a Club. This enabled her to over-ruff the third round of Clubs and defeat the contract. So declarer went down due to a stiff King, a doubleton Queen and Laura's accurate defence.

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Matchpoint Play by Leigh Matheson

A textbook matchpoint decision hand came up on Wednesday:

Contract: 1NT, South – Lead: ♦3

Q1: Matchpoints. Plan the play. Assume clubs split 3-2.

Q2: Does your decision change if our long suit were spades instead of clubs?

 There are basically two lines of play we might choose.

Option A is to rise with the ♦A at trick 1 and then make the most of the clubs. There will probably be one club loser, so this line of play is likely to result in making eight tricks.

Option B is to hope that West has led from ♦QJxx and run the opening lead around to the ten in hand. If this works we are likely to make nine tricks. But if East has an honour there is a good chance that East will win and switch to another suit, which would be very troublesome.

Which option do you choose?

At IMPs the decision is easy, play safe and make your contract. Go with option A.

At matchpoints the decision depends on what our goal is for this contract. We have to consider what is going to happen to all the other players in our position. Our off-shape 1NT rebid is probably not the mainstream decision. Most players would rebid 2♣ and probably play the hand in a club partscore. These declarers will lose one Heart, one Spade (ruffing out a spade loser), one Club and one Diamond. So they will score +110. Therefore we only need to score eight tricks in our 1NT contract (for +120) in order to beat them and ensure an excellent matchpoint score.

If our club suit were spades, everyone else would be making +140 in a spade partscore. Therefore we must aim to make nine tricks (+150) in order to get a good score. Therefore we would play low at trick 1 as our best chance to score a ninth trick, even though it puts the contract at risk.

After winning the ♦A at trick 1, I led the ♣J with the intention of running it. East covered and I played clubs from the top, making nine tricks.

Fun bidding problem with Andy:

Playing in a very important teams match with screens you pick up:

♠Q94
 ♥KQ3
 ♦KQ7
 ♣KQ98

Partner opens 1♠ in first seat at nil vul and you have a cool gadget at your disposal so you bid 2♣ which is a GF relay.

Partner bids 2♠ which shows either:

- 15-17 NT or
- 15+ with 4+♦ (with 12-14NT partner bids 2♦, with 18-19NT partner bids 2NT, with 20-21NT partner opens 2NT) so you now relay with 2NT (any other bid by you would have been natural). Partner bids 3NT which confirms the 15-17NT so it now seems plain easy to set spades and ask for keycards so you do that with 4♣ (setting spades), partner cues with 4♦ and now we hit out the good old blacky 4NT. Partner bids 5♥ showing 2 or 5 key cards without the queen of trumps. Your move!

What's going on??

If you bid 5♠, then partner bids 5NT?! What would you do now?
