

# AUSTRALIAN YOUTH CHAMPIONSHIPS 2013

## SUPPLEMENTARY REGULATIONS

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### 1 General

#### 1.1 The Australian Youth Championships (AYC) comprise:

- Australian Youth Pairs (AYP) – January 12-13;
- Australian Youth Teams (AYT) – January 14-15;
- Australian Junior Team Selection (AJTS) – Phase 1, January 15-18, Phase 2, January 19-20;
- Supplementary competitions – January 15-18.

These events are conducted by the Australian Bridge Federation (ABF) in accordance with the ABF Tournament Regulations (ABF TR) as augmented by these Supplementary Regulations.

#### 1.2 The venue is Rydges Eagle Hawk Resort, Federal Highway, Canberra.

#### 1.3 Players must use the methods and equipment in the manner specified by the Chief Tournament Director (CTD) or Tournament Organiser (TO). Players must record the score for each board after it is played and before the commencement of the next board. It is an offence to leave the table at the conclusion of a match without first confirming the completeness and validity of the data entered into the scoring unit. Every player present at the table is equally responsible for the accuracy of the scores.

#### 1.4 Smoking and drinking of alcoholic beverages will not be permitted in the playing area at any time. The playing area is defined to also include any area set aside for score-up and/or the display of results. Contravention of this regulation may result in disciplinary score penalties (see 6.3) and possible exclusion from the Championships.

#### 1.5 Mobile telephones, iPads, iPods and other electronic communication equipment must be switched off during session time. Breach of this regulation incurs a disciplinary penalty, after one warning (see 6.3)

#### 1.6 Mobile telephones, iPads and other electronic communication equipment may not be consulted or used during the session, unless a specific exception is permitted by the CTD. Breach of this regulation incurs an automatic disciplinary penalty (see 6.3) in the first instance. In the case of further breaches by the same unit, the CTD will assess a more severe penalty, which may include forfeiture or disqualification.

#### 1.7 The ABF Youth Committee and those appointed to conduct the AYC reserve the right to regulate player behaviour and attire both in and around the playing rooms during the ABF Youth Week. This regulation applies both to sessions of play and periods between sessions. All participants are expected to treat others with courtesy appropriate to ABF tournaments.

#### 1.8 The organisers will have the right to sanction players who abuse alcohol or other intoxicating drugs. This includes:

- players who present to playing sessions in an evident state of intoxication,
- players who present offensive behaviour as a result of being intoxicated in or around the playing area between sessions,
- players under 18 who consume alcohol or other intoxicants,
- any players who consume alcohol or other intoxicants in the playing area,
- players who provide alcohol to players under 18.

Sanctions for breaches of this code can include (but are not restricted to):

- removal from the session of play in question,
- suspension for one or more sessions of play,
- longer term suspension from Youth or other ABF events.

1.9 Expressions used in these Regulations and not defined shall have their ordinary meaning in contract bridge terminology (which may include expressions defined in the Laws of Duplicate Bridge, 2007). In the event of any doubt or dispute as to such meaning, the decision of the CTD shall be final and conclusive. Unless repugnant to the context or obvious meaning, all terms defined in the ABF TR shall have the same meaning for the purpose of these Supplementary Regulations.

## **2 Officials**

- 2.1 The Tournament Organiser is Griff Ware.
- 2.2 The Chief Tournament Director is Matthew McManus.
- 2.3 The Appeals Committee Convener is David Thompson.
- 2.4 The ABF Youth Committee representative is Griff Ware.
- 2.5 The Recorder is David Thompson.

## **3 Eligibility and Substitutions**

- 3.1 At the time of commencement of an event, each Australian resident entrant must be a financial member of the ABF Masterpoint Scheme and of an organisation affiliated to the ABF or to an Australian State Bridge Association. Overseas players become honorary members of the Foreign Players Club.
- 3.2 Players in the AYP and AYT must have been born after 1-1-83.
- 3.3 To be eligible for the AJTS, a player must be eligible to represent Australia in international competition and have been born after 1-1-88.
- 3.4 In the AYT, each team must play as a unit for at least 66% of the rounds to be played (fractions rounded down).
- 3.5 In the AJTS Phase 1, each pair must play as a partnership in at least 14 of the 18 rounds.
- 3.6 No substitutes will be permitted in the Final of the AYP or in the AJTS Phase 2.
- 3.7 The CTD may allow emergency substitutions for substantial cause and may impose any conditions in doing so and may take whatever other action is considered necessary to keep the tournament in motion.
- 3.8 The TO may nominate a “house contestant” to compete in any event in order to ensure the smooth running of the tournament. The TO will make every effort to nominate eligible players. The conditions under which the “house contestant” competes will, subject to ABF TR 1.9, be at the discretion of the CTD.

## **4 Systems**

- 4.1 GREEN, BLUE and RED systems are permitted without restriction.
- 4.2 BROWN STICKER conventions are only permitted in the AYP and AYT. Eligible pairs may claim “protected pair” status

## 5 Seating

- 5.1 Seating rights for each match will be determined by toss of a coin.

## 6 Disciplinary and Procedural Penalties

- 6.1 The general provisions of ABF TR 10 concerning punctuality and slow play apply. The table of penalties is listed in the Appendices.
- 6.2 The disciplinary penalty for breach of regulations relating to smoking (1.4) and mobile phones (1.5, 1.6) is 3 VPs.

## 7 Correction Period and Time of Appeal

- 7.1 The period for correction of scores under Law 78C shall expire at the start of the first session on the following day of the AYC, with the following exceptions. The period for correction of scores for the current session and all prior sessions of the corresponding event shall expire 30 minutes after the posting of the scores for the session in the following instances:
- a) qualifying session 2 of the AYP;
  - b) the final session of the AYT (for corrections in the AYT affecting qualification to the AYTS);
  - c) the final session of AJTS Phase 1;
  - d) the final session of AJTS Phase 2A;
  - e) the final session of AJTS Phase 2B.
- 7.2 The Time for lodging an Appeal against a Director's Ruling (Law 92B) for each match expires 30 minutes after the score is made available for inspection.

## 8 Fouled Boards

- 8.1 In Teams events, the result of a fouled board is cancelled and a substitute board is played at both tables unless the result of the match is known or any of the players has left the table at the conclusion of that round. In these cases the board is cancelled and a score of 3 IMPs is assigned for both sides.

## 9 Event formats and Qualification

### 9.1 Australian Youth Pairs

- 9.1.1 **Qualifying** – 2 sessions of matchpoint pairs in one or two fields, depending on entries.  
**Final** - The Final will consist of either 5 tables playing 6 boards against all other pairs or 6 tables playing 5 boards against all other pairs over two sessions with Barometer style scoring.  
**Consolation** - The Consolation will be conducted over the same number of rounds and boards as the Final. Withdrawals from and additional entrants to the Consolation will be permitted.
- 9.1.2 Should a pair be unavailable to compete in the final for whatever reason, that pair shall be replaced by the next placed pair in the same field.
- 9.1.3 There will be a carryover to the Final only, based on the total matchpoint score obtained in the qualifying, according to the following formula:  
$$C = (M * fp * ft) / (2 * qp * qt), \text{ – rounded to the nearest 0.1 MPs}$$
where:  
C = the pair's carryover score to the final in matchpoints  
M = the pairs' total MP score in the qualifying  
fp = the number of pairs in the qualifying  
ft = the value of a top in matchpoints in the final

qp = the number of pairs in the qualifying  
qt = the value of a top in matchpoints in the qualifying

## 9.2 Australian Youth Teams

- 9.2.1 A round-robin will be played over 5 or 6 sessions.  
For 7 or 8 teams, the format will be 8 x 16 board matches, with a bye if necessary.  
For 9 or 10 teams, the format will be 9 x 14 board matches, with a bye if necessary.  
Teams with a bye will receive a Victory Point score for that round equivalent to an IMPs score of 0-0.
- 9.2.2 The IMP result in each match will be converted to Victory Points, using the appropriate WBF Victory Point scale.
- 9.2.3 The winner of the round-robin shall be the Australian Youth Teams Champion. Ties shall be broken by successive four-board playoffs. (Ties involving more than two teams shall be broken by successive playoffs of at least two boards against other tying teams. In such a tie-break, the result will be based upon the number of matches won.)
- 9.2.4 The draw shall be made so that, as far as possible, teams eligible for the AJTS will be drawn to play against each other in the later rounds of this event.

## 9.3 Australian Junior Team Selection - Qualification

- 9.3.1 Prior to session 1 of the AYT, pairs eligible for the AJTS will be required to indicate whether they are contending. Pairs who indicate their intention to be contending are committed to participate in the AJTS should they so qualify. Qualifiers will be determined on the basis of results from the AYT. Results against teams of more than four players will not be counted in determining qualification. In order to be eligible for qualification, both members of the partnership must have been born on or after 1-1-88, and both must satisfy the ABF residency requirements for international representation.  
\* Criterion 1: The six pairs from the three highest placed eligible teams shall qualify. Eligible teams shall be teams of four players, all of whom are eligible for qualification. At the conclusion of the AYT, qualifying teams must nominate the partnerships who will contest the AJTS.  
\* Criterion 2: In order to complete the field of 10 pairs, the four highest placed pairs who have not qualified via Criterion 1 will qualify to the AJTS. Ranking will be determined on the basis of Butler Datum results from the AYT, modified to take into account variations in standards of opponents. The formula to be used to calculate the Modified Datums is described in the appendices. To be eligible, they must satisfy the qualification eligibility requirements and the pair must have played as a partnership in all matches of the AYT, apart from matches in which substitutes were permitted in accordance with these regulations. (This condition will be waived in cases where there are exactly 10 pairs who declare themselves contending for the AJTS.) To be eligible for qualification under this criterion, it is not necessary that the pair's teammates also be eligible for the AJTS.
- 9.3.2 Tie-breaks in qualifying – Ties for qualifying positions under Criterion 1 will be broken in accordance with the ABF Tournament Regulations, detailed in the appendices. Ties for qualifying positions under Criterion 2 will be broken by successively deleting the result obtained against each of the tying pairs' lowest-placed opponents.
- 9.3.3 Replacement of unavailable or withdrawing pairs – In the event of a qualifying pair being unavailable or withdrawing prior to the AJTS, they will be replaced by the next highest placed pair, based on the modified Butler results. Should no such pair be available, the ABF Youth Committee or its representative can choose to fill the vacancy as they see fit.
- 9.3.4 ABF Declaration of Availability – Players in the AYTS Phase 1 must sign an ABF Declaration of Availability prior to the commencement of Phase 1. This will declare the player's availability and agreement to play in the designated event(s) should he or she qualify to the Australian Junior Team. Should there be more than one designated event, the player must advise on the declaration of availability the events for which he/she will be available. Note that both partners must indicate

availability for an event or the pair will be ineligible for that event. Any player failing to complete the Declaration of Availability prior to the commencement of AYTS Phase 1 will be deemed to have withdrawn from the event and that pair will be replaced by the next eligible pair.

#### 9.4 Australian Junior Team Selection Phase 1

9.4.1 Format – If sufficient eligible entrants are available, then the format will be a 5-Table IMP-scored Pairs, with a double round-robin of 10-board matches. If fewer pairs are available, then they will be formed into a similar movement as determined by the CTD.

The draw will be balanced so that each pair has every other pair as teammates on the same number of boards. Teammates from the AYT will be drawn to play each other in the first match of each round-robin.

9.4.2 Scoring – Each pair's score on a board is IMP'ed against the results at each of the other four tables. If the event has at least five tables, then each pair's highest and lowest IMP scores are then discarded with the remaining sum being the pair's score on that board. Otherwise, the sum of all of the pair's IMP scores will be their score on the board.

9.4.3 Victory Points – The IMPs in each 10 board match are totalled and converted to Victory Points as follows:

Winner's VPs = 70 + IMP difference (to a maximum of 140)

Loser's VPs = 70 – IMP difference (no minimum)

9.4.4 Fouled boards and artificial adjusted scores will be scored using the method detailed in the appendices.

9.4.5 Tie-breaks – At the conclusion of Phase 1, ties shall be broken according to (in order):

i) number of wins (tie = half-win);

ii) total net IMPs;

iii) total score (in IMPs) of head-to-head matches;

iv) recalculating totals by successively deleting each tying pair's worst result(s);

v) lot.

#### 9.5 Australian Junior Team Selection Phase 2

9.5.1 Format and Session Times

Phase 2 will be played as an IMP-scored pairs event compared against a pre-determined datum on each board.

Phase 2A

Session 1 January 19 10.00 am 16 boards

Session 2 January 19 1.30 pm 16 boards

Session 3 January 19 4.00 pm 16 boards

Phase 2B

Session 4 January 20 10.00 am 16 boards

Session 5 January 20 1.30 pm 16 boards

Session 6 January 20 4.00 pm 16 boards

Pairs will be numbered 1 to 4 based on their standing after Phase 1. Seating will be as follows (the first numbered pair will sit NS):

Session 1 Table 1 4 v 1 Table 2 3 v 2

Session 2 Table 1 1 v 3 Table 2 2 v 4

Session 3 Table 1 1 v 2 Table 2 4 v 3

For Phase 2B, the second placed pair after Session 3 will be renumbered as Pair 1: the third placed pair, Pair 2.

Session 4 Table 1 1 v 2

Session 5 Table 1 2 v 1

Session 6 Table 1 1 v 2

- 9.5.2 Phase 2A Qualification – At the conclusion of Phase 1, the pair finishing in first place will qualify to the National Junior Team. The pairs finishing in second, third, fourth and fifth will proceed to Phase 2.
- 9.5.3 Phase 2A Carry-forward – Each pair in Phase 2 will carry forward one-half of their final Victory Point Score from Phase 1, subject to the following restriction. Should the difference in carry-forward between the pair finishing third in Phase 1 and the pair finishing fifth in Phase 1 be greater than 96.5, then all pairs' carry-overs shall be multiplied by a factor of  $96.5/(C_3-C_5)$ , where  $C_3$  is the original carry-forward of the third placed pair and  $C_5$  is the original carry-forward of the fifth placed pair.
- 9.5.4 Phase 2A Scoring – Scoring will be by total IMPs, converted to Victory Points for each 16 board comparison:  
 Winner's VPs = 45 + IMP difference (to a maximum of 90)  
 Loser's VPs = 45 – IMP difference (no minimum)
- 9.5.5 Phase 2B Qualification – At the conclusion of Session 3, the highest-ranked pair will qualify to the National Junior Team, while the lowest-ranked pair is eliminated.
- 9.5.6 Phase 2B Carry-forward – Each of the pairs in Phase 2B will carry forward:  
 i) 50% of their carry-over from Phase 1 to Phase 2; plus  
 ii) 50% of their score in the Phase 2A match against their Phase 2B opponents; plus  
 iii) 25% of their score in the other two matches in Phase 2A,  
 all converted to IMPs.  
 The total carry forward to Phase 2B is capped at a maximum of 64.5 IMPs.
- 9.5.7 Phase 2A Scoring – Scoring will be by total IMPs.
- 9.5.8 At the conclusion of Phase 2B, the higher ranked pair will qualify to the National Youth Team.
- 9.5.9 Tie-breaks in Phase 2 – At the conclusion of either Phase 2A and/or Phase 2B, ties shall be i) broken according to (in order):  
 ii) removal of carry-forward;  
 iii) total score (in IMPs) of head-to-head matches in Phase 2;  
 iv) total net IMPs in Phase 2;  
 v) lot.

## Appendices

### Penalties for Late Arrival or Slow Play

0-5 mins	warning for first offence, then 1 VP (3 IMPs) for each subsequent offence
5-10 mins	1 VP (3 IMPs)
10-15 mins	2 VPs (6 IMPs)
15-20 mins	3 VPs (9 IMPs)
20-30 mins	5 VPs (15 IMPs)

For late arrival in excess of 30 minutes, the CTD may assess a more severe penalty including forfeiture of the match and/or disqualification from the event.

When boards are cancelled by the director due to a failure to complete them on time and a slow play warning has previously been issued to a pair, the following penalties may be applied at the director's discretion:

One board	1 VP (3 IMPs)
Subsequent boards	2 VPs (6 IMPs)

### Tie-breaking

Unless otherwise noted, significant ties in IMP scored events are broken by (in order): sum of opponents' VPs, number of wins, net IMPs, lot.

## Forfeits in IMP-scored events

In the case of a forfeit in the AYT, the offenders will be given a score of 0 VP.

The non-offending team's score will be adjusted, at the end of the event, to the highest of:

- 72 VPs,
- the mean VP score of the non-offending team for its completed matches, and
- the mean VP score of the opponents of the offending team in completed matches (not including forfeited matches of the offending team).

In the case of a forfeit in the AJTS Phase 1, the offenders will be given a score of 0 VP.

The non-offending pair's score will be adjusted, at the end of the event, to the highest of:

- 115 VPs,
- the score of the non-offending pair in its other match against the offending pair,
- the mean VP score of the non-offending pair for its completed matches, and
- the mean VP score of the opponents of the offending pair in completed matches (not including forfeited matches of the offending pair).

## Australian Junior Team Selection Qualifying: Modified Datums

For the AYT, the datum score on each board will be calculated by averaging the scores obtained after deleting the two extremes. Each pair's score will be compared to this score to obtain their net IMPs on the board. At the end of the match, the net IMPs for each pair will be totalled. The "Match Datum" will be calculated as the positive net IMPs to a maximum of +50, plus one-tenth of any IMPs in excess of 50, or, in the case of the "losing" pair, the negative net IMPs to a minimum of -50, minus one tenth of any IMPs in excess of 50.

In determining the Modified Datums, the following will be calculated for each pair:

$CD_n$  = the Modified Datum of Pair n

$MD_n$  = the total of all Match Datums of Pair n

$AD_n$  = the average Match Datum of Pair n (equal to  $MD_n$  divided by the number of matches played by Pair n)

$$CD_n = MD_n + (AD_a/2 + AD_b/2 + \dots + AD_z/2)$$

where  $AD_a, AD_b, \dots$  are the average Match Datums of Pair n's opponents

## Fouled boards and artificial adjusted scores in AJTS Phase 1

Where the Director awards an artificial adjusted score under Law 12C1:

- a pair awarded average plus shall score + 6 IMPs on the board;
- a pair awarded average shall score 0 IMPs on the board;
- a pair awarded average minus shall score - 6 IMPs on the board.

If a complete set of North-South or East-West scores are available, they will be scored normally, otherwise the following provisions will be applied to either or both of those sets accordingly.

For tables at which actual results were achieved:

Where an artificial score has been awarded at one table: Let the four tables under comparison be designated A, B, C and D and the table scores for those table be indicated by  $w_A, w_B, w_C$  and  $w_D$ . The (signed) IMP score for a pair at table A with respect to the result from table D (for example), will be designated  $IMP(w_A, w_D)$ . An artificial IMP score for each pair with hypothetical "average" teammates will be found from an arithmetic mean of the IMP scores for that pair with respect to the results from all four tables. Let the cross-IMP scores for the pairs at tables A through D be designated by  $x_A, x_B, x_C$  and  $x_D$ . The cross-IMP score for (for example) a pair at table A will be given by the sum of the middle two of the three normal and one artificial IMP score for that pair. Thus,  $x_A$  is the sum of the middle two of  $IMP(w_A, w_B), IMP(w_A, w_C), IMP(w_A, w_D)$  and  $(IMP(w_A, w_B) + IMP(w_A, w_C) + IMP(w_A, w_D)) / 4$ .

Let the absolute average deviation of cross-IMP scores for (for example) the pair at table A be designated  $y_A$  and be the absolute value (magnitude) of the arithmetic mean of the differences between this cross-IMP score and the other three cross-IMP scores. Thus  $y_A = ABS((x_A - x_B) + (x_A - x_C) + (x_A - x_D)) / 3$ .

The final score to be applied at each table ( $z_n$ ) is given by the formula,  $z_n = x_n * s_n$ , where  $s_n$  is the ratio of the minimum of the absolute average deviation for that pair and 24, and the minimum of 24 and the maximum of the magnitudes of the average deviations for all four pairs. That is,  $s_n = \text{MIN}(24, y_n) / \text{MIN}(24, \text{MAX}(y_A, y_B, y_C, y_D))$  which may take any value from 0 to 1 inclusive.

Where an artificial adjusted score has been awarded at two tables: the score achieved at each table will be IMP'ed against the score of the other two tables' at which a result was achieved. These two scores will be totalled and then multiplied by a factor of 0.75 to determine the IMP score to be applied for that table.

Where an artificial adjusted score has been awarded at three tables: the scores achieved at the two tables which played the board will be IMP'ed against each other. This score will be multiplied by a factor of 0.5 to determine the IMP score to be applied for those tables.

For each board on which the director awards an artificial adjusted score, the final adjusted IMPs for each pair at every table will be rounded to the nearest integer (0.5 rounded up, -0.5 rounded down).

### **Anticipated Finishing Times**

The following times are provided solely as a guide to players and may change depending on event formats and other circumstances:

AYT	Tuesday, January 15, 5.30 pm
AJTS Phase 1	Friday, January 18, 5.00pm
AJTS Phase 2	Sunday, January 20, 6.00pm



## **Information on International Participation and Declaration of Availability**

*Information relevant to participation as a member of the Australian Representative Junior Team for 2013*

By signing this document you state that you intend to play in the Playoff to become a member of the Australian Representative Junior Team for 2013 and will abide by the terms outlined below.

You accept the conditions under which the selection event is conducted including ABF Supplementary Regulations and agree that you will comply with the minimum board requirements. These are available from the Convener and will be posted in the playing area.

Before competing in the playoffs, you may elect to participate in any or all of the events designated in the Appendix and should indicate your elections below.

**It will be necessary for both you and your partner to make the same elections in relation to the designated events. In the event that one partner omits to indicate a designated event the pair will be considered ineligible for that event.**

You undertake to be available to represent Australia in any or all of the following events (check the boxes). You understand that if you do not here indicate availability for an event the organisers are not later bound to accept your nomination for that event.

In some instances the ABF may elect to make available additional subsidies to those outlined above to meet accommodation and other expenses. To the extent that such additional subsidies are made available they should be regarded as ex-gratia on an event by event basis. There is no certainty of such payments for designated events either in this year or in the future and you will be responsible for the remainder of your expenses. If selected, you agree to be bound by standards of behaviour and discipline normal to the participation of Australian Teams at international tournaments and events.

You acknowledge that the ABF reserves the right to withdraw the Australian Junior Team from participating in any event whose venue, in the reasonable opinion of the ABF, may represent security or other risks especially having regard to the participation of youth players. As a minimum the ABF and ABF Youth Committee will have regard to travel advisories issued by the Australian Government.

By signing this declaration you release the ABF and the ABF Youth committee from any liability whatsoever resulting from a decision either to participate or not participate in any designated event including but not limited to personal or property damage that may result from attending the event.

In the event of a decision by the ABF not to participate in a designated event the ABF is not obligated to offer an alternative event but will make reasonable efforts to ensure that the team will participate in at least one event during the ensuing 12 months.

If selected to represent Australia at an ABF designated event and if you have, in good faith, booked an airfare for a designated event and the ABF subsequently elects not to send a team then:

- to the extent that you have taken out travel insurance then the proceeds of any insurance claim less the costs of the travel insurance policy will be refunded to the ABF; and/or
- to the extent that the ticket is non-refundable and no refund is available from the vendor or no claim is possible from any travel insurance policy then the ABF undertakes that it will not make unreasonable demands for the return of the subsidy;
- if however the ABF, after considering the risks of the attending the designated event, elects to send a team and you subsequently elect, for whatever reason, not to attend, then you will be liable in all cases for the return of the subsidy to the ABF.
- if you qualify, have accepted a subsidy and subsequently do not attend and play in the designated event for personal reasons then you will be required to return the subsidy in full. This would apply even in the event of sickness or accident and you are therefore urged to understand this when considering travel insurance issues.

**The ABF strongly recommends the purchase of Travel Insurance for all participants in any representative team.**

## Declaration of Availability: Australian Junior Team 2013

HEREBY DECLARE that I will be available to represent Australia in the event(s) I have designated in Appendix A (overleaf).

I understand that the Australian Bridge Federation provides a subsidy to defray some of my expenses but I understand that I will be responsible for the remainder of my expenses. I understand that if any representation has been made by any person that I might receive more than the nominated amount, that representation is null and void.

I agree to refund the subsidy paid to me by the Australian Bridge Federation, less any non-refundable expenses, if the projected travel in respect of which the subsidy is paid does not occur.

I agree to provide a head-and-shoulders photograph of myself and a copy of my partnership's system, completed as according to the instructions of the sponsoring organisation, to my captain by the date that will be stipulated.

I state that I have no objection to any

- audio, video or photographic recording for whatever reason during the event or for publicity prior to the event,
- drug testing conducted as one of the requirements of International Olympic Committee, or to ensure that those requirements will be complied with.

I undertake as a representative of Australia to maintain the highest standard of behaviour in public, both at and away from the bridge table, and in particular I agree that I will:

- comply with all proper directives given to me as a member of the team by my team captain and by any team manager appointed by the Australian Bridge Federation,
- treat with respect all persons involved in any capacity in the event,
- lodge objections to rulings and appeals only through my team captain,
- not appear in any venue used by the Championships or approach any official or bridge player involved in the Championships while appreciably under the influence of alcohol or other stimulant,
- appear dressed appropriately for the occasion at all bridge events and associated social events. Minimum requirement includes: shirt with collar, trousers or skirt/dress, and shoes (smart casual),
- not bring the game of bridge into disrepute by anything I may say or write as a representative of Australian bridge.
