WEIRD AND WONDERFUL

One day whilst directing, a player asked for help (which I couldn't provide) and I got to witness this hand:

♠ AQ9xxx
♥ AQJ9xx
♦ x
♣ void

This is a great hand but unfortunately the auction which had come to her was:

1H Pass 1S ???

She decided to Pass. Being a natural stickybeak, I decided to watch developments. Perhaps she would know what to do by the second round of the bidding...

1H Pass 1S Pass
2D Pass 2H ...

So now she bid 2S, confident that her partner held no hearts. What happened next was sensational. LHO bid 4H! She had no problem working out what to do now and her double netted a mere 2300 penalty.

Meantime, I ended up filling in for a hand during this session, and you can guess which hand I held. Our auction was somewhat different.

1D Pass 2C ...

I doubled for takeout, and LHO rebid her diamond suit (ignoring her 5-card heart suit). When this came back to me, I bid 3D—not wanting to defend 2DX and desperate for partner to bid. She now bid 3S on her 3-0-5-5 and we played in 4S for a mere 650.

Don't you love the fact that bridge can generate such extremes in bidding?

Wandering through the unfamiliar Barr Smith Library (Adelaide Uni) I found the card room and joined, having answered "Of course I can". Rubber bridge was great fun and faking disinterest was an asset (especially when Ricketty Kate and Poker kicked in) but my scholarship was just on £200 and 3d per 100 could be expensive, but I was hooked.

I came home late for tea on a day when I was supposed to go to Cowandilla Practice School and Mum asked "How was school, dear?" "Not bad, Mum," I said innocently. But mums are cunning. "Well the teacher rang to ask how you were and would you be coming tomorrow."

In those days, attendance was taken by the lecturer so any absences had to be explained, or 'please explain' notices were issued. My problem was that every spare and not so spare moment was taken up with cards. I was hooked.

Justin Howard reported a neat little strip endplay on Board 3 of Match 4.

Playing in 4S, North, he received the lead of CQ. He quickly realised there were two options to make the hand, both dependent on spades breaking. Line 1 relied on the HK onside. Line 2 involved a partial strip. Now Justin always appreciates a good strip when he sees one and, apart from that, he is a Youth player so he is obligated to take the flashier option.

Juzz won the CK, then cashed two top spades. Now he cashed the DA, ruffed a diamond, led a club to the CJ (East doesn't gain by ruffing), ruffed another diamond, led another club to the CA, and exited his last club. West was now caught in a tidy partial strip and endplay.

On the other hand, on the lead of HJ, you can still complete this elimination as long as you cash a top club early and then follow the same line of play.

There are other elimination options available—simply ask the Youth players who spent at least an hour discussing the hand in the Foyer (look for the guy with the loudest voice!).

My team were discussing the best way to bid to 6C on this hand, based on no intervention. Admittedly, some Norths may have opened a Multi 2H (with 5 hearts and 4 diamonds) which changes the auction.

1C	1D
1S	2C
2H	2S...

And now West might head to slam. There is certainly plenty of space to explore now, especially if you anticipate East holding 4 diamonds and 4 clubs, plus the SK for the 2S bid. With only 5 cards in the majors, you can be confident of trumping at least one major card (2 if clubs break 2-2).

Only two pairs bid to 6C; in the Open Neil Ewart and Ben Kingham gained the slam swing, in the Youth essie De Garis and George Evans were the successful bidders.

I'm sure there were a lot of different auctions on this hand, depending on whether West opened a Multi 2H or North got to open with 1S or a Multi 2S.

I'm sure there were just as many defences, based on the results. In most situations North played in spades, with the outcome depending on the opening lead.

If East led the singleton diamond, the contract should make. Just win the DK, cash the SA and lead another spade. It's teams, so you have to take a safe line, especially if you think the lead is a shortage.

If East led a club, then the contract failed by two tricks—2 club ruffs, 2 heart tricks and the SK (you still cannot reach the North hand! One West got to double a club cue-bid, a successful lead-directing ploy.

Nobody bid to the excellent 7D contract.

OPEN: 6 x 6H, 1 x 6D, 1 x 4H

WOMEN: 4 x 6H, 4 x 4H

SENIORS': 4 x 6H, 1 x 6D, 3 x 4H

YOUTH: 3 x 6H, 1 x 5H, 1 x 4H, 1 x 7H (-1)

The only viable auction seems to start with a Fit Showing Jump and, even then, it isn't easy. I once played Double Keycard Blackwood after such auctions, but here you'd really need Double Exclusion Keycard! (5C would ask for keycards in both diamonds and hearts, excluding clubs.)

One option is:

1H	P	3D	P
3S	P	4D	P
4NT	P	5H	P
7D	All Pass		

3S and 4D would be cuebids (based on hearts), and now you can use 4NT knowing East has no club wastage.

You DO know you have to play in diamonds, so partner can take discards on your hearts.

SNIPPET

Note sent by Di Marler:

"I know there has been some discussion about the viability of the Victory Dinner. Thought I'd advise that we have a wonderful situation here in SA of not having enough seats for everyone. 160 tickets sold out with a long waiting list."

Reply:

A MINOR MONSTER

As dealer, you pick up the following hand:

♠ Void
♥ Void
♦ KJ765432
♣ AK972

When Jeff Travis picked up this monster he found an unusual initial Pass!

Lulling the opponents into a false sense of security and then sneaking up on them later is a well-used play, but it keeps on working.

South can always bid later, and the Pass has every chance of confusing everyone at the table whilst allowing Jeff to gather useful information for his own use.

LHO opened a normal 1H, partner produced a weak 2S overcall and RHO thought that 4H looked a good prospect. Everyone was a bit bemused when Jeff joined in the fun with a 5D bid, then persisted with 6D over West's 5H. West naively doubled.

West also thought that leading his singleton CJ looked a good idea. After all, he thought he was trying to get sufficient penalty to compensate for his game.

Having found almost the perfect dummy, a moment or two later, Jeff had drawn trumps and finessed clubs to make his slam.

Strangely enough, it is very difficult to find a lead to defeat 6D. As long as declarer cashes one top club, felling the CJ, then uses the entry to dummy (either SA or DQ) to finesse clubs, then the contract will make.

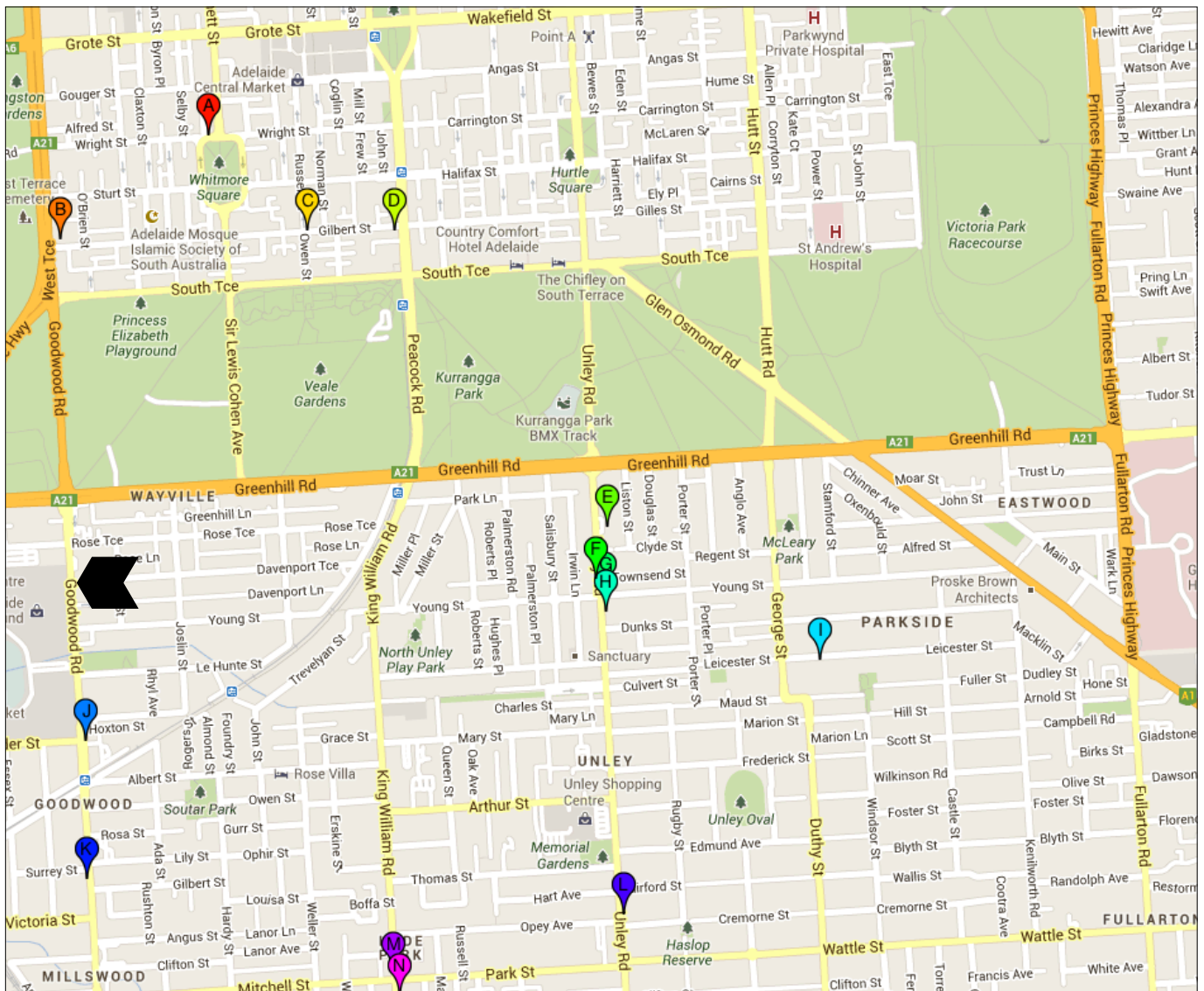
