

It is usually a losing proposition to save against 3NT, but here Grainger's $4 \pm$ paid off. South lost a spade and a diamond and one heart, North-South +590.



South led the ♠J. The ♠A from North and a spade return would give North-South eight tricks and take 3NT four down. That is not what happened.

North ducked the ♠J and East won with the ♠Q. Then came five rounds of clubs. South threw heart, spade, heart, spade, diamond. North discarded two spades. That did not work well. East now played a diamond and the defence could take only their three aces, East-West +430, +13 Imps.
