

Five pairs played in 6NT, generally on an invitational auction. Declarer has ten top tricks and can create an extra one in clubs. The hand boils down to the spade finesse and the expected result is one down. In Bulgaria vs Sweden, 6NT was played by North in both rooms. East had an easy ◆Q queen lead and both Norths went one down.

Against South's 6NT West has no reason to make an attacking lead against two balanced hands. Gavin Wolpert (USA2) led the ♥2, East-West +100. Shaolin Sun (China) led the ♠2, North-South +1440. 17 Imps to USA2.

Poland played in 3NT, +660, +13 Imps after Jacek Kalita led the ♥4 against France's 6NT at the other table, East-West +100.

Steve Weinstein – Bobby Levin (USA1) bid 1NT : 4NT, 5♥: 6♥, all pass. That went two down on the ♥2 lead, East-West +100. Andy Robson – Tony Forrester bid 1NT : 2♠, 2♦ : 3NT, +660, 13 Imps to England.



Four tables faced a five-level decision on Board 21:

South dealer: North-South vulnerable



Bulgaria and Sweden were in 4., North-South +620, no swing. John Hurd – Joel Wooldridge (USA2) had an uncontested auction to 4., +620. At the other table, over South's 1., Paul Fireman, USA2's West, bid 3. – no suit quality required. North bid 4. and Gavin Wolpert, East, bid 5.. South doubled, all pass. North led the diamond two and the defence collected a diamond ruff, a spade, a club and two hearts for +500, but 3 Imps to USA2.

Against Tony Forrester – Andy Robson (England), Jeff Meckstroth (West for USA1) raised Eric Rodwell's 2♦ overcall to 4♦ and North's 4♠ was passed out, North-South +620. At the other table, after the problem above, Steve Weinstein, North for USA1, bid 5♠ over 5♦. The defence came to a diamond, a spade and a club, East-West +100, 12 Imps to England.

The same problem was faced at both tables in France vs Poland. Godefroy de Tessieres, North for France, also bid 5♠, East-West +100. Poland's young Michal Klukowski, North, passed over 5♠. That was forcing and Gawrys, South, doubled, all pass. The defence came to a spade, two hearts and a club, North-South +300 and 9 Imps to Poland.
