



DE BOTTON North-South:

Bd. 13: South dealer : Both vulnerable



As the cards lie, North-South can make 64, 74 or 74. However, 64 would not be so good if East held 4Q-J-3-2 or Q-9-3-2 or J-9-3-2. After the auction above, Charlsen (N) bid 5NT(!), pick a slam. South bid 64 all pass. South won the diamond lead and had 13 tricks, +1390. At the other table, it began 24: South, 24 West. North-South reached 74 and East-West saved in 74, doubled by South. Declarer lost two spades, two hearts and a club for five down, -1400 and a flat board. As 74 is cold for +2140, it was an excellent sacrifice and 64 doubled, -1100, would be a good sacrifice against 64.



Not everyone opens $2\clubsuit$ with the South cards. In the other semi-final, both Souths opened $1\heartsuit$. Although they had only 3 losers, both Souths figured that with only 16 HCP and extreme shape, $1\heartsuit$ was unlikely to be passed out.

South's 6 \clubsuit would have shown not just extreme shape and an excellent hand, but also a void in diamonds. West led the $\diamond Q$ and South claimed 13 tricks, +2140.

Declarer lost the obvious five tricks, -1400, but +12 Imps.



After the auction given, DE BOTTON's South jumped to 4NT, asking. With controls in every suit, that is a sensible choice. If you cue bid 3 and hear a 4 (shortage cue) or 4 cue, you are going to bid 4NT next anyway. If your cue-bidding will not give you useful information, you might as well just ask for key cards.

In reply to 4NT, North bid 5 \bigstar , two key cards plus the \forall Q. With the \blacklozenge A and \forall K, \forall Q opposite, South jumped to 7 \checkmark .

This is not a great grand slam. Trumps 4-1 would be a problem and South needs to set up the diamonds. A low diamond lead might give South a headache. West led the $\bigstar J$. South won and played $\bigstar A$, diamond ruff, $\forall A$, $\forall K$ and the $\blacklozenge Q$: nine ... Ultimately South ruffed and was rewarded when the $\bigstar K$ fell, North-South +1510.

BLASS North-South began with a strong $1 \triangleq$ and $7 \P$ was reached, but North removed that to 7NT, played by South. 7NT required the $\bullet K$ to be singleton or doubleton with West. Result: one off, -100 and 17 Imps to DE BOTTON, who won the match by 42-3.

Some open 2NT, 20-22 points, with a singleton king or ace. That is not my cup of tea, but opening 2NT with a worthless singleton holds even less appeal. Declarer lost a trick to the A, but made the rest, +920.
